

Accordingly, the Trustees have taken the decision to keep the gardens and grounds open for visitors, free of charge, and we hope that you will take the opportunity to enjoy the fresh air and quiet serenity of our gardens during this period. Our priority is to ensure you have a safe visit - we will maintain a high standard of cleanliness around the gardens and would ask you to respect other people's personal space in order to minimise both the risk of any infection and the spread of the virus.

With subsequent investigation, the Shelters to the front of the school were also located and the entrances are now being re-built to provide access.

Mary researched various archives to learn the background to this period of

the school, but the most valuable information was provided by the 'girls' themselves who attended the School at that time. Some of them were then photographed in the Shelters that were originally used for their lessons as teenagers. Mary's talk finished all too soon, but she has produced

a book (which the majority of us purchased) with all the information, paintings and first hand quotations that went towards making that time in history come alive. The proceeds go towards opening up and maintaining the entrances to further Shelters found to the front of the School premises.

Maidstone Grammar School does allow organised visits by Primary Schools to the Wartime Shelters, as the Second Word War is now part of the curriculum for that age group. Please contact the School to organise a visit.

Lent to Easter 2020

It is the season of Lent, in terms of Church seasons as I write. Lent that is officially 40 days leading towards Easter with its remembering of Jesus' death on the cross and his resurrection on the 3rd day.

Lent lasts for 40 days, which is the length of time that Jesus spent in the wilderness, fasting. Matthew, in his gospel, gives what I think as the biggest understatement in the bible:

Matthew 4:2

After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry.

I should think he was!

Lent has often been the time when people have given up something for the season, for example chocolate. I am coming across stories of people doing something extra for the 40 days of Lent. Doing something positive during this time.

Quite a few years ago, I joined in with many from my church, with a project called 'Faith comes through Hearing'. It was designed for the season of Lent and the idea is that you listen to a portion of the New Testament being read each day for the 40 days. Right, I said, I can do

this. I purchased the pack and put the first cassette tape into the cassette player in my car and off I went.

Now I realise that has already dated me! Faith comes through Hearing has moved through the CD phase now to downloading onto a Smart device!

So I set off on my 40 day journey, as it were, and I was really pleased with myself as I managed not to miss a single day. They say pride comes before a fall, though, and having not missed a single day in those 40 days, and having reached the end of Revelation 22, I was mighty puzzled to discover that there was still a week to go before Easter - I had finished on Palm Sunday.

What had gone wrong? Had I miscounted and missed some days? I was sure that I hadn't. Had 'Faith Comes through Hearing' made a fundamental mistake? I thought that was unlikely. I looked back and, yes, I had listened to 40 days of recordings.

It was only when I spoke with someone else that I discovered my mistake. Traditionally, in the Church, Sundays are not counted as part of the 40 days of Lent as they are feast days.

I was told recently that our former friend and colleague, Gordon Sherwood, usually gave up chocolate biscuits for Lent, but then would say with a smile on his face, that he always ate one on a Sunday!

However the days of Lent are counted, it is a time, in the Church, of reflection and remembering what God is about, through His son, Jesus, in his relationship with human beings that is particularly shown in the events of the Cross and Resurrection that we will celebrate at Easter. The events that reveal the perfect love of God in His relationship with human beings.

This year, we are going through the season of Lent and looking towards Easter with the daily news of what is happening in terms of the spread and effects of the 'Covid19' virus.

As I write there are reports of panic buying and general fear of what might be in our Nation. (I am writing after the move from containment to delay).

I am reminded of a verse from what we know as the first letter written by the disciple John:

1 John 4:18

There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear.

As I write I cannot know where we will be, but I pray that we will as a nation, and as neighbours, find a way to show love to one another and to continue to care for those in need even if it means having to go out of our way and do something extra or if it means having to give up something that we would normally do.

After all that is part of who we are called to be as human beings, called to love and be loved.

Church minister was inspiration behind 'Great Escape'

A Church of Scotland minister nicknamed 'Padre Mac' has been named as the inspiration behind the Great Escape.

The Revd Professor Murdo Ewen Macdonald's "fiery sermons" motivated the famous breakout of a German Prisoner of War camp in March 1944, according to an author.Dr Linda Barker said the Great Escape is often heralded as a plan masterminded by English officers, and the theme tune to the 1963 film of the same name is sung by England football fans.

The theologian has been given credit for a minor role in hiding tunnel sand in the famous break-out over the course of a year. However, the historian claims his influence was possibly far more significant, as he had previously made his own escape while in transit to a PoW camp.

He was a chaplain for the men of Stalag Luft III, including RAF Squadron Leader Roger Bushell, who has always been known as the mastermind of the Great Escape.

Dr Parker is the author of "Nearer My God to Thee: Airborne Chaplains in the Second World War," which examines the full story of padres who accompanied the airborne forces to all theatres of war between 1942-1945.

"Murdo Ewen Macdonald, known as Padre Mac, may have been the 'inspiration that led to many great escapes' during the Second World War," she said. "He was moved to Stalag Luft III, where the Great Escape would take place in March 1944. Here, he befriended Roger Bushell, and Harry 'Wings' Day, both instigators and organisers of the Great Escape.

"As a chaplain, he would have had access to all the troops and would have been able to speak with them, in confidence, to motivate them with the story of his own escape attempt."



Why Easter will never go away

How do you make sense of the Resurrection? Dead men don't rise, so why believe that this particular dead man did rise?



