
Holly is an evergreen, which means that it does not lose its leaves in the autumn, but keeps them all year round. And because its leaves are always green it is a symbol of eternal

Canon's Column, December 2015

One of my favourite Christmas stories is about a little boy of about eight who wanted a red Ryder sleigh for Christmas. In the 1950's these were the fastest sleighs on the packed snow of most sliding hills where Quebec boys and girls gathered after school. They gave the thrill of a lifetime with each swift passage down the hill. Jacques told his parents of his great wish time and again, but times were hard for his family in the urban residential area where they lived. His parents warned him that Santa might not be able to bring him what he wanted, but Jacques was ever hopeful and knew that he had asked the right person for his desired gift.

On Christmas morning, Jacques crept into the living room of the tenement his family lived in and saw, against the wall next to the tree

a red Ryder sleigh with a red bow and a tag with his name on it. Jacques quickly and quietly got dressed in his outdoor clothes and went out with his new sleigh.

When his parents woke up, they quickly figured out what Jacques had done and fully expected him to return for breakfast when the bells for the first service of Christmas rang throughout the community.





Advent Candles

What do they stand for?

Advent is like a journey leading up to Christmas day and the candles on the Advent wreath are lit, one every Sunday during Advent. On 29th November we remember God's People and the first candle will be lit during the morning service, this is the candle of **Hope**.

The old testament prophets are remembered on 6th December and second candle, the candle of Peace, will be lit.

The candle of Love will be lit on 13th December, signifying Baptist as a light shining in a dark place. Mary, the mother of Jesus, is the light of Joy for the fourth candle to lit on 20th December.

And, on Christmas Day, the four outer candles on the wreath are all alight as the fifth and central candle is lit to signify the Birth of Christ. This reminds us that Jesus Christ is the light of the world.

Why a walk



is better than a run when you hit 60

The nights may be long, the weather cold and damp, but do try and keep active this winter. Walking or cycling for just 20 minutes a day can reduce a 60year-old man's risk of heart failure by a fifth.

Research in Sweden found that both too little and too much exercise as we age can be bad for us. Just twenty minutes of cycling or walking each day is far better than none, and more beneficial than heavy-duty exercise. The research was published in the Journal of the American College of Cardiology:Heart Failure.






