



CITIZENS' RIGHTS FOR OLDER PEOPLE (CROP)

A free confidential advocacy service helping older people in East Kent.

The service operates from Watling Chambers, Canterbury, (01227 789777), using trained advocates controlled by a Project Co-Ordinator.

Clients are visited in their own homes and help is given to resolve a range of problems including:

Claims for attendance allowance, income support, council tax rebates etc., and if necessary, appeals against refusals to grant them; help with sorting financial problems arising from decreased mobility or from the loss of a partner; Helping older people suffering physical, mental, verbal abuse, to resolve their problems by for example moving home or ensuring their fiancés are more secure; Disputes with neighbours;

Presenting options to those considering entering sheltered accommodation or a residential home; Help with returning from a nursing home or hospital to the local community;

Plus a host of other items as well as advice on appeals where necessary. The overall aim is to leave older people stronger and more able to cope.

FROM THE ORGAN LOFT

Did you see this in The Faversham News towards the end of December 2002?

"100 Years ago: Sunday last being the 11th Anniversary (therefore 1891) of the hanging of the bells of Ospringe Church, a peal of grandsire triples (J. J. Parkers 6 part) consisting of 5,040 changes were rung by the members of the Kent County Association of Church Bell Ringers.

This is the first peal conducted by F. Hunt. G. A. Ransom hails from Isleworth, the others are ringing members of the Faversham Parish Church.

Taken from the Faversham News, December, 1902."

Our team here in Ospringe are still members and won County Six Bells Competition at Bethersden in September, 2002 and were given a bell and plaque. Earlier in 2002 they won a Cup for the Canterbury District. Well done.

Arthur Percival, from the Faversham Society, has given me three lovely piano pieces by a Robert Heller, Faversham born composer. I am enjoying playing them, "Wayside Flowers", "Presidents Mounted Guard Quickstep" and "Ripple Waltz Brilliante".

ROBERT HELLER is a 19th Century Composer born in Faversham. He was born, William Henry Palmer, the son of the Organist of Faversham Parish Church, in Church Street. He went to one of the Music Academies in London and was highly thought of by Sterndale Bennett. He became a Concert Pianist and emigrated to the U.S.A. There he played "The Halls" and also became a magician. In America he is known as "The Father of American Magic" He died in Boston when he was only c. 50 years and is buried there. He changed his name to Robert Heller because he admired the great violinist of the day, Joseph Heller. Does anyone know anything more about him please?

EASTLING PARISH COUNCIL

Village Green

Monday, 10th March could be 'decision day' for proposals to create a village green at Eastling. Parish Councillors are calling a Special Meeting at which villagers in favour of the project are being asked to turn out and help form a Steering Committee to prepare detailed plans for the open space and its future management.

At their meeting on 20th January, Councillors agreed that, although a recent poll of all residents had shown 63% in favour of a green, there now had to be a willingness for villagers to get involved in the practical aspects of seeing the project through to completion. Without a clear demonstration of support and agreement by a few to serve on a Steering Committee, there was a danger that the opportunity to create a green would be lost.

The Meeting on 10th March is at 7.45pm in Eastling Village Hall and is expected to last an hour at most. It will be followed by the regular Parish Council meeting which, as usual, is open to those villagers who wish to stay and hear the proceedings.

SEEKING FAMILY HISTORY

Suzanne Court-Oak, from Colchester in Essex, has been in touch to see if villagers can help with her researches into her family's history and their links with Eastling.

Her father, Mr James Court, was born in Magnolia Cottage, Newnham Lane in September 1920. Sadly, James' father, Sydney Court, died only five months later and the family moved north shortly afterwards. One consequence of this was that, if ever a photograph of Sydney existed, it was lost in the upheaval.

" I think it's awful that my dad has never seen a photo of his own father." says Suzanne. But, against the odds, she hopes that her researches might uncover one - a mission made all the more urgent by her father's deteriorating eyesight.

James can remember return visits to Eastling towards the end of the 1920s when he stayed with cousins. He thinks they may have had a farm behind their house as he recollects sitting on a wall and there being lots of pigs. He also recalls visiting his father's grave, flanked by two huge yew trees on the north-east side of Eastling parish church. A further journey to Eastling in the 1970's with his mother confirmed Magnolia Cottage (then known as "The Cottage") as the house where he was born.

Suzanne's researches reveal that her grandfather, Sydney, was born at Pig Green, Eastling, in 1895. His mother was 17 year old Ethel Court - unmarried and a "domestic nurse". Suzanne says there is no record of who the father was but the 1901 census shows Sydney, age six, living with his grandparents Henry and Louisa Court at Tong Farm, whilst his mother was "in service" as an in-house assistant at Lenham working for a family named Bean.

Join our Area Campaign for Broadband Internet Access

Fed up with slow Internet access? - Constantly loosing connection? - Spending hours downloading / sending files?

So am I!

Broadband Internet access is always connected, instantly available and up to 10 times faster than the standard 56k Modem.

So can we connect to Broadband?

Well currently the answer is a big NO.

Broadband is available to 68% of the Country but mainly in Towns and Cities. It will not become available on the Eastling and Lenham Telephone Exchanges until the residents using these Exchanges have demonstrated to BT "sufficient interest" to upgrade the Exchange Equipment. Although Broadband means no more charges for calls to your Internet Service Provider (ISP), It may cost up to £28 / Month depending on your ISP for the service. For many the benefit may not justify the cost. However unless we campaign to upgrade our Telephone Exchanges we will never have the option.

How do we demonstrate our interest to BT? We need to register with our chosen ISP.

For more information and a list of ISP's that can provide Broadband visit the BT Web Site, just go to http://www.bt.com/broadband/

At this site are many links; on the Home Page under the heading "Check Registration Levels" you can enter your phone number to view a barometer of current levels of interest.

Registration must be done via your ISP. It is free and after registration there is no obligation to convert to Broadband after the Exchange has been upgraded.

To quickly register you can call your ISP direct and explain that your current Exchange has not been upgraded. Your ISP will almost certainly register on your behalf.


