
Puppet Club





3rd April - Richard of Chichester (c1197 – 1253)

Ever wonder where the prayer ... 'May I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly, and follow thee more nearly, day by day' comes from? Richard of Chichester, a bishop in the 13th century, wrote it.

He began life as Richard de Wych, of Droitwich, the son of a veoman farmer. But Richard was a studious boy, and after helping his father on the farm for several years, refused an advantageous offer of marriage, and instead made his way to Oxford, and later to Paris and Bologna to study canon law.

In 1235 he returned to Oxford, and was soon appointed Chancellor, where he supported Edmund, Archbishop of Canterbury, in his struggles

against King Henry III's misuse of Church funds. Richard then studied for the priesthood and after ordination served at Charing in Kent and at Deal andwas in due course made a Bishop himself. He was greatly loved. He was charitable and accessible, both stern and merciful to sinners, extraordinarily generous to those stricken by famine, and a brilliant legislator of his diocese.

He decreed that the sacraments were to be administered without payment, Mass celebrated in dignified conditions, the clergy to be chaste, to practise residence, and to wear clerical dress. The laity were obliged

> to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days, and to know by heart the Hail Mary as well as the Lord's Prayer and the Creed.

> Richard was also prominent in preaching the Crusade, which he saw as a call to reopen the Holy Land to pilgrims, not as a political expedition. He died at Dover on 3 April 1253. In art, Richard of Chichester is represented with a chalice at his feet, in memory of his having once dropped the chalice at Mass! One ancient English church is dedicated to him.

And, of course, he is author of that famous prayer, now set to popular

music, which runs in full:

'Thanks be to thee, my Lord Jesus Christ for all the benefits thou hast given me, for all the pains and insults which thou hast borne for me.

O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly and follow thee more nearly, day by day.'

Exploring Our Faith




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Friends of Eastling School

Ospringe Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Wednesday 9th March, at Champion Hall. Highlights of the meeting included:

Mr Haratbar of the Swale Highways Unit attended the meeting. He described the recent changes to the ways the Highways Unit worked. The Unit wishes to work closely with the Parish Council and has provided a single point of contact to report problems such as pot holes. The unit has also provided the Parish Council with inspection schedules and salting routes. Prior to the recent bad weather the Parish Council had been in touch with the Unit to request more salting of Abbots Hill. The Parish Council thanked Mr Haratbar for the unit's work in salting the Parish during the recent snow, this had worked better than in previous years. Swale Council had put a lot of extra effort into salting, their staff had worked long hours and the cost of the exercise in the Borough had exceeded £100,000.

The Parish Council took the opportunity to report the problem on the Throwley Road. The Swale Council contractors had cut the overhanging hedge. This had revealed another problem, that of the bank encroaching on to the road, causing passing vehicles to move out into the road. Mr Haratbar agreed to look into this problem.

A resident of the Parish had reported problem with litter in hedges. There is particular concern on the Eastling Road. In addition to being unsightly and unhygienic, the litter was a danger to wildlife. The Parish Council discussed ways to resolve this problem. A number of suggestions were made. These included, the Parish Council to lead a 'Womble' to remove litter, a 'tidy your hedgerows day' for the Parish and the possible involvement of voluntary groups to help out.

The public are invited to submit suggestions for litter removal to the Parish Council. These should be made via the Clerk on 01795 410086 between 10am and 2pm, on weekdays only.

The Parish Council next meets in Champion Hall on Wednesday 13th April at 7:30. The Public are welcome to attend.
