EASTER - it's all about Jesus, follow the story....

Celebrate Palm Sunday 13th April

Jesus at the gates of Jerusalem

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, when the Church remembers how Jesus arrived at the gates of Jerusalem just a few days before the Passover was due to be held. He was the Messiah come to his own people in their capital city, and yet he came in humility, riding on a young donkey, not in triumph, riding on a war-horse.

As Jesus entered the city, the crowds gave him a rapturous welcome, throwing palm fronds into his path. They knew his reputation as a healer, and welcomed him. But sadly the welcome was short-lived and shallow, for Jerusalem would soon reject her Messiah, and put him to death. On this day churches worldwide will distribute little crosses made from palm fronds in memory of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem.

The Lord's Supper

7.30pm Holy Communion at Stalisfield Church



Thursday was important because it was on that night that Jesus first introduced the Lord's Supper, or what we nowadays call Holy Communion. Jesus and his close friends had met in a secret upper room to share the Passover meal together - for the last time. And there Jesus transformed the Passover into the Lord's Supper, saying, 'this is my body' and 'this is my blood' as he, the Lamb of God, prepared to die for the sins of the whole world. John's gospel makes it clear that the Last Supper took place the evening BEFORE the regular Passover meal, and that later Jesus died at the same time that the Passover lambs were killed.

The Canon's Column

The renewal of the year after the darkness and tempests of the winter, that's what spring is. Especially for gardeners and those who love outdoor activities. That's what Easter is all about too, renewal and new life. We celebrate winter with great delight around Christmas and then we often enter into our winter 'doldrums'. The season of Lent reflects this in its forty days of somberness (at least traditionally) and often expressed as our tiredness of the restrictions of winter. Spring on the other hand is renewal and new life; one only has to walk or drive around to see the explosion of daffodils and the whites, pinks and blues of the other spring flowers that are the living expression of this new life. Our celebration of Easter coincides with this and is the commemoration of the new spiritual life that is available to all of us through the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

For Good Friday this year, I am proposing that we have a series of services and walks with the cross. We will start at 12 noon, with a short service in Eastling church and then walk with the cross around the centre of the village. We will then drive to Belmont and those who can will walk to Throwley church accompanied by those who need to ride. After a short service at Throwley, we will then drive to Stalisfield church for a short service followed by a procession of cars and walkers as we carry the cross

to Stalisfield Green with a prayer and closing on the Green. Each service will include a prayer, a lesson, a meditation on the Cross, and a hymn.

The procession with the cross is a popular Good Friday activity in many places reminding us of the way of the cross taken by Jesus to his crucifixion outside Jerusalem. People all over the world have found it a meaningful way to acknowledge Good Friday and prepare for our Easter celebration.

As Easter is the most important day of our Christian year, we are fortunate to be able to have Easter communion in each church at the 10a.m. Easter Sunday services. This service is open to all. Those who are not communicants are always welcome at the communion rail to receive a blessing, for the scriptures tell us that we are all loved by God and welcome in his house and at his table.

I recently read a story about a woman who had felt far from God and focussed only on herself. debilitating stroke left her confined to a wheel chair and unable to speak intelligently for considerable time. Her first clear word was 'God'. Weeks later she said 'God is'. Her message became 'God is good' and she received months of blessing as she regularly said, 'God is good'.

In essence, this is the message of Easter. My Easter prayer is that all of you who read this may know in your lives that 'God is good'. (If you want to know more, please get in touch


Lester Amann considers the little donkey...

Why we should be like donkeys

Are you a pet-lover? Many people own a dog, a cat or a budgie, but most of us don't own a donkey! Yet in Bible times, donkeys were essential to daily life. They did everything from helping to grind corn, to ploughing, to carrying people, to transporting their belongings. Despite their small frame, donkeys are surprisingly tough. They are content with poor fodder like thistles, and can travel an average of 20 miles a day.

There are two occasions in the Christian calendar where donkeys walk into the picture. At Christmas, Mary travelled the 100 miles from Nazareth to Bethlehem on a donkey. And although a donkey doesn't get a specific mention in the manger story, that same one that transported her was probably there; where else would it have been?

On Palm Sunday Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a donkey. Jesus deliberately chose this animal rather than a horse. Why? In Bible times, the horse was associated with war, conquest and worldly might. But the donkey was a symbol of peace and humility.



Perhaps that is something we should learnto wait for Jesus our Master, to be always obedient to him, to serve him with all our hearts, and to bear the mark of his grace in our lives.
