

Violent games harm young minds

When you choose Christmas presents for any youngsters this year, beware the violence that may well be lurking inside that computer game. Psychologists have expressed their real concern at the effect that games such as 'Grand Theft Auto', 'Mortal Kombat' and 'Call of Duty: Modern Warfare' could have on youngsters making them more prone to violence.

The Association of Teachers and Lecturers is warning that violent computer games can have a really damaging effect on children, desensitising them to aggression and bloodshed. Over-exposure to screenbased entertainment also robs them of valuable time interacting with friends or playing outdoors.

As one leading teacher put it: "If children are up until midnight playing violent computer games, and then come into school exhausted, not interacting with other children, that is not good preparation for school, and not good preparation for

May the birth of Christ reawaken us to the good and true God and His presence with us. May we turn back again and reconnect with our roots. May we turn again to the Christ child, the symbol of hope and renewal, May God bless you and refresh you all this Christmas.



In 'A Christmas Carol' there is even a Father Christmas - in the shape of Christmas Present. Only the Christmas tree itself came later, when Prince Albert imported 'a pretty German toy' that won the heart of the English court, and hence the rest of Victorian society.


