Ash Wednesday:

My memory of the Passover in Jerusalem

At the end of this month Ash Wednesday introduces the Christian preparation for Easter, which normally coincides with Passover, the major Jewish celebration of the year. It's near Easter because Jesus was crucified at Passover, having just shared this very meal with his disciples.

Passover celebrates and recalls the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt. Led by Moses they crossed the Red Sea and 40 days later entered the 'Promised Land.' They shared the Passover meal at their last night in Egypt and have kept it all for nearly the past three thousand years or so that have followed.

Many years ago, when I was in Jerusalem to produce a radio

Lent Fasting

This month sees the start of Lent, the season of penitence, self-examination and fasting running up to Easter. Fasting can be a neglected discipline, but it plays an important part in the Christian life.

Jesus began His earthly ministry by fasting in the wilderness for 40 days and He taught His disciples to fast

(i.e. not if but 'when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that it will not be obvious to others that you are fasting, but only to your Father, who is unseen.' (Matthew 6:17,18).


Why Fast?

Firstly, giving up something in my life underlines my desire to put God first in my life. Secondly, fasting shows me how much I depend on things other than God in my life, so I can surrender my idols to Him. Thirdly, fasting encourages me to have a deeper hunger and dependency for God in my life. Therefore, fasting gives me space to humbly focus on God for His strength, provision, and wisdom and results in a more intimate relationship

programme, I was invited to join a Jewish family for their Passover meal. It was a great occasion, very like our Christmas, a family event with deep religious significance for those who seek it.

At the meal in Jerusalem we ate modest lentils and unleavened bread – Matzos as we now call it. We also drank plenty of wine but not from the cup at the end of the table. That is 'Elijah's cup', only to be drunk from when the prophet comes to announce the arrival of the Messiah. At the last supper Jesus instructed His disciples to drink from that cup after supper, which may have shocked them at the time. The Messiah had come!

How can I fast?

Usually fasting involves missing one or two meals during the day, although some can't abstain from food for medical reasons. It might also include abstaining or limiting the time I give to television, alcohol or social media. However, Lent can also be a time to embrace new spiritual disciplines e.g. joining a study group, 'random acts of kindness', or giving more time to prayer and Bible study. Whatever you do, make Lent count this year!

China is often in the News these days.

Church ordered to replace name sign with political slogan as Chinese authorities step up 'sinicisation' campaign

Chinese authorities have forced a church in Jiangxi province to paint over its name and replace it with a communist slogan, "Follow the Party, Obey the Party, and Be Grateful to the Party," amid increasing attempts by officials to 'sinicise' (make Chinese) Christianity.

Late last year The True and Original Source of the Universe church in Ji'an city was also ordered to remove a painting of a biblical figure from a prominent position and replace it with a portrait of China's President Xi Jinping, surrounded with communist party slogans.

Days later, officials locked the doors and windows and confiscated the keys to the church, which is registered under the state-sanctioned Patriotic Association, preventing the congregation from gaining access for worship. Elsewhere in Jiangxi province, elderly members of an unofficial house church, operating outside of the Patriotic Association, were told by the authorities in Poyang county that their retirement pensions would be stopped if they continued to gather for worship. Officials also removed crosses and religious banners and replaced them with portraits of President Xi and Chairman Mao Zedong.



GARDENING WITH THE RURAL FOCUS GROUP.

Climate Change has climbed higher and higher on the global agenda as our planet suffers devastating events 'weather' related events. The latest and one of the worst thus far - the bush fires in Australia that, at the time of writing, are still not fully under control. Although not directly caused by a single Extreme Weather Event, the combination of exceptionally high temperatures and exceptionally dry weather has caused major tragedies involving people and wildlife.

Here in the UK, various parts of the country - including the south-east suffered flooding that affected business and residential communities. Stories hit the headlines for a few days but even now many people continue to suffer the consequences. Whereas it is possible to make strategies to deal with regular weather-related occurrences it is very difficult to plan how to deal with Extreme Weather Events which, by their very nature, afford little warning.

We tend to consider Climate Change in isolation whereas in reality it cannot be separated from Food Security and Environmental Degradation. Aligned to this we have no finite knowledge of how Brexit will affect food imports (availability, quality and prices) nor are we certain that government legislation regarding environmental standards

will, at the very least, match the current structure imposed by the

'The environment...'the countryside'... is fundamental to the British psyche yet it is not always understood that it is primarily a workplace for our farmers and growers. Each and every one of us can play a part by backing them (their standards are among the very best in the world) by actively seeking British-grown and reared food. That way we help to preserve the nature of the landscape, aid the nation's food security, benefit the economy and help to nurture that sense of unity that will be even more important in the coming months.

The pheasant I see before me Once walked in this the wood, He stood proud then and flew wide winged



Eastling School News


