Commissioning of Caroline Ramshaw as an Anna Chaplain

6th February 2022, 10.30am in Eastling Church

A few months ago I wrote about becoming an Anna Chaplain for the benefice of Kingsdown and Creekside and High Downs.

What is an Anna Chaplain? Anna Chaplaincy is a specialised Ministry for those of our elderly population. I can visit the elderly either in their own homes on in a care home, I can listen to them, pray with them and assist with bringing communion to them? An Anna Chaplain is someone who accompanies older people at this stage of their lives and can promote spiritual welfare. However, I must state here that being an Anna Chaplain is a service offered to those with much, little or no faith, whatever that faith may be.

As an Anna Chaplain I can be a catalyst for change, an enabler, an advocate, a listener, a friend and a navigator through the journey of growing old.

Anna Chaplains can enable spiritual care, spiritual care is not necessarily religious. Spiritual care offers love, friendship, comfort and hope in ways that are meaningful to those concerned.

Spiritual; support can enable older people to live more peacefully in their later years and be better prepared to face the end of their earthly life.

I am being commissioned as an Anna Chaplain on 6th February at our morning worship.

This month's message is from Lissie Bayford, Licensed Reader

How would you describe yourself? How do others see you? Do others see you as you see yourself or do they see something different? I was asked to reflect on this recently and to select a number of adjectives that I would use to describe myself, and then to ask friends and family to select adjectives that they thought would best describe me. It was an interesting exercise, and one of the things I found fascinating was my reaction to the adjective 'religious'. Two of my friends described me as 'religious' and I was quite upset! I don't describe myself as religious, so it set me thinking about the word.

'Religion' has connotations for me of orthodoxy, of rigid rule-keeping, of adherents who think that they alone hold the truth, and therefore put themselves at odds with others who think differently. Religion, sex and politics are the subjects most likely to spark conflicting opinions, and indeed religious differences have been the cause of innumerable wars, conflicts and persecutions. These are all things that I cannot align myself with and have no part to play in my relationship with God.

However, I recently read that the word 'religion' derives from 're' meaning 'again', and 'ligios' meaning 'connection', as in the word 'ligaments'. So it would seem that religion is intended to connect us again. This feels much more like it! For me, religion should all about connections — connecting us with ourselves, connecting us with each

other, connecting us with the plant & animal life around us, connecting us with the whole of creation; essentially connecting us with God who through Christ connects with us through all these things. The world doesn't need any more division or separation. When we see ourselves only through our own lenses, when we see other people as 'my tribe, or *not* my tribe', when we see creation as inferior and disposable, then we separate ourselves from God who is the creating, reconciling, loving power behind the universe.

Here in Doddington, we have started something called 'Eat Pray Walk'. We meet on Friday afternoons in the church car park once a month to walk gently together through our beautiful countryside for about 45 minutes, ending up at the church where we share refreshments and plenty of homemade cake, and finish off with an opportunity to give thanks to God and to ask for help where we need it. It's not about signing up to anything. It's not about fundraising. It's not about judging you or telling you what to think or how to live your life. It's about connecting with God through ourselves, each other, and creation and sharing the journey whatever our experiences. The next one is on 11th February meeting at 1.30pm. You'd be made very welcome.

Through the unparalleled extravagance of the places he lived in and loved, we'll take a dive into the extraordinary life of the man who Orson Welles famously satirized as Citizen Kane - the same man who changed the face of journalism forever and built 'the greatest publicity machine in history', but died paying rent to his creditors

After leaving Stowe School, Mark worked for twenty years as a plumber in London. George Herbert, priest and poet Celebrated on 27th February.

If we were to name someone prominent from the 17th century, we might mention Rembrandt or Shakespeare. It is unlikely we would remember George Herbert. However, he was a prolific writer, a gifted speaker and musician. His hymns are still sung today.

Herbert was born into a wealthy family in Mid-Wales on 3rd April 1593. His father was a Member of Parliament who died when Herbert was three years old. His mother moved her large family to London where, aged 12, Herbert entered Westminster School. In 1609, his mother remarried, and Herbert left home to be a student at Trinity College, Cambridge.

By the age of 23, Herbert had graduated with two degrees. He was fluent in Latin and Greek and in 1620 was elected as the University's Public Orator. He held this position for seven years, and for a short time was MP in his hometown in Wales.

Although Herbert was securing an illustrious future and his speeches had gained the attention of King James 1, he was restless. He felt God was calling him to the priesthood and much of Herbert's poetry expressed his inner spiritual conflicts.

When the King died in 1625, and two influential patrons also died at about the same time, Herbert responded to God's call on his life and gave up his secular ambitions. He married in 1629 and became a priest in a small Anglican church in Bemerton in Wiltshire.

Here he found inner peace at last, serving God in the local community. His poetic talent continued to flourish along with his musicianship as a skilled lutenist. After only three years as a priest, he died of tuberculosis on 1st March 1633. He was 39.

Some ninety of Herbert's poems have been set to music by such composers as Ralph Vaughan Williams and Benjamin Britten. His most well-known hymns are Teach me my God and King, Let all the world in every corner sing and King of glory, king of peace.

A number of artistic commemorations of Herbert exists in several churches and cathedrals including a stained-glass window in Westminster Abbey and a statue at the front of Salisbury Cathedral.

The Rev Tony Horsfall, a former missionary in East Malaysia and then retreat leader based in West Yorkshire, considers the slow and steady type of Christian.

Loved nonetheless

Here is a thought on a verse of Scripture from the encounter of Jesus with a man described as a 'rich, young ruler'.

This man was keen to follow Jesus, but when told he must share his wealth with the poor decided it was too much to ask, and he went away sorrowful. In this context we read that, "Jesus, looking at him loved him (Mark 10:21)."

This is a remarkable statement about Jesus, and the nature of divine love, a love that doesn't alter despite the ups and downs of our behaviour. It is constant and unchanging, truly without condition, and unshaken by the unpredictability of human response.

We might have expected to hear Jesus say, 'You foolish man' or 'You stupid boy', but there is no such rebuke, only love. Jesus might have been annoyed, disappointed, exasperated, alarmed, shocked . . but all we feel is His love for someone who has missed a great opportunity.

What a joy it is to know that Jesus loves us exactly as we are. When He looks at us, nothing is hidden from His gaze. He sees through all our pretence, all our subterfuge, all our attempts to put on a brave front. He knows who I am, completely. And yet He loves me unreservedly and without reservation. Amazing.

Why walk away from a love like that?