At the end of St Luke's Gospel we read that: "they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement" (Luke 24.4). This is highly significant. The Gospels do not show us a group of disciples who were in a receptive frame of mind. After the crucifixion, they were in hiding, frightened and scattered. Then suddenly, they came out of hiding and were totally different; excited, joyful. By Pentecost they were confident, with one firm message: "You crucified Jesus, but God raised him up!"

How did they know this? Because of direct personal experience. Some of them had visited the tomb of Jesus: it was empty. Others claimed to have seen and touched the risen Lord. Were they

hallucinating? People can hallucinate in groups – when taking drugs, for example. But, of course each one will see a different hallucination. But the disciples all saw the same thing. Or rather, the same person. Jesus.

Were they lying? Jesus had died a humiliating death as a criminal. Perhaps they wanted to rescue His good name. So did they pretend they had seen Him?

This theory has a big problem. Their preaching led them into trouble with the authorities. They were beaten and imprisoned and some of them killed. People will die for ideas and causes which they believe in passionately. But not for things they have made up. We might suffer for our convictions, we will not suffer for our inventions.

What about the 'swoon' theory? That Jesus didn't die on the cross, despite terrible wounds. He recovered in the tomb, and then escaped. The disciples nursed Him back to health. But Roman soldiers knew when a man was dead; and there was the guard on the tomb. Also, the events which followed simply don't fit. If the disciples had been hiding Jesus, they would have kept very low-key, and out of the way, so that the authorities did not come after Him again.

Besides, to preach that God had raised Jesus from the dead – which is exactly what they did preach – would have been a lie. Beatings and threat of death would soon have loosened their tongues. Inventions crumble under pressure; convictions hold fast.

Another reason for believing in the Resurrection is this: Jesus' continuing impact. Thousands and soon millions of people in every generation since have shared an inescapable sense of being 'accompanied' through life. Though unseen, they identify this presence as the Risen Lord. Sometimes this experience of meeting Jesus is gentle and fitful.

Sometimes it is dramatic and life-changing. This reminds us that the resurrection of Jesus is not just an interesting historical puzzle. It is a vital, present day reality. It brings wonderful comfort, assuring us of the central Christian truths: death is dead; Jesus is alive; God is love.

This central notion was captured, most movingly, by the great Albert Schweitzer: 'He came to those men who knew Him not. He speaks to us the same word: "Follow thou me", and sets us to the tasks which He has to fulfil for our time. He commands. And to those who obey Him, whether they be wise or simple, He will reveal Himself in the toils, the conflicts, the suffering which they shall pass through in His fellowship, and, as ineffable mystery, they shall learn in their own experience who He is.'

Have a joyful – and a challenging – Easter.

The spread of Coronavirus

Thorough and frequent hand washing with soap and water is recommended by the World Health Organisation as the first step to prevent the spread of the Coronavirus.

I don't know who first said, "Cleanliness is next to Godliness", but you won't find that phrase in the Bible. Ritual washings are practised by many religions, but they usually signify spiritual cleansing, not physical sanitisation. Piety isn't a substitute for hygiene, nor vice versa.

The Coronavirus, now called Covid-19, has been a daily news item for months, with the result that fear is spreading more rapidly than the disease itself. Stock markets throughout the world have plummeted; sales of disinfectant have soared. Sports fixtures have been cancelled, whole towns have been quarantined and worldwide trade is threatened.

Statistics change hourly, so anything quoted here will be out of date by the time you read it, but we need to put this plague (if that is what it is) into perspective. Do you remember the Ebola epidemic which swept through regions of Africa from 2014 onwards? More than one in three sufferers died from that virus, but there's now a

vaccine which can be used when Ebola threatens. Past influenza pandemics have been nowhere near as severe. 'Asian Flu' in 1957, led to 3,550 deaths in England and Wales, or something like 2.4% of actual cases. In 2009, the fatality figure for the swine flu epidemic was about 0.026%. The figures for today's Covid-14 virus suggest that around 80% of cases are mild, 14% develop severe symptoms, 4% become critically ill and the death rate is 2%.

This virus was first publicised by Doctor Li Wenliang, who was detained and censured by the Chinese police for "spreading false rumours". Although he himself subsequently died of the disease, there can be no doubt that his courage saved many lives. There are echoes here of words from St John's Gospel: "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends." As for the people of China where the virus originated, the Bishop of Newcastle, Christine Hardman, tweeted a Sri Lankan poster, which shows the right Christian attitude. It says, "HATE THE VIRUS, NOT THE CHINESE. Let's pray for them instead". Amen.

And do wash your hands.

The Hubble Space Telescope was launched 30 years ago, on 24th April 1990. It was named after Edwin Hubble, an outstanding expert on extragalactic astronomy in the 1920s and 1930s.

The launch, originally scheduled for 1983, had been delayed by technical and budget problems and by the Challenger disaster. Ironically the NASA error that caused the Challenger tragedy was similar to the one that led to the Hubble telescope being launched with a defective mirror – unwillingness to accept technical warnings when there was great pressure from above to go ahead.

In the case of the Hubble telescope, also built by NASA with help from the European Space Agency, a more basic machine revealed the problem with the mirror, but those in charge did not believe it because a newer, more complex machine had given the go-ahead.

The problem was put right by astronauts in 1993 – the telescope was always designed to be serviced in orbit – and since then its position outside the Earth's atmosphere has enabled it to record many detailed visible light images that have enabled scientists a deep view into space, leading to new theories in astrophysics.

The telescope is estimated to remain in working order until 2030-2040.
