For many, Christmas is a time of happiness and holiday. An opportunity for parties, concerts, pantomimes and watching children perform nativity plays. We exchange colourful cards, and presents, and prepare special meals for family and friends. We sing carols. We adorn our homes and churches with all kinds of decorations.

All our celebrations are a far cry from that first Christmas. In our festivities it is easy to forget that when Jesus came life was hard. The Romans were an occupying force in Israel. There was poverty. The Jews were a captive and oppressed people. They had numerous worries and fears and awaited their Messiah to give them freedom.

Mary was looking forward to marrying Joseph and living with him in Nazareth. Suddenly she meets an angel; told she will be pregnant with God's Son and then her fiancé wants to divorce her! Her world is changed. Joseph too is distressed. In the turmoil, God speaks to Joseph in a dream and while this explains the miraculous pregnancy, he can't stop the hurtful gossip or the doubters.

Trusting God in all things

Even if he wanted to face his critics, Joseph can't stay in Nazareth. He is compelled to take Mary with him to Bethlehem to complete a census. The long journey, possibly all on foot, must have been horrendous. Then in Bethlehem there is unsuitable accommodation for a birth.

It was likely that when the shepherds came and shared their experience of an angel messenger and the singing heavenly host, that their difficult circumstances began to make sense. Then, perhaps, sometime later when the Eastern men came with gifts that they were reassured and encouraged that God was with them in their difficulties. Also, when God told Joseph in a dream to go with Mary and the infant to Egypt to escape Herod's cruelty, they knew that in a foreign land they could trust God with their lives.

Our Christmas comes amidst life's traumas and troubles. We may have on-going difficulties. In our struggles we need to By Lester Amann.

know that God can be working out His purposes. Mary and Joseph came to know that in their hardships they were in God's will. Like them, we too must trust God in life-changing events.

Eastling School News

There is always so much to share from Eastling Primary School. We may be a small school but we are definitely a very active school, going from strength to strength always putting the education and experiences of our children first. The Kent Test Results (11+) were once again extremely positive for Eastling Primary School. This year six of our children were successful, which is double the national average.

On 15th October Silver Birch class visited the Gunpowder Mill, Standard Quay and Faversham Recreational Ground to look at features of the local area for geography. They then visited 'The Horsebridge Arts Centre' on 7th November as part of the 'Into Film Festival', where they watched a screening of Two by Two, an animated version of Noah's Ark. On Wednesday 16th October, a group of Year 2 children visited Herne Bay High to participate in Basketball training. Representatives from the NSPCC visited the school on 17th October to deliver some assemblies to all the children followed by a workshop for Years 5 and 6.

On Friday 18th October Acorn class led their first whole school assembly on the theme of themselves and people that help us. The children in Acorn class are still only 4 years old yet each of them spoke clearly and confidently in front of the whole school and their parents.

Term 1 ended with the traditional school Halloween Disco where the children's costumes were both wonderful and scary. The event was kindly organised by the FOES (Friends of Eastling School).

On Tuesday 29th October, Acorn class visited the pumpkin farm at Sevington where the children all picked their own pumpkins to bring back to school. The following day the parents joined their children to help carve and decorate the pumpkins in the classroom. The results were amazing with each design being unique.

Willow class had their first class assembly on Friday 8th November on the theme of famous scientists. It was a very informative and fun filled assembly to celebrate World Science Day.

National Anti-Bullying Week was 11th -15th November and Shooting Star Entertainments delivered a production of the Ugly Duckling to the younger children and Captain Wonderweb to KS2 as part of the school's work on Anti-Bullying.

The Friends of Eastling School's annual Pumpkin decorating competition took place on 31st October with Tish Neaves, chair of governors, having the difficult job of judging the entries. There were pumpkins decorated as snowmen, unicorns, Donald Trump, hedgehogs, spiders and Dracula to name a few. We are delighted that this year FOES have agreed to donate

a substantial amount towards the cost of a new school minibus.

Eastling Primary School's annual Christingle Service will be held at St Mary's on Tuesday 17th December. We look forward to a wonderful afternoon.

During the tour there was a tasting of their Vodka and Gin. Whisky is now also being produced, but will not be available to drink until next year. The company is the only spirit maker in Kent and only one of a few in the UK that undertakes the complete process of brewing and distilling from grain to glass. Upon completion of the tour, there was a glass of ice cold gin and tonic waiting for us all to consume - very refreshing. We were very taken with the taste of the produce, so all of us purchased their products (some might even make it to Christmas as presents!). Afterwards, we went next door to finish off with Tea and Cake, of course.

