

thoughts in an assembly on the same morning. Villagers may also spot the giant GIST lorry arriving at the school on 9th February which is part of our road safety training.


At the end of the month we resume our swimming sessions down at the Faversham Pool with our Lions class being transported on a weekly basis from 25th Feb.

Cannon's Column

We are so often bombarded with news stories about the rich and famous, the privileged and powerful, those in positions of respect and responsibility. Some of these stories are uplifting and encouraging and some of them make us think these people "are not really worthy of the time it takes to read about them." Very often these rich, famous, powerful and privileged people ask for or expect special treatment. Sometimes this is appropriate, but when they are asking for or expecting special treatment when they have done wrong, should they be accorded privileges not given to the ordinary person?

Just over a month ago the Chief Justice criticized a multi-millionaire clothing store owner saying, 'it seems to me there is one law for the rich and another for the poor,' (the Telegraph, 5 Dec. 2014) after the multi-millionaire refused to pay a fine for doing unauthorized road construction in a wilderness reserve. Is this the truth in our society? We often feel that it is so. Is it ethically justifiable to have a double standard where some people are treated differently than the general public? I might suggest to you that this is ethically acceptable but in a far different way.

One of the important things to remember is that many of the rich and famous, the privileged and powerful, are in positions of trust, respectability and often responsibility. Even those who have made it to the exalted top in the entertainment industry and have become rich and famous can be considered to be in positions of trust and responsibility. Their actions, styles and attitudes often

influence the lifestyle of young and not so young people. People in leadership positions such as MP's, government ministers, municipal councillors and heads of Trusts, Boards and Corporations, are in positions of trust where they influence decisions that affect the lives of hundreds and thousands of people. To be irresponsible with that trust, to claim expenses beyond entitlement, to take advantage of or abuse one's position, one's colleagues, one's followers, are not the simple crimes of ordinary people. They are offences that often can only be committed by people with influence, power, prestige, respect and wealth.

A careful reading of Leviticus chapter 4, Deuteronomy chapter 24 and the prophets Amos, Micah, Ezekiel (chapters 33 and 34) and parts of Isaiah, give us an understanding that priests, elders, kings and others in leadership positions were held to a higher level of accountability because of their position and the potential to lead others into wrong doing and harm. The sacrifice of sin offering required of a priest was a bull ox, considerably more valuable than a goat, sheep or pair of turtle doves that were options for ordinary people.

The responsibility that accompanies fame, power, riches or prestige is significant because of the influence people in these positions have on the rest of society. We have only to read the papers or watch TV to see both negative and positive examples of

As we look towards the coming election and leadership contests, our Christian faith can offer us resources as we consider the options open to us.

Richard Bewes considers how God has revealed himself to us...

What is the shape of your Bible?

The true light that gives light to every man was coming into the world. (John 1:9)

The shape of the Bible is like that of an hour-glass, in which thousands of sand grains sink down from its wide top, trickling through the tapered centre, only to fill out once again at the bottom. At the top - with Jesus as 'The Word' behind creation, the dimensions are enormous:

Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made (John 1:3)

But quite quickly the glass begins to narrow down. The light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not understood it. (John 1:4,5)).

At the fall of humanity and the darkness that followed, a divinely-provided way of restoration is pledged. The hour-glass tapers down - to a single continent in the middle-east. It narrows still further to a particular country measuring little more than 250 miles long and 70 miles wide – and even more - to a family – the children of Israel. Surely, the hour-glass cannot become any narrower?

But it does. For Israel - called to be God's light to the nations - fails in her mission. She meets with exile at the hands of the Babylonians. Despite her eventual restoration, the Old Testament ends with a faithful Remnant of 'those who feared the Lord and honoured his name' (Malachi 3:16).

The glass narrows further still. The true light that gives light to every man was coming into the world. In a remote town of Galilee a promised Child is born. Twelve disciples join him. Thirteen men! Surely the hour-glass is down to its narrowest width.

But no. One disciple turns traitor, another turns coward; the rest are scattered. At this narrowest point of the hour-glass, we are down to a solitary grain - none other than the original Being who inhabited eternity. He became flesh and lived for a while among us.

As Lamb of God in his suffering on the Cross, this single Person is all that Israel could never be - the solitary fulfilment of the divine Covenant, at the centre of God's saving purposes.

Then the widening process begins, with the once-descended Child now ascended, higher than all the heavens, in order to fill the whole universe. (Ephesians 4:10). Pentecost drives his salvation in ever-widening dimensions.... to Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth' (Acts 1:8).

Be a part of this, where we are now - at the widest other-end of history's hourglass!
