





#### Christian Basics: What On Earth Is The Church?

'The local church is the hope of the world' (Bill Hybels). Our experience of church can be disappointing or frustrating; yet we mustn't lose this vision of God's purpose for the church. The New Testament offers us a number of pictures to explore this purpose:

#### 1. The People of God

The New Testament word for 'church' is ekklesia, which describes an assembly of people. This makes the point that church 3. A Holy Temple is not essentially buildings or services, but a community of people belonging to God and committed to sharing his love in the world. But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light (1 Peter 2:9). With people increasingly experiencing 'belonging before believing', it is vital to provide both a c ongregational experience and small groups in our church life.

#### 2. The Body of Christ

The church is Christ's body on earth, *The* body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ (1 Corinthians 12:12). While

every Christian has a vital part to play in the life and growth of the body, Paul warns us (1 Cor.12) about the wrong attitudes that will stop the body from working effectively. We have to avoid both feelings of inferiority (ie 'I have nothing to offer') or superiority (ie 'I don't need you'). We all have a unique contribution to make, using our different gifts, experience and perspective.

The church is also described as a holy temple, the expression of God's presence on earth. You also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ (1 Peter 2:5). As living stones, unlike bricks, we don't uniformly fit together. Instead, like in a dry stone wall, we are hand-selected and shaped in order to fit with each other. The church is a place where our lives are shaped to be increasingly more like Jesus, as the edges are knocked off through our relationships with others. This is why our experience of church is sometimes painful; however let's not forget that God is still committed to work through his church to bring hope to our world!



We saw the celebrations of a Russian Orthodox Easter while we were there. It starts the weekend before Easter, when the community gathers in the parks on the Saturday to tidy them after winter. The women buy bunches of willow twigs to take home to 'beat out the devil' on the Sunday, which is called Willow Sunday.

Mothers make Easter bread, a cross between bread and cake, which is decorated on top. They use any container that will go in the oven, even old fruit cans.

#### WE BEHOLD THE GLORY

TQ – Tingle Quotient – is the name given to things that produce a tingle down the spine or a frisson of excitement. It may be a piece of music or the sight of an evening sunset at sea or a newborn baby. We look, we hear, and what we look at or hear evokes a sense of wonder and amazement that has an almost physical effect on us. Something sublime unfolds before us producing delight and awe: a hint of glory that leads us to wonder and even to worship.

I think the monk who lived in cell no 6 at the Dominican convent of San Marco, must have felt that when he entered his room and saw for the first time the fresco of the series of frescoes for the convent, from the High Altar to the Chapter House, to the cells of the monks. Here in cell no 6 there is a restrained simplicity and directness about the Transfiguration. One of the three disciples looks out towards us, while the other two are caught up in wonder and awe as they look on

From 1436 Fra Angelico painted a whole

Jesus with the faces of Moses and Elijah on Here Fra Angelico is not seeking to impress a

wealthy patron: he is providing a focus for devotion and prayer for the monks of his community. The scene speaks to us of that sense of awe and reverence. On August 6th we celebrate the feast of the Transfiguration. The Gospel accounts relate that special moment of revelation to the inner group of disciples. The glory shown to them evoked a sense of wonder and marvel, but also a sense

of loss. For the glory proved elusive and just out of human reach. The moment of revelation passed, and the disciples had to go down the mount again to meet the crying needs of the world, all but forgotten when they were with their Lord on the mountain top.

The monk in his cell would ponder the glory of Fra Angelico's fresco, knowing that he would be called from his cell to take up his monastic duties. But the painting would go with him to sustain and nurture his life. It is the same with us: we have moments of glory. But they pass, and we must return to our daily lives. As we look on this painting, we sense that glory and wonder which can sustain us through life. As Thomas Jones says in his poem on this episode: Like a pearl we hold Close to our hearts what we have heard

# **My Stable Diary**

My working Life with Granville Wheler. by Audrey Keen



It was August in 1981, and time to condition Numa, Mr. Wheler's riding horse, in preparation for the coming Rural Ride at Stalisfield in September. After being groomed and rested, I took Numa for a long hack. Our exercises always encompassed the loveliness of the estate, as it was then. On this

occasion we saw two sandy coloured foxes playing along the trackway known as Upper Adit, yellow hammers in the big hedge along Rocky Lane and wood rooks that settled on the wire fence beside us. It was a lovely, lovely day, so many wild flowers lined our track: wild willow herb, pink centaury, purple thistle and pink mallow, all spread along the embankment. The hazel nuts were forming and the bramble leaves were turning red. I stopped for a few minutes to speak to a farmer on his tractor and then we moved on further. The length of the grassland, known affectionately as the 'pastoral walk', was very comfortable for Numa to walk on. My father had mown the grass here recently and it was as neat as a lawn. Teasels grew along the wood edge, where honey fungus formed on the tree roots. Heath butterflies and horse flies were brought out by the muggy weather tat had developed but, all in all, it was a very pleasant day. Everywhere the smell of blackberries, bracken, nettles and pine - a sure sign that autumn was coming. We took the walk back to the stables in a leisurely way, Numa flicking his tail against the flies and nibbling the purple flowers from the thistles when he could.

# **PILGRIM PLACES: Canterbury (part 2)**

today, almost certainly named after Martin of Tours (died 397), the former soldier turned monk who evangelised Gaul.

If this is indeed the site where Queen Bertha and later her husband Ethelbert worshipped, then what a Christian heritage is here. Just think of it! In this year of grace 2008 we can stand by St Martin's Church and know that, without a break, Trinitarian worship has been offered on this site for at least 1400 years! That makes St Martin's the oldest place of continuous worship in the land.

From Canterbury Augustine and his monks began their evangelism and in a short time King Ethelbert professed the Christian faith and was baptised. Ethelbert's kingdom stretched as far north as the river Humber and he readily gave permission to Augustine to carry the gospel across his kingdom.

Many pagans were converted to Christianity and while Bede's story that Augustine baptised ten thousand converts on one day is certainly an exaggeration, there is no doubt that the work of evangelism made great advance.

Augustine only lived a few years after his

arrival in England. He died in 604/605, having been earlier consecrated Archbishop of Canterbury. That made Augustine the first Archbishop of the English Church in a line that stretches from Augustine to the present Archbishop, Rowan Williams. Because Augustine had made Canterbury his head-quarters and began building a church there, Canterbury was known as his 'seat.' The Latin word for 'seat' is cathedra, hence Canterbury Cathedral.

Down the centuries Canterbury Cathedral has reflected the tides of history in the country. In the 12th century King Henry II took notice of a well-educated young man who was an agent for the Archbishop, Theobald. The young man's name was Thomas Becket (1120 - 1170). Henry made him Lord Chancellor of England and the two men became close friends.

When Theobald died Becket was made Archbishop in 1162. But if Henry thought that Becket would do whatever the King wished he was soon disappointed...