Continuing in the theme of alcohol, November's Meeting was the popular biannual Wine Tasting, which attracted about 35 ladies and their guests. Andrew Higgs had selected 6 wines for us to taste, informing us of their origins and tastes that we should expect from each one. 

Wildlife Garden Maintenance in December

The winter solstice on the 21st of this month has a significant effect on our winter garden wildlife. As soon as the length of daylight increases, many subtle changes can be observed especially in the behaviour of some bird species. Song thrushes will soon start to sing from treetops or roofs to define their territory, in preparation for the breeding season ahead. Great tits may investigate nest boxes, especially on sunny days. For many people December is a time to enjoy the garden from the comfort of the house. but there are still important jobs you can do to ensure vour local wildlife survives the winter.

In a small garden, native shrubs such as goat willow, dogwood or hazel need to be kept in check to prevent them from taking over completely. These valuable species attract a large variety of moth caterpillars and other insects and are well worth growing. They can be 'coppiced' this month, which means cutting them to within 10 cms of the ground, encouraging them to produce new strong shoots from the base next spring. If dogwood still has shiny black berries, delay coppicing this species until the fruits have all been eaten by wood mice or birds.

This is still only the beginning of the winter and if the weather is mild, an ideal time to plant a tree or a hedge. Choose a native tree if you have the space – silver birch or rowan would be good choices for gardens as they support many insect species and insectivorous birds. Rowan berries are also a favourite with blackbirds and thrushes. Native mixed hedging

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is a wildlife magnet, providing nesting and hibernation places, food and shelter. Hedges are also important corridors in urban areas, linking gardens, allotments and green spaces to allow wildlife to move about in safety. Include hawthorn, blackthorn and wild roses for their protective prickles as well as the wild Viburnum, spindle, holly, wild privet and buckthorn. Mulch your hedge or tree well after planting and water if the weather is dry, until established.

Even in the tiniest garden it is possible to provide food, water and shelter from bad weather for common garden birds. On a balcony or small patio make sure hanging feeders are topped up. Birds will venture closer to the house as food supplies run out. In colder weather an 'umbrella' cut from a conifer and laid on the ground can keep an area free of frost, allowing birds like robins and wrens to find insects, but

make sure local cats can't use this as a hiding place. Special seed and peanut feeders with plastic suckers can be

attached to windows, and small drinking saucers of fresh water will be used when

lodged in a window box.

When the weather is too miserable to venture out, keep up to date with

what's in your garden by starting a wildlife journal. A catalogue of the birds feeding, mammals passing through or unusual sighting of insects out of hibernation can be

valuable information now or at any time throughout the year.

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The Incarnation: fearfully and wonderfully made

by Dr Ruth M. Bancewicz, who is Church Engagement Director at The Faraday Institute for Science and Religion in Cambridge. Ruth writes on the positive relationship between Science and Christian faith.

My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth.

Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be. Psalm 139:15-16

You began life as a single cell. For a few hours you were a miniscule but highly complex blob of jelly, until it began to divide: two cells, four, eight, sixteen, a ball,

a hollow ball, and then something more recognisably like a living organism. You were still tiny, but developing a nervous system, a head, a body, arms and legs.

Until recently I hadn't thought much about Jesus being an

embryo. Somehow, I find that thought even more shocking than His birth. How could God, who made the universe, have become something so completely and utterly vulnerable? Maybe in the past, when the development of a child happened in 'secret', it was possible just to let that part of the Christmas story go untold.

Today, when we see images of a developing child, or even embryos outside the womb, it is harder to ignore the process of Jesus

developing into a baby. The incarnation meant that God's Son went through all the stages in the diagram in my developmental biology textbook: 'zygote', 'morula', 'blastocyst', implantation, and so on.

Jesus was there in the beginning, and all life owes its existence to Him. But instead of remaining aloof, He chose to become one of us. The Son of God shared the same kind of DNA as every other

organism on the planet. He knows what it feels like to have a body, to feel hungry and thirsty, pain and pleasure, dark and light.


In Psalm 139, the writer is meditating on God's intimate knowledge of Him, which began when He was an embryo. There is nothing God doesn't know about Him,

and even darkness cannot obscure Him from God's sight. The incarnation means that God's intimacy with us now extends even further. He became one of us, lived alongside us, and shared our very fragile material nature.

The transcendent God is also immanent, longing for us to relate to Him as Father. He became as fragile as we are so He could rescue us from the messes we so often find ourselves in. With His help, we can remember what it means to be fearfully and wonderfully made.
