### ANGELS

We hear a lot about angels at Christmas. A lot of the carols we sing have angels in them - like 'Hark the Herald Angels Sing' and 'While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks by Night'.

Angels are God's messengers and you can read about the good news they brought to the shepherds in Luke's Gospel, chapter 2, verses 8-20.

### MAKE YOUR OWN CHRISTMAS ANGEL

You can make a whole host of angels, one for the top of the tree and a row of them, all different sizes, to go on a windowsill. To alter the size simply draw a bigger or smaller circle, you could use a dinner plate or a small tin to draw round. You could even make a giant angel using a dustbin lid!

### You will need:

Scissors, thick white paper or thin white card, some felt tip pens and something circular to draw round (use a small plate or saucer to start with).


- Draw a circle on the paper and cut it out. Mark the centre of the circle (lightly fold it into quarters to find the centre).
- Copy the face and features on to the circle and colour them in.
- Mark the dotted lines and cut around them and around the halo and hair as marked.
- Fold the angel into a cone by putting one wing over the other and slotting them together. A little piece of sellotape will hold it firmly.

### The Canon's Column

One of the pre-Christmas traditions for Norma and I when we lived in Nova Scotia was to go to a Barra McNeil's Christmas concert. It was full of songs, music, step dancing and poetry in the Celtic tradition featuring the McNeil family and some of their friends. The highlight of the concert sent shivers up and down one's spine as Lucy McNeill sang 'O Holy Night' while standing in a lone spotlight on the darkened stage. It was one of those holy moments when one becomes aware that there is something far beyond ourselves and our own situations. As she finished and the music died, the silence enveloped the audience, a holy pregnant silence that held back the applause for a minute or so. We knew that we had been blessed and that blessing was not just a beautiful voice singing a beautiful song.

Christmas is a holy season, a season in which people can experience the holy, experience that which is beyond ourselves. The traditional Christmas readings describe for us the unique encounters that Zachariah, Elizabeth, Mary and Joseph had with the holy as they learned about the children the two women were to bear. And then there were the

shepherd's experiences of the angel messenger, the angel choir, then the infant Jesus in the manger. We also have the account of three men who came a considerable distance with valuable gifts to give to someone they perceived to be holy.

In today's world, in the midst of the busyness of our festivities, many of us look forward to a celebration of Christmas that can provide us with an experience of the holy. I would encourage you to make space in the rush of your Christmas activities to prepare to experience the holiness of Christmas. Join us at any of our three churches during the Advent and Christmas services. Come,



The Parish Council met on 5th November and was pleased to welcome the Belmont Farm Manager Ben Binder to the meeting. He gave an overview of the last year and said that maintenance of footpaths had not been carried out well enough. However the machinery had been fixed and spraying of footpaths would take place in fine weather and he footpath from The Street to the church would be maintained to stop the nettles and crops encroaching. He also explained that the ditches dug round fields were to prevent traffic ingress.



The term finishes on Friday 19th December when the children are invited to wear nonuniform for a £1 donation.




