This picture makes my heart sing. Why? Because here you see life. And young people enjoying life. And some older people facilitating that enjoyment of life...and pretty much enjoying it too (even on 3 hours sleep!)

Last month, we enabled our two benefice youth groups from Stalisfield and Lynsted to get together for a 24 hour campout – under canvas, with campfire, team challenges, conversation and eating. When working with young people, food is central to the plan.

At the end of the weekend it was commented that this short time had been 'life affirming' not 'life draining'. So often, when we think of doing things for others, it can feel like an inconvenience, or something we just can't fit into our busy lives, or we don't feel we are capable, or we're too old, or, or, or....or a plenitude of reasons. It's very easy to confuse what might be affirming, as draining.

The thing is, giving to others, blessing others even if it feels hard, actually blesses us. Not that we do things for reward, but inevitably, we feel



rewarded deep inside. We feel good about ourselves and thankful that we put that extra effort in to bring life to others.

The bible is peppered with stories of hospitality – making others feel welcome, offering people food and drink, creating spaces for others to feel at home, or to know they are loved. Everyone can take encouragement from these stories of being Christ-like as we have probably all shown kindness and welcome to others in our lives.

But how do we go the extra mile to do these things when we're tired, or don't feel like giving any more?

This quote might help.

'Around us life bursts forth with miracles, a glass of water, a ray of sunshine, a

leaf, a caterpillar, a flower, laughter, raindrops. If you live in awareness, it is easy to see miracles everywhere. Each human being is a multiplicity of miracles. Eyes that see thousands of colours, shapes and forms; ears that hear a bee flying or a thunderclap; a brain that ponders a speck of dust as easily as the entire cosmos; a heart that beats in rhythm with the heartbeat of all beings. When we feel tired by life's daily struggles we may not notice these miracles, but they are always there. The sights and sounds of the world are not your enemies. Your enemy is forgetfulness.'

I heard this quote from a Buddhist Monk, Thich Nhat Hanh, that resonated with my Christian faith and helped me realise why I do what I do. I don't want to forget how precious life is. I don't want others to forget either. If Jesus' primary mission was to enable us to live life in all it's fullness, maybe we all need a daily dose of awareness of the wonder of life and perhaps we will have that motivation to go out and bless others with that wonder as well.

And so I pray this month, that you may also discover those life-affirming moments that make your heart sing and bring you great blessing.



#### John Bunyan, the writer of Pilgrim's Progress

A fter the Bible, John Bunyan's wonderful Christian allegory, the Pilgrim's Progress, is one of the most celebrated and widely-read books in the English language. It has been translated into more than 100 languages around the world and keeps its place as a Christian classic. Names of people and places from its pages have been commonplace wherever English is spoken. We need only recall Mr Great-Heart, Mr Valiant-for-Truth, Giant Despair, Madame Bubble, the Slough of Despond, Vanity Fair, the Delectable Mountains, the Hill Difficulty and the Celestial City.

John was born on 28 November 1628, at Elstow, near Bedford, England, of a poor family. He had little formal education and his father taught him to be a metal worker. His first wife died young. His second wife, Elizabeth, helped him considerably with his blossoming literary career. His conversion was the result of reading the Bible, and the witness of local Christians. From that time the Bible became the great inspiration of his life. He wrote more than 50 books on Christianity. A Baptist by conviction, he had little time for the Established Church.

Bunyan became a popular preacher, but because of his opposition to the Established Church and because he did not have a Church of England preaching licence, he was imprisoned in 1661. It was in prison that he wrote Pilgrim's Progress. It was not only Bunyan's greatest book, but was destined to become one of the most popular Christian books in the world.

Pilgrim's Progress is an allegory, using the names of people and places from the Bible to teach spiritual

lessons. The vivid and unforgettable imagery in the Pilgrim's Progress covers the whole Christian gospel from sin and condemnation all the way through faith, repentance, grace, justification, sanctification, and perseverance to heaven itself.

Bunyan died on 31<sup>st</sup> August 1688. His portrayal of the death of Mr Valiant For Truth is Bunyan at his allegorical best. This brave old soldier of Jesus Christ had received his summons to 'go home.' Calling his friends together he says, "'My sword I give to him who shall succeed me in my pilgrimage ... My marks and scars I carry with me, to be a witness for me, that I have fought His battles, Who will now be my rewarder." ... So he passed over, and all the trumpets sounded for him on the other side...'

#### **Updates from Citizens Advice Swale**

## What can you do if your package holiday goes wrong?

Most of us have a lovely time when we go away.

But if something goes wrong with your package holiday, tell the company or travel agent you booked with straight away. If you don't say anything until you get home, you might get less or no compensation at all.

If the holiday you went on turned out to be lower in value than the one you booked you can make a claim for 'loss of value'. For example you paid for a deluxe room but got a standard one, if it wasn't sorted out at the time you can claim back the difference in value.

You can also claim 'out-of-pocket expenses' for any extra money you spend while away, for example the hotel was a bus ride away from the beach rather than across the road as advertised. If this happens make sure you keep your receipts.


