




Be my Valentine?

Wednesdays - Almighty God, may we give respect for every person and reverence for all creation.


Thursdays - Holy God, from the disorder of our sinful lives, set straight our hearts.

High Downs Parish Future Ministry -Rev Canon Dr Steve Lillicrap to be installed as our Priest-in-Charge

Monday 11th March, 7pm in Throwley Church

When Canon Donald Lawton was the time being remain a separate Priest-in-Charge for the High Downs Benefice it was on a House for Duty part time basis. Donald provided part time ministry in return for being provided with a fully funded house (The Eastling Rectory in Newnham Lane). Since Donald left us the Church of England has decided that House for Duty is no longer viable and that in future its equivalent is a fully funded house plus a minimum of a 20% stipend. This would mean that to recruit a new part time priest would cost at least an additional £17,123 per annum between Eastling, Stalisfield and Throwley. The High Downs Parish Church Council and the Eastling, Stalisfield and Throwley District Church Councils all agreed that this was unaffordable, and therefore we need to consider other options.

Canon Dr Steve Lillicrap, the Area Dean of the Ospringe Deanery, proposed that High Downs Parish became affiliated with the Kingsdown and Creekside Parish (Teynham, Oare, Norton, Lynsted, Doddington, Newnham and Wychling) sharing ministry with them. High Downs Parish would for

parish entity under Ecclesiastical Law. The proposal is that Steve Lillicrap becomes our Priest-in-Charge, providing leadership, chairing the High Downs PCC meetings and taking some of the services in the High Downs churches. The Rev Richard Birch has retired as a House-for-Duty parttime priest based in Doddington, and it is proposed that a replacement House plus 20% stipend part-time priest is recruited to be shared between Kingsdown and Creekside and High Downs Parish and probably located in the Eastling Rectory. This will make the Doddington Vicarage available to house a curate that Steve Lillicrap is keen to support. This proposal has been agreed by the High Downs Parish Church Council and the Eastling, Stalisfield and Throwley District Church Councils and a special church service to licence Steve Lillicrap as the Priest-incharge of High Downs Parish will take place on Monday 11th March at 7pm in Throwley Church.

Message from your County Councillor - December 2018

I am now eagerly looking forward to my "You Decide" funding event to be held at Teynham Village Hall on Saturday 2nd February (details below), when all Swale East residents are welcome to help decide where the money is spent.

December started very busy, the first week included an Informal Cabinet Meeting, a meeting of the Sittingbourne Town Centre Regeneration Steering Group, a member workshop on Swale's air quality, a full day of Home to School Transport Appeal Hearings at County Hall, a joint briefing for Swale and Canterbury County Members on school attainment and future place provision, Local Action Group Meeting to allocate Grant Funding to rural businesses and finally I chaired the Kent Environment Annual Awards held this year at Broome Park, Barham. Swale organisations as well as some Swale Borough Council Officers and Departments were prominent amongst those recognised.

Later in the month were a Full Meeting of Kent County Council, a Swale Borough Council Cabinet meeting and the AGM of Thames Gateway Kent Partnership where I was re-elected as Vice Chairman. There was another Informal meeting of Swale's Cabinet, a meeting with Officers at County Hall to discuss the provision of youth services in Swale especially the Swale East Rural area which I represent. This is a matter where the delivery of the contract gives me serious concerns. I also attended a site

meeting at South Street, Boughton to review the Boundaries of the Conservation Area together with representatives of both the Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Plan Committee.

During the month of December I attended Parish Council meetings at Selling, Graveney, Sheldwich, Newnham and Lynsted. I also facilitated a site meeting at Bapchild with representatives of the Parish Council together with the Kent County Council Footpaths Officer to discuss the duration of any temporary footpath closures associated with the Stone's Farm development.

'The day the music died'

The day the music died – according to Don McLean in his epic song American Pie - was 60 years ago, on 3rd February 1959, when rock-


> and-roll star Buddy Holly died in a plane crash in Iowa. With him were two other singers, Ritchie Valens and The Big Bopper.

