A Reflection for Christmas

There were shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flocks by night.

Luke 2.8

After centuries of prophecy and promise, when we finally come to the moment of the Messiah's birth. how does the story start? "There were shepherds...."

Shepherds were near the bottom of the social pile in ancient Israel. The nature of their work precluded them from sharing in the necessary religious rites and rituals. They couldn't leave their sheep, so they were unable to get to synagogue or Temple. They could not join in the prayers, hear the Law, or offer their sacrifices. They simply 'abided' in the fields - they lived there, the fields were their 'abode'.

And it was these ordinary people, going about their ordinary business, to whom the 'angel of the Lord' appeared. The 'glory of the

It all seems a bit of an anti-climax. lord' shone around them. The dark night was illuminated by the very presence of God. No wonder they were 'sore afraid'!

> And the message, when it came, was no less startling. It concerned the moment their nation had been praying for, awaiting with a hope and expectation that years of disappointment had slowly eroded. God had heard the prayers of his people. The long-promised Messiah had been born.

> This day is born to you in the city of David a Saviour, Christ the Lord. The announcement could not have been more stark and clear. The Messiah (Christ, in Greek) had been born, to be Saviour of his people. And this handful of social outcasts on the hills were the first people on earth to know about it.

They were given a 'sign' to enable them to identify this particular baby. They might have expected that he would be wearing royal robes and lying in the arms of a princess. But in fact he would be found wearing 'swaddling cloths' - the simple linen bandages with which poor people bound up the new-born infant - and lying in a feeding trough.

The whole scene is one that turns normal expectations upside down. By the standards of the time there was nothing squalid about a birth in a place where cattle were kept - every rural home would have recognised the scene. But it was a setting of utter simplicity, shorn of anything that would suggest rank, power or wealth. It was the birth of a child to a simple, peasant couple in a simple, rural

And the shepherds fit perfectly into this scenario. They were on the fringes of the society of Israel, strangers to the usual niceties of custom and religion. They waited on the hills, while the truly devout (like Anna and Simeon) waited for the Messiah in the Temple. But it was to the shepherds that the angel appeared with his message, and it was shepherds who bore the first news of the birth of Israel's Saviour into the streets of Bethlehem. The 'devout' got their revelation later!

God still has marvellous things to say to ordinary people. He is still, in the old biblical phrase, 'no respector of persons'. The birth of Jesus is a wonderful reminder that intellect, rank, social position, worldly power and reputation cut no ice with God. The shepherds never forgot the needs of their sheep, and God never forgot the needs of the shepherds.

God still reveals the most marvellous things to ordinary people, going about their ordinary lives - provided they have ears and eves open to what is happening.

We will continue to have short Choir Practices before the Services, 10.15 a.m. on the 1st Sunday in December, and 10.25a.m. for 10.30 a.m. on the 2nd and 4th Sundays. We are having Choir Practices on Wednesdays, 6 to 6.45 p.m. and they are in Church in the Parish Room, where it will be warm. There will be no Wednesday Choir Practices during the Christmas Holidays, 26th December and 2nd January. We will start again on Wednesday, 9th January please. Mr. Shepherd has planned a special Advent Sunday Service on 2nd December, with lots of people involved.

I was pleased to sing the two verses of our National Anthem on Remembrance Sunday. Look in our newish hymn book and number 177 has three verses.


British Humanitarian Aid

The December newsletter from Tony and Valerie Budell tells of the three orphanages 'adopted' by BHA earlier this year; Timki, Stara Bassan and Zamgli. The Convoy of Hope has supplied most of their needs, including food, clothing, shoes, bedding, toys and educational items and the children are much happier now. The government of the Ukraine allocates 4GR (75p) per child per day to cover everything, all of their needs, including medical requirements, so the involvement of BHA in their lives is vital. The authorities only supply, by law, one frock, or pair of trousers, per child every two years and that does not specify 'new'. Shoes, underwear, warm coats, jumpers and bedding are not supplied, so the only help they receive is from outside agencies. BHA is the only outside agency working in the Chernigov/Chernobyl region, so it is vitally important that BHA continues that work.

The BHA community centre, Aratta, distributes the humanitarian aid directly to the orphanages, becoming an absolute lifeline, not only to the children in the orphanages, but also to hundreds of impoverishes families in the areas. Aratta continues to help everyone who seeks help, none is turned away. In some ways a victim of its own success; those requiring urgent help visit the local government offices and are told that the only advice they can offer is to visit 'Aratta', a charitable organisation set up by an Englishman!

The director of Aratta, Victoria Filatova, a former teacher, has introduced a full educational programme at the orphanages, teaching the physically and mentally handicapped youngsters as if they no disabilities whatsoever. This is beginning to benefit many of them enormously.

