# Christmas is coming . . . . .

Peter and I are expecting a new grandchild in two weeks' time. We have a mixture of emotions: apprehension and excitement, and a feeling of wonder that a new human being is about to join us on this planet and, we hope, become close to us, loved by us and loving in return.



way. For many of us, the approach of Christmas brings a flood of chores: buying cards, presents, food to prepare, trees to buy and decorations to put up. For children there is the intoxicating excitement of presents to come. Christmas has, for many, taken on a frenzied and material life of its own. At the same time, for some, there may be memories of past family togetherness which now has become sadness at the empty house and the empty chair.

But should we expect at Christmas something greater than constant activity and consumption? Could it herald the coming of something new into our lives and souls that often ache for a better world? Our culture seems obsessed with blame and cynicism and tortured relationships -"Mock the Week", "EastEnders" and so on. By contrast, the message of Christmas, brought by the birth of a baby, is love and acceptance, not anger and recrimination.

This new baby was something more than the creation of a new human life

grandchildren. It was God's human entrance into our world.

God came in such a humble way that it cuts across all our ideas of value and worth. Born in a stable - probably dirty and unhygienic - and definitely downmarket and "uncool": laid on a food trough by the young spouse of an unknown carpenter - not a celebrity and welcomed by a group of outcasts. (Shepherds were the lowest in society in bible times, because they could not attend the correct religious observances.) This baby's life unfolded as he grew into a man, Jesus. His life spelled out the great priority of love. He loved people and used his power to heal people, and his eloquence to teach people how to live and love and serve God. He himself, prayed to God with more all. closeness than ever known before, calling him "Abba" (Father), and spending hours, often at night, in prayer. But society couldn't understand unconventional, unbiased teaching of God's love to us all, and he was crucified. Then he overcame death

Christmas is also on its like that of our children and to show that the kingdom of heaven was open to all who follow him.

> So, something much deeper and greater than our worldly concerns happens at Christmas. We receive a miraculous gift. We are invited to unwrap it, and to receive God anew to live and love in us and with us. Even our tears and sadness as we miss loved ones, or our happy anticipation of good times, are dwarfed by the gift that God sent, and still sends us at this time.

> So may Jesus, who came as a human baby at Christmas and who understands our human emotions, share our happiness and sadness at this time. And may He speak to us more closely, deepen our faith and enlarge our hearts to love and be loved, more than ever before.

The entrance hall was the dining area, with the refectory table decorated for Christmas and, in the corner of the room, a tree which dwarfed the many portraits of Granville Wheler's ancestors. The residents of the time, elderly and reserved, and from all corners of the Commonwealth, enjoyed the celebrations in a stately way. They had a wonderful time and it was rewarding for us, the staff, that they did. It made working on that special day a pleasure for us too. With the usual roast turkey and trimmings, Christmas pudding, brandy sauce, stilton, mince pies, crackers, port wine, carols and much Christmas joy; the day passed in a busy haze.
