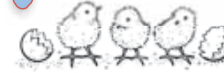

Happy Easter



"When he was at the table with them, he took bread, blessed and broke it and gave it to them. Then their eyes were opened, and they recognised him ..."

(Luke's Gospel Ch 24 verse 30)

This year, much of April will still be in the Church season of Lent. With only two or three weeks of Lent under our belts, we may already be struggling to avoid temptation of that we may have given up, or taken up as our Lenten penance. The season of Lent is a time of journeying. We begin on Ash Wednesday hearing again the account of Jesus being tempted in the wilderness, and follow him as he makes the journey into Jerusalem. On Palm Sunday (17th April) we will rejoice in Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, then to journey through the events of "Holy Week" when we will remember the Last Supper and the Garden of Gethsemane, to Good Friday when we recall Jesus' journey with the cross, and his crucifixion through to the joys and celebration of Easter Sunday.

In tandem with 'walking' with Jesus, we are called to meditate on our own life journeys. It is a timely task, when many of us will be spring cleaning our homes, and relishing in the signs of new growth that we see in our gardens and in the countryside. We know from our own life experiences; those souvenirs of our holidays, celebrations etc are useful memory tools when we remember the good times in our lives. In the Christian context, we are challenged to look back on our spiritual lives and recollect the 'souvenirs' of our own relationship with God, to give thanks and to make changes for the good.

The above passage from Luke's Gospel is taken from the account of the disciples' journey on the road to Emmaus. Two disciples encounter a

stranger. The disciples are so caught up in trying to rationalise the events of the death of Jesus, and his disappearance from the tomb; that they do not recognise Jesus. Pleading ignorance, Jesus asks them to tell him all about what has gone on. It is only when they invite 'the stranger' to eat with them that they recognise Jesus. In the same way, so often in our lives we only recognise the hand of God when we share it with others. Taking the account of the Road to Emmaus is a good example of what we can do in our own preparations for Easter Day. To remember and recall our journey with God, and to see where the example of Christ and his teaching has influenced us, and to focus our minds on ways in which he has called us to serve him.

Historically, Lent has been a time for Christians to prepare themselves for baptism and confirmation which a number of people across our communities of Eastling, Stalisfield and Otterden are doing right now. In the Parishes, we are looking forward to the Bishop of Dover coming to Eastling to preside at a Confirmation service on (Friday) 13th May: a service to which all are invited.

As the baptism and confirmation candidates make their preparations, we pray for them and for ourselves as we reflect and rejoice in our spiritual journeys and also as we prepare to celebrate on Easter Day the joy and good news of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Pat Thompson wrote this touching eulogy for the funeral of long time Stalisfield resident Mary Bayley who died in February, shortly after her 102nd birthday. Sadly space does not allow the full piece this month, so here is the first half, the rest will appear in the May Good News.

I first met Mary in 1971; nearly 40 years ago. I went to introduce myself, shortly after moving into Hillcrest, up the hill from her house. She rather shamefacedly, but with a mischievous look on her face, admitted that she had seen the Shortlands moving out and had walked up the road to have a look. She knew the goats were staying and looked to see if the dreadful dogs were in the garden. They weren't, so Mary crept round looking through the windows to see if there was any sign of the dogs. Having satisfied herself they weren't there, relieved, she made her way home. Minutes later vehicles arrived heading to Hillcrest, Mary was nearly caught snooping. We laughed about this and remained friends from that moment. This was typical of Mary she enjoyed telling stories against herself. At that time I was half Mary's age; 31 to her nearly 62, but she never seemed old. Incidentally the dogs had been the bane of her life, rushing about in an aggressive fashion every time she walked back and fore to the church, which was frequently, I discovered.

To backtrack in time:
Mary's mother and father moved to Stalisfield having purchased The Old School House, garden and part of Little Spely Wood in 1931. Her father was an early commuter, taking the train from Charing to London where he worked for a bank. By 1936 Mary and a colleague had a Gown Shop in Tenterden. Mary told me with glee that she overheard it described as "the smartest dress shop in Tenterden". They made all types of dresses, including wedding dresses, and Mary loved it. She was a gifted artist and seamstress.

Sadly her mother died in 1937, and Mary was unwilling to offer to give up her independence. Her father coped for a while and in 1939 asked her to come to Stalisfield to live. Very enlightened for the time, he paid her a wage and signed over the property and land to Mary, which by now included the banks surrounding the house



and garden. This field her father had rescued from being sold for a caravan park. Later he paid her insurance stamp so that she would in time have an old age pension. Her father must have been very aware what Mary was giving up at thirty years of age, thought he might not live long and didn't want her to lose the house because of inheritance tax. Never one to look back and talk of what might have been, Mary made the most of life.

