





Olave Snelling, former producer and presenter on Premier Radio in London, is currently Chairman of the Christian Broadcasting Council. In this article she encourages people to look again at their own spiritual commitment.

Where your treasure is ...

Cathexis means (approximately) emotional investment. To cathect something heavily means that your emotional life is pretty tangled up with whatever you cathect. As Lent begins, the question that faces every Christian is this: Given that we are less concerned about heaven the more we are wrapped up with earth; and given that the more wrapped up in heaven we are the less anxious we will be about our earthly home - how much cathexis do we invest in mansions in the sky?

It can be wearisome when people bang on about others who are "so heavenly minded that they are no earthly good." It can happen that people are too earthly minded to be any heavenly good. Jesus was talking about exactly that when

he urged us to lay up treasure in heaven. His words blast our self-deception away:

"Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:21)

Jesus knew the battle that goes on in our hearts between heavenly and earthly homes. He knew our struggle between

Psychoanalysts talk about cathexis. love of money and heavenly treasure. And I guess we do too, in a somewhat befuddled sort of way. How do we lay up treasure in heaven anyway? You certainly can't buy heavenly treasures with money.

> So here we are launching into a New Year with all its possibilities, a blank page of time to be written upon. What do we do with it? One thing we can do is to look at ourselves in the mirror and ask "Where is my treasure? Where is my heart? Where do my real ambitions lie?

"Our souls are held by what they hold; Slaves still are slaves in chains of gold; To whatsoever we may cling, We make it a soul-chaining thing; Whether it be a life, or land, And dear as our right eye or hand."

New Year's resolutions are a waste of time - how many have you already given up on - and it is only February! New Year beginnings could start with Lent - and a re-evaluation, reorientation, and regrasping of the true essentials of Christ's call on our lives, in whatever sphere of endeavour we are in.

EASTLING PARISH COUNCIL

The Council held its regular bi-monthly meeting on 9th January 2008.

The Chairman had attended a KAPC Meeting when the County Highways representative was present. He indicated that road conditions were unlikely to improve for the foreseeable future and the 30 mph speed limit was likely to be put on hold as there was no finance available.

The Treasurer reported that there was £4,500.00 in the various bank accounts of which £2,600.00 was for the Village Sign and could be returnable.

The Acting Clerk advised the Meeting that the Clerk proposed resigning and said that this could impinge upon the Council's Budgetary considerations.

The source of the primary concerns throughout the Village had to be the cutting of costs and the Chairman asked Cllr Bickerdike to investigate the costs which pertained to the Internet Connection which appeared to be largely under-used and was costing the Council about £650.00 per year.

The resignation of the Clerk would result in the Council having to pay a replacement's salary and expenses, which could be a burden to the Council. The Treasurer proposed that the Precept be provisionally set at 20p in an attempt to alleviate the problem.

Cllr Bailey indicated the Police Questionnaire had been completed and returned. Timber for the Village Sign has been passed to a saw-mill for processing but, at this stage, the Council Chairman was not able to supply any further details.

The Council was advised that there were two planning applications for the Council to consider. One related to the property known as "Flintstones" and the other to 8, Meeson's Close. The applicable documents had been circulated to Councillors for their consideration and Swale Borough Council have been informed that on this occasion the Councillors had no objections to make. K.C.C. had been advised of the missing chevrons and was currently vacillating accordingly. The Council wished to express their thanks to Mr Ben Binder for his diligence in maintaining the hedgerows along The Street.

Leaders' Course which had operated in the Village during the summer of 2007. Thirty two people from the Village and surrounding area completed a five week course lasting twelve hours a week. They studied aspects of rural life, animals, job opportunities, planting, harvesting and cooking healthy meals. The Course continued to Christmas and will start again in the Spring of 2008. Cllr Bailey had hoped to announce a three year funding agreement but this had not been signed. It is hoped to gain accreditation for the

Further Cllr Bailey thanked the Clerk who forwarded an application for free tree planting. The Rural Leaders' Course obtained 25 trees which the young people planted in a Nursery Area, from where they will be re-planted when established. Their eventual location will be around the fenced walkway surrounding the Vegetable Plot, open to the public via the support of the Government's Countryside Stewardship Scheme.

The Presentation of Christ in the Temple/ Candlemas

centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the season on

Christmas Candlemas, 2nd February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to "present him to the Lord". At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

bygone So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas.

> The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2:22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West. But in medieval times, the Nunc Dimittis was mostly used just on this day, during the distribution of candles before the Eucharist. Only gradually did it win a place in the daily prayer life of the Church.