> Charles Hardin (Buddy) Holly, who was 22 when he died, was born in Lubbock, Texas, at the heart of America's Bible Belt, and he and his family were closely associated with the Tabernacle Baptist Church there, though he himself was seen as something of a rebel.

> His style was initially influenced by gospel and country music, and he formed groups with friends from his high school. After opening for Elvis Presley in 1955, he shifted to rock and roll. With his new band, The Crickets, he achieved international success with songs such as That'll be the Day.

> Immensely talented, he wrote, recorded and produced his own material and is often thought of as the man who defined the traditional rock-and-roll line-up of two guitars, bass and drums. He was a big influence on such major artistes as Bob Dylan, the Beatles, the Rolling Stones and Eric Clapton and was one of the first artistes inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame

With the start of Lent fast approaching (6th March) here are a couple of possible guides to use.

At Home in Lent - an exploration of Lent through 46 objects by Gordon Giles, BRF, £8.99

The writer spends each week in a different room gleaning spiritual lessons from everyday household objects. As a result, you may discover that finding God in the normal pattern of life - even in the mundane - transforms how you approach each day. Running as a thread through it all are the seven R's of Lent: regret, repentance, resolution, recognition, reconciliation, renewal and resurrection.

Reconciliation: the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book 2019 by Dr Muthurai Swamy, SPCK, £9.99

What is the role that ordinary people play in conflict and division – and reconciliation? This book will help you to begin a ministry bequeathed to us by Christ Himself.It calls for stronger relationships among church members; building connections with different denominations, as well as maintaining open attitudes towards those of other religions and ideologies. The 40 meditations consider impediments to reconciliation, risking the self, the benefits of humility, self-criticism, radical openness and peace with justice. *Reconciliation* is suitable for use at weekly gatherings or for everyday devotion during Lent

Faversham & Villages Refugee Solidarity Group

The Faversham & Villages Refugee Solidarity Group was set up in October 2015 to find ways for local people to support refugees fleeing war and persecution, some living in appalling conditions less than 30 miles from Kent's shores.

Six local residents met initially in the Eastling Village Hall to discuss what we could do to support vulnerable refugees. We agreed that fundraising, practical help, and increasing public awareness should form the core of our activities. As our numbers grew, we moved our monthly meetings to Faversham where many of our new members were based.

In the three years since our inception the group has held fundraising events including auctions, musical evenings, film showings and a 'good clothes' sale event, raising in excess of £20,000. These activities have been the result of the many hours put in by group members who bring a wide range of skills, creativity, commitment and dedication. This has given the group the ability to respond quickly to requests from those working directly with refugees for much needed, targeted funding. We have a stall in Faversham Market Place, usually the first Tuesday in the month, where we discuss issues relating to refugees, migrants and asylum seekers. These are complex and sometimes contentious issues and, despite some understandable concerns, most of the people we meet are generally sympathetic, compassionate and interested in what the group are doing. We share contact information, literature, meeting dates and future fundraising efforts.

We are in touch with other refugee support groups and volunteers working with refugees in Europe. Some of our group have visited the camps on the French coast. When we began, we were moved by the awful conditions in the large camp near Calais known as 'The Jungle'. Now demolished, there are still many thousands of refugees living 'rough' and in inhumane conditions along the Calais Dunkerque coast. They experience uncertainty, the worst of the weather, very little contact with their families and harassment from the French Police (who in some cases ruin sleeping bags and blankets to discourage them settling) and the authorities. Some put their lives at great risk by attempting to cross the channel drawn by the hope of uniting with family or the opportunity for a better, safer life.

The Faversham & Villages Refugee Solidarity Group work to support refugees fleeing from war, intolerance and persecution from anywhere in the world. We have successfully lobbied Swale Borough Council regarding their commitment to house ten refugee families within two years, and we are encouraged that this has already been surpassed.

Our group's meetings are the first Tuesday of the month, next is on Tuesday, February 5th, 7 p.m. at the Guildhall in Faversham Market Square. You can also access our website at Faversham and Villages Refugee Solidarity Group via change.org. and join our facebook page.
