

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The Canon's Column

The discussion in the lunchroom had moved through several topics and then someone brought up the item in the news about an initiative to change the abortion laws to permit late term abortions in certain cases. The conversation threatened to become too polarized and serious for our remaining lunch time when one woman, whose two youngest children, a boy and a girl, were both into the raging hormonal adolescent stage said in a tired voice, "I would support late term abortion if it was extended to age sixteen." It was the voice of frustration and exhaustion in dealing with the chronic chaos that two teenagers can bring to a home and a parent's life. Did she really mean what she said? Of course not. She was quietly floundering in the volatile atmosphere of her family life, and giving vent to her pressure and stress.

We all laughed at her statement, took it for what it was and moved back to our afternoons at our desks.

Lord Carrey, in his recent statement of support for assisted death, has indicated he has made this change in his position out of the frustration of standing by while someone goes through the pain and despair of the last months of a terminal condition. He is correct in pointing out that many people today survive far longer with certain conditions than they did a generation ago because of the advancement of modern medicine. The advancements have given many people six months to five years or even longer of productive fulfilling life. In some cases this has been an opportunity to renew, restore or rebuild relationships with families and friends that have been life giving. But a downside to the advances in medical treatment is that many people

have been kept alive long past the time when they would have died naturally previously; this extension of life has not been life giving but rather life sapping for family, friends and the individual as pain and incapacity rob them of dignity, control and hope. This is where the frustration builds and the questions are asked about assisted death.

The unfortunate part of this is that changes to laws and rules always have ramifications that were never intended at the time of writing, debating and passing. The permission and acceptance of assisted death and its practice could be the simple slim end of the wedge to things we barely can conceive at the present.

While now, most cases of assisted death we hear or read about show the deep agony and hopelessness of a parent or an adult child dealing with either chronic or the acute health problems of a beloved family member. The decision to act to end someone's life has been made, most often when people are forced to cope alone without the proper care and support of an engaged and committed community.

In the midst of our frustrations, despair and depression, are there other options? One of the important and beneficial resources is the hospice and palliative care movement that seeks to provide a full range of appropriate care and support for individuals approaching death as well as for their families and friends. This support includes at-home, or in a hospice centre, nursing care with proper specialized pain management, often with a specialist physician on call, plus a range of social, psychological and spiritual support from trained practitioners. Many individuals and families have found that this type of palliative care has provided a dignified and peaceful death experience for the individual and his or her family.

This is not a yes or no question but rather a what else question. Are there other ways of dealing with a situation which do not bring us to contemplate proactively causing someone to die?

How does our faith and our world connect? We often wonder about the connection between what we do at work and what we believe.

Worth Thinking About

is an attempt to answer this question. From time to time, three or four times per year, we will arrange for a speaker to have dinner with us and share the integration of his/her work and faith. Our first speaker will be the Honourable Mayann E Francis, the former Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Nova Scotia, Canada. Her Honour grew up in industrial Cape Breton, her father was a priest in a working class neighbourhood. She has had a distinguished career in public service in New York State and in the Provinces of Ontario and Nova Scotia and was Ombudsman and CEO of the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission before becoming Lieutenant-Governor.

The second speaker in our series will be Robert White, a retired official from the Foreign Office, who will speak on his work with refugees and the UN Convention on Refugees. This dinner will be in November or January.

We will endeavour to find other speakers of a similar calibre, who can speak from the experience of integrating their values and their faith and their work life.

position. Nowadays, we Christians may take those two aspects of belief for granted, but that was not always the case. It is clear that in OT times people struggled to understand. One God or lots of gods? Did not every tribe, every community have its own god? And were not these gods irascible, needing to be pleased or placated? Monotheism, or belief in One God, was a gradual development from polytheism. Alongside grew the conviction that this one God had marked out humanity for his favour, with special attention given to a downtrodden, nomadic collection of

humans and given us a privileged

Hebrew tribes. We know now that the Psalmist was mistaken to imagine that all he could see was the sum total of all that there is. Our planet, far from being pivotal, was like one of those specks of Sahara sand on which I was standing. And yet such a Creator God knows and cares about each one of us.

Jesus fit in the cosmos? What would the writer of the Psalm make of him? The Psalmist was already overawed at the majesty of the night sky, and bowled over to think that the same Creator had any regard for mankind, never mind a particular interest in the Hebrew people. How much more astonished would he have been to discover that the One God whom we believe to be the Source of everything, would at a given point in time and space, enter the womb of a teenage Hebrew girl: Mary, the Mother of Jesus?

Jesus is the 'Word', the idea which brought something out of nothing, and then lived alongside us. He taught us to address the Creator as Father. His and ours. He invited us to take his hand as our friend. The way is hazardous. We cannot go it alone. The One who calls us will help us to recognise all that is genuine and to spot where our true future lies. All this is the work of the Holy Spirit at work within us.

He has made us 'a little lower than the angels and crowned us with glory and honour.'

The Council was pleased that the cranes had been moved in to take down the tall trees at the back of Meeson"s Close and Glebe Cottages. Centennial of the Outbreak of the First World War

This month marks the one hundredth anniversary of the beginning of the war that was to end all wars.

Bishop Trevor has asked us to commemorated this centenary with some sort of focus on the first Sunday or Monday of the month, the 4th of August, 1914, was the actual of the declaration of war against Germany, after its invasion of Belgium.

In the churches of the Benefice of High Downs, we are going to commemorate this centennial in two ways:

At each service between the first Sunday of August and Remembrance Sunday, we will begin our service with the lighting of a peace candle and praying for peace in our world.

The second part of our commemoration will be the publishing and distribution of a booklet of prayers for peace in our world. This booklet will be available in each church for people to take home, from the first Sunday of August. Through these to endeavours we want to encourage our communities to develop a focus on the need for peace in our world. Perhaps something will come out of these prayers and a new peace initiative will come about.

Copies of the booklet will be available in St. Mary's Church, Eastling, St Mary's Church, Stalisfield, St Lawrence Church, Otterden, and the Church of St Michael and All Angels, Throwley, following their first services during August. Prayer makes a difference!

100 years ago:

Throughout August 1914, following the outbreak of WW1 on 28th July, the following events took place:

1st Germany declared war on the Soviet Union


2nd Germany occupied Luxembourg. 3rd Germany declared war on France. 4th Germany invaded Belgium; Britain declared war on Germany.

6th Austria-Hungary declared war on Russia; Serbia declared war on Germany.

7th Germany invaded France. 10th France declared war on Austria-Hungary; Austria-Hungary invaded Russia.

12th Britain declared war on Austria-Hungary.

18th The USA declared itself neutral. 20th Germany captured Brussels. 23rd Japan declared war on Germany. 23rd British troops in Mons, Belgium, delayed Germany's advance into France.

Great War Memorial at Otterden

Do you believe the motoring myths?



Many of us drivers waste money and risk damaging our cars because of the 'motor myths' going

around. For example, do you think that premium fuel is good for cars every now and then? False. High-grade fuel is suitable only for high-performance cars. What about the idea that it's best to fit new tyres to the front axle? False. Having more grip on the REAR axle improves stability on slippery roads. Should your car be warmed up before driving off? No. The engine will warm up more quickly, use less fuel and pump out fewer carbon emissions if you drive at once.

Finally, what about running the fuel tank near to empty in order to help clean it? False. Fuel tanks do not 'self clean', and driving with little or no fuel can be almost as damaging to your vehicle as putting in the wrong fuel.