It is ten years since Tony meet Mother Theresa, who was very instrumental in putting his life onto the right track. He still receives comfort and inspiration from her words 'None of us can do great things, only small things with great love'.

MOTHERS' UNION NEWS

During our October meeting, Vicky, our organist and Mothers' Union member, selected several Christmas Carols to play and explain their history. We were interested to learn about the following:-**Silent Night** - the tune was written by Franz Gruber in 1818 at Oberdorf, near Salzburg. This carol came about because a mouse chewed through the leather bellows, therefore there was no sound from the organ for the forthcoming Christmas Evening Service. Joseph Mohr speedily wrote the words and children from the area sang it for the service- it created a mixed reaction within the congregation. Many years passed before the carol was sung again before the Austrian Kaiser.

Christians Awake - was written 250 years ago by John Byrom. It's original title was 'Christmas Day for Dolly' - he wrote this for his daughter.

O Little Town of Bethlehem - was written by an Episcopal Bishop from the Diocese of Massachusetts, America. Philip Brooks wrote this carol for his Sunday School following a visit to Bethlehem. The tune was collected by Vaughan Williams at Forest Green.

It Came Upon The Midnight Clear - was also written by an American, Edmund Sears. It is an ethical song for world peace. The tune was composed by Arthur Sullivan. This carol is 100 years old.

See Him Lying On A Bed Of **Straw** - was written 1964 by Michael Perry, who later became Vicar of Tonbridge Parish Church.

Once In Royal David's City - was written in 1848 by Cecil Frances Alexander who had a talent for writing poetry and hymns for small children such as 'All Things Bright and Beautiful' and 'There is a Green Hill Far Away'.

Finally, we listened to a tape of John Rutter's music - The Nativity Carol and Sherpherd's Carol. John Rutter was born in 1945 and was Director of Music at Clare College, Cambridge before becoming a freelance composer.

We would like to thank Vicky for the enlightening talk and playing the music.

On 23rd December we shall be performing the song we have been ? practising in the special Christmas Family Communion Service.


Eastling Meets at 9.50am in the village hall on 2nd December. No Sunday School on 16th December as we will be organising to go to the Stalisfield Crib Service.

Parish Clerk

Eastling Parish Council is still looking for someone to take on the role of Parish Clerk from the end of December. Main duties are preparing the Agenda and Minutes for Council Meetings (held every two months) and various secretarial and administrative tasks between Meetings. Evening Buses

If all goes according to plan, the new bus service for return trips into Faversham on Friday and Saturday evenings should be starting around the time this "Good News" is published. The first evening is Friday, 30 November.

One aspect that has surprised a number of people is that the new 345 route comes up to Eastling from Newnham via Newnham Lane. This means that the bus will NOT stop in The Street, but turn from Newnham Lane into Eastling Road towards Painters Forstal and Faversham. Eastling residents will be able to catch the bus by hailing the driver in Newnham Lane or on the Eastling-Faversham road. There is a scheduled

stop at Glebe Cottages at 7.29pm. The return bus leaves Faversham Court Street at about 10.20pm, but will wait until the end of the film at The Royal cinema.

Fares are the same as the current day-time service into Faversham. Most households will have received a leaflet giving details and these may also be found on the parish noticeboards and the Eastling village website. The new evening buses are being run as a six month trial; continuation will depend on public support.

Golden Jubilee

Eastling Parish Councillors have been discussing how the village might mark the Queen's Golden Jubilee. So far, no suggestions had been received apart from plans by the Village Hall Committee to organise a barbecue on or near the main celebration in early June. Councillors also felt that the Jubilee might be a good occasion for upgrading the approaches to the village with new more attractive entry signs and agreed this should be investigated further.

Road Problems

Eastling Parish Councillors have drawn the attention of Kent Highways Unit to the problem deep ponding of surface water at the entrance to Goosemeadow in Newnham Lane. Also included on a list of road problems are several potholes on the edge of the Eastling-Faversham road to

the north of the village. Councillors have been advised that the serious flooding on the same road at the junction with North Eastling Lane has been investigated and some drain clearance carried out. Further work by the engineers is planned. The badly faded white lining on the Eastling-Faversham road should be dealt with following proposed re-surfacing next year.

New Bus Shelter

Plans to provide a bus shelter at the very exposed Glebe Cottages stop have taken a step forward. Parish Councillors have agreed to seek approval for a masonry and timber design expected to cost just over £3,100. As a first step, they will be contacting Moat Housing Society, who manage the Glebe Cottages housing development, to discuss the scheme and the siting of the shelter. Approaches will also need to be made to Swale Council for planning permission and, possibly, grant aid.


