

Advent - a time of coming

The exact birth-date of Jesus is not known, but during the 5th century the date of 25 December was chosen to become the Feast of the Nativity, or Christmas. By the sixth century, the Christian Church was in the habit of spending several weeks leading up to Christmas in prayerful, expectant preparation. The fourth Sunday before Christmas Day became Advent Sunday, this year on 2nd December. 'Advent' means 'coming', or 'coming in', and traditionally special candles have been lit, and more recently, advent calendars used, as the Church prepares itself for the coming of the Holy Child, the longawaited Messiah.



Lighting an Advent wreath is a custom that began with Lutherans and Catholics in 16th-Germany. centurv Typically, the Advent wreath is a circle of

branches or garland with four or five candles arranged on the wreath. During the season of Advent, one candle on the wreath is lit each Sunday as a part of the Advent services

Why does Christmas begin at midnight with Holy Communion?

The hour was first chosen at Rome in the fifth century to symbolise the idea that Christ was born at midnight – a mystical idea in no way hindered by historical

evidence! No one knows the hour of His birth. Certainly in recent times, Holy Communion at midnight on Christmas morning has proved popular with

modern families. You can begin your Christmas with Holy Communion at midnight in Stalisfield church. Come along at 11.30pm on Christmas Eve.

Message from our County Councillor - Andrew Bowles

I started October with four days at the Party Conference in Birmingham. Not the Conference some expected, no bloodletting and a general feeling of unity.

On returning there was a well-attended meeting at Teynham on air quality – a lot of support for a Sittingbourne Southern Relief Road to get traffic, especially lorries, off the A2 through the village. The highlight of the first weekend back was attending Murston Old Church to view the display of poppies etc.

Locally the Agenda is increasingly dominated by Planning and housing numbers. Although our Local Plan was only adopted in 2017 the Inspector ordered a review by 2022 due to concerns over the highways network. The "Objectively Assessed Need" for housing is expected to show a 36% higher figure, up to 1,050 houses per year. In order to give the Council maximum choices to meet the increased figure we invited expressions of interest in the concept of a 'Rural Town or Village" from land owners and developers. This concept, which is increasingly being adopted by local planning authorities, is to deliver future housing provision in one or two locations, the advantage being that a larger development would be expected to fund its own infrastructure needs, roads, schools, health facilities, etc.

Of the four proposals received by Swale Borough Council, three lie within the Swale East County Division which I currently represent. The most fully developed proposal is that between Bapchild and the M2 in the vicinity of Kent Science Park. Another proposal from the Dutchy of Cornwall lies East of Faversham, South of the A2. This proposal lies almost solely in the Parish of Boughton. The most recent proposal to come forward is that to the South of the M2 either side of the A251, largely in Sheldwich Parish. Sheldwich Parish Council have called a meeting on the 21st November to receive Gladman's proposals and to hear the views of residents. At the time of writing I am intending to attend. The fourth proposal lies mainly to the West of the A249 in the vicinity of Bobbing and Iwade Parishes.

Early in 2019 we hope to be in possession of enough information to decide whether or not to continue a rural settlement option or a return to a traditional Policy of spreading any extra development throughout the Borough.

During October in addition to the usual exhaustive list of Kent County Council and Swale Borough Council Committees etc I also attended meetings of both Doddington and Dunkirk Parish Council's.

As this will be the last Newsletter, or certainly the last one to come out in print, in 2018 can I wish all residents a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Eastling Primary School News

On Friday 9th November, Eastling Primary School had the official opening of the Peace Garden by the Mayor of Faversham Trevor Abram. It was wonderful to share this event with family, friends and the local community. Mrs Rayner and her team of volunteers worked tirelessly to prepare for the event. Mrs Rayner was successful in securing a grant from Swale Borough Council, which was used to commission peace murals, which were designed by the children and created alongside the artist - Jo Ursell,

The children in Oak class worked with Murston Poppy Project to create poppies for Murston Church. On 2nd November, parents came into school and worked with their children to create more poppies using plastic bottles as well as painting CD's and pebbles to put in the Peace Garden. Mrs Sadler raised funds for the garden by carrying out a sponsored swim. She swam 5km (200 lengths of Faversham swimming pool) on 20th October raising over £200, which was used to purchase a commissioned poppy sculpture.

The children wrote poems, created wonderful artwork, which is displayed in the corridor and sang beautifully at the commemorative assembly, which followed the ribbon cutting ceremony. Our guests were treated to cakes made by the children in Oak class and the school cookery club. There was a collection for the British Legion, which raised £33.80.

Willow class led a wonderful class assembly based on their learning about Matilda on 12th October. On 15th October, Acorn class visited a pumpkin farm where the children all picked their own pumpkins to bring back to school. On 19th October, Acorn class took part in a wonderful Nursery Rhyme challenge, which they shared with the school and their parents. The parents then helped their children to carve and decorate the pumpkins in their classroom. There was rather a lot of alitter involved!



Oak class furthered their learning about World War 1 by visiting The Royal Engineers Museum in Gillingham on 17th October. They took part in workshops including making their own medals out of clay. These are on display in school and look wonderful.

Term 1 ended with the Friends of Eastling School's annual Pumpkin decorating competition followed by the Halloween disco. The costumes were frightful and everyone had a fantastically scary evening.