Having been baptised as a baby, and confirmed at 16, Mary became part of the congregation at Stalisfield. She was keen to look after the linen and to help with cleaning the church and brasses. There must have been quite a good membership of the church at that time as Mary was made to wait until she was forty before she was trusted to take this on and considered it an honour. These tasks she did faithfully for forty years until arthritis made it impossible to carry on.

Mr Bayley died in his nineties, a couple of years after we moved to the area. He was ill for a short while and friends rallied round taking it in turns to spend the night with him so that Mary could get some sleep. After he died, Mary never grumbled, and probably feeling dreadful, she had a list on the kitchen wall of tasks that needed to be done each day as she admitted that it was hard to keep going. Jill, their collie helped her get through her bereavement.

Growing Together in Wholeness - a very special day.

At 8.30 on the morning of 26th February the village hall was a hive of activity and by 9.15 a group of excited, determined people were ready to face the day. What was going on? The Healing and Wholeness team was hosting a study day for the first time, but would it be for the last time?

The team were ready; Dave in his yellow jacket to assist with parking, Sylvia and Laura at the door ready to greet and sign in those who had booked. Hilary and Chris were in the kitchen preparing the welcoming refreshments and Mark, Leigh, Ted and Arch were preparing their instruments. Phil and Christine from the Sittingbourne Christian bookshop, were setting up their book stand and I was waiting to greet our speaker Jennifer Rees Larcombe, author and founder of Beauty from Ashes retreat at Hadlow, near Tonbridge.

At 9.30 people began arriving and the hall started filling up. At 9.50 the team collected in the committee room for quiet time of prayer and preparation, then at 10 o'clock the welcome and short worship began. In her morning talk, Jennifer spoke of the challenges she had faced when confined to a wheelchair for eight years and the effect her healing had.

The morning flew by, and then came the logistical problem of setting up tables for lunch in a hall already packed with seated people. Many of the team members had made soup, and what a choice our guests were given. Many forwent their packed lunches as the aroma of the different soups filled the air. Somehow the tables

were set up and lunch began. The compliments flowed as much as the soup, teas and coffees. The tables were put away as quickly as they had been erected; the hall had gone from church, to dining hall and back to church without major problems.

The afternoon session began with a service led by Norman and Sylvia, then Jennifer held a question and answer session, an opportunity to ask Jennifer directly about healing.

The day finished with a healing service with the laying on of hands. At 4pm the day ended, everyone thanked Jennifer for an amazing day and she was given a bouquet of flowers in appreciation. farewells were said and the team put away all the chairs and equipment, feeling rather pleased with themselves as it was estimated we had served, and played host to 90 people from different parts of Kent.

Looking back the team are really pleased at how smoothly the day went, any problems that arose on the day were dealt with so well that nobody realised they had arisen. Would the team feel like tackling another day? Would they run screaming if it was suggested?

The team met to debrief and discuss the day; what went well; what we would do differently. The verdict was that the day was such a powerful and enriching day for all and it was decided, unanimously, that we would host another study day, in 15 months time.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the healing team for their dedication and for all that they each did to make the day so wonderful. They worked hard, tirelessly and I am proud to work along side them.

Luncheon at Otterden Place (1970)

I was always surprised that wine was seldom taken at luncheon. A few brought their own bottles, but many preferred the water that was provided on each individual table. There was no starter, as I recall, that being reserved for the evening supper, but the main meal was brought to table at about one p.m. This was always a wonderful meal. It could be Sole Veronique; Chicken Marengo; curry with every possible side dish; beef olives; sweetbreads or some other first rate dish. This was always well received by the residents and eaten with relish. Pudding could be anything from apple pie and cream; queen of puddings; fruit salad or some other nourishing hot sweet dish served with custard sauce, all followed by biscuits and cheese of several varieties. Once replete, the residents would retire to the drawing room for coffee. Here they could relax on sofas and easy chairs to chat and relate their day's affairs to their friends while sipping coffee from dainty cups, poured of course, from a silver pot. We staff, meanwhile, quiet and unobtrusive, would clear away each course, and serve the next as it came. After a certain time we retrieved the coffee cups from the drawing room to wash up in the butler's pantry. Later we would re-lay the dining room ready for supper at 7 p.m. and the library table would be set for afternoon tea at 4 p.m.