If big parts of the trip you booked didn't happen or services weren't provided, you can make a claim for 'loss of enjoyment'. Any claim you make must be reasonable. You can't get compensation if you simply didn't enjoy the holiday or if the problem was out of the holiday company's control like bad weather.


If you don't get the service you've been promised, you may be entitled to compensation for breach of contract. You might also be able to claim from your travel insurance.

## Vicky and John foster carers for Kent County Council

I am Vicky and alongside my husband John, we have been Fostering with Kent County Council since June 2020.

After having my own children, my two girls and with 19 years of nursery life experience in an early year setting. I was ready to and wanted to embrace a new adventure. Fostering had always been at the back of my mind.

We came together as a family to discuss this next adventure as it wouldn't just be John and myself, our girls would also play a huge part in our fostering role. We all felt happy to go ahead with our application and were now ready to take the next step.

The information evenings were so valuable to us learning about fostering and it was so helpful to speak with carers who had been fostering for some time. We felt very at ease asking any questions that we wanted to know and listened to the amazing stories from some of the carers.

We started the initial process and felt really connected and supported with our assessing social worker. She got

to know us very well and the girls enjoyed doing lovely activities with her. When it came to the day of the Fostering Panel, I was very nervous, but they were all so welcoming and very professional in their roles and made a very nerve-racking time go lovely and smooth. It was such a memorable experience.

We chose Kent County Council to foster as we had done a lot of research and believed that this Council were the most supportive of their carers. Which has turned out to be so true! Kent lives up to that standard. As foster carers we have always felt supported by our fostering social worker and reassured that they will be on hand to answer any questions that we have via the phone or will respond to our emails as soon as they can. The six weekly supervisions are a great space to share any worries around the child/children you have at the time, and we are always asked how we are feeling/coping/ managing and how our girls were adjusting to these changes at home.

When we moved on the children that we were caring for to adoption we had such fantastic support for our girls from our Fostering Social Worker. She came to our home and made lovely creative pieces for all the children to keep. They were told they could call her at any time if they needed to talk about this process. What really stood out was that Kent Fostering supported us as a family. They recognise that every member of our family is important and included in our journey.

As a very proud foster carer for Kent, I must share with you the wide range of training available and it's so easy to access such as with online training, face to face training and outstanding conferences that fill you with such knowledge. You can achieve even more by doing level 3 and level 4 Diplomas. I have found all the training of such good quality and learnt so much in such a short time. I honestly cannot rate this highly enough.

We are enjoying our roles as foster carers. It's not just a job though, you open your house, family, and heart to help these vulnerable children and being a key part in helping these children change their little lives around......it is just so rewarding! It is hard to explain but being able to watch children grow and flourish is the most beautiful feeling in the world, and to know that we have made that happen as a family gives us such happiness.

Our birth children are thanked and rewarded for being young carers. My girls join in with fantastic activities such as pizza making workshops, water sports and many more! They have made some fantastic fostering family friends and they have also joined the Children Who Care council and feel they have a strong voice in helping care for these children.

I would really encourage anyone who is thinking about fostering to do it. We have met some great friends in our fostering role, and we never feel alone. We are like a big family, and it is the most supported role I have ever had. It was and still is the best decision we made to foster and to foster with Kent, and I look forward to many more years of fostering with the Kent Fostering Team.


## Calling for an end to Op Brock delays

We've all been there. Whether it's the morning commute, a lunchtime errand, or nipping out to pick up the kids from school – almost everyone in Kent has had a 20-minute trip turned into a nightmare thanks to traffic caused by Operation Brock.

I'm sure, like mine, hearts across the county will have sunk at the news that it's set to restart in July.

Although it's disruptive, Op Brock makes sense when responding to exceptional circumstances, like strikes or extreme weather. But this latest deployment appears to be in preparation for summer holiday traffic – something that happens every year.

Blocking up Kent's roads every time there's a school holiday or delays at the ports isn't a long-term solution. It's not fair



on people stuck in jams, it's not fair on families stuck at home, and it's not fair on our local businesses either.

Take the wonderful Leeds Castle as an example. In the summer holidays families come from far and wide to visit, and the money that raises helps to keep the castle going over the winter. But when the M20's jammed it puts lots of people off going. The castle simply can't survive if that happens every summer.

That's why straight after receiving the news of the latest Brock deployment I sent a letter to the Transport Secretary Mark Harper. I made it clear that Kent is bearing the brunt of a national issue, and we need a national solution as soon as possible.

I asked him what ministers are doing to reduce the reliance on Op Brock, and when we can expect a permanent, alternative plan. I also asked when the resurfacing of the M20, which was postponed in December because of Op Brock, will be rescheduled.

The next step will be arranging a meeting with the Roads Minister to discuss this in more detail. I will do whatever I can to speed things up, and I know that other Kent MPs will too. Local bodies like Kent Highways have got bags of knowledge about this issue, and we need to bring people together to find a way forward.

Kent is the UK's gateway to Europe, but it's also our home. I'm going to keep fighting for a solution which recognises that.

In the meantime, please do get in touch with my office to report if you're affected. The more information we have, the louder our voice will be.
