RUTH

The Book of Ruth is one of the shortest in the Old Testament and it tells the story of a girl who came from Moab. Ruth married one of 2 brothers, both of whom died. Her husband's mother decided to leave Mo ab and return home to Bethlehem. Orpah, the wife of the other brother, stayed in Moab but rather than leave Naomi, old and alone, Ruth went with her saying, 'Where you go, I will go; your people shall be my people, and your God.'

Ruth and Naomi were poor and had to search for food but were protected by Naomi's relative Boaz. In time Boaz married Ruth and they had a son called Obed who in turn was grandfather to King David, the founder of the royal line which led to the birth of another boy at Bethlehem, the baby Jesus.

Naomi and Ruth both knew what it was to be a stranger in a foreign land but they supported each other. The story of Ruth shows us the love and loyalty that can hold a single family together.

If you have a patch of ground where you can grow borage bees, will come; if vou have sunflowers vou will attract chaffinches and

greenfinch; a covered pond with a small side opening will encourage badgers may drink and of course a bird table, set away from predators such as cats and sparrow hawks, is a great help to small song birds. A rough patch of ground will allow bees to make their home underground and mice and numerous birds will all find something to attract them there. The sunflowers also provide nectar for the bees and other birds as well as the finches: all will eat the seeds that fall. 
