Easter Message

Easter is a season of renewal, of hope, enduring love and transformation that marks the Christian faith. It tells the story of Jesus' life, his death and his resurrection, a pivotal moment in our history, 2000 years ago, that has shaped our beliefs and practices for centuries. At its heart, Easter is a celebration of faith, forgiveness and reconciliation, that shows us as much about God the Father's love and his purpose as it does in Christ the Son's sacrifice for mankind.



The story of Easter begins with Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem, where he was hailed as a king by the crowds. However,

his message of love and compassion was seen as a threat by the authorities, who arrested him, tried him, and sentenced him to death, then nailed him to a cross. Despite this. Jesus remains faithful to his mission, even in the face of betrayal, pain and certain death. He forgave his enemies, prayed for his disciples, and ultimately surrendered his life for the sake of others. What love!

But the story does not end there. On the third day after his death, Jesus rose from the dead, fulfilling all the prophecies and promises of God in the Scriptures. His resurrection is a testament to the power of God's love and grace, and it is the foundation of our hope as Christians. Through his sacrifice and triumph over death, Jesus offers each of us, those who will accept him, the gift of eternal life and the assurance of forgiveness and reconciliation with God.

So, what lessons can we learn from the story of Easter?


First, we can learn the value of faith and perseverance in the face of adversity. What appeared an unspeakable tragedy, has become a glorious victory over sin and death. Jesus' unwavering commitment to his mission, even when it meant suffering and death, is an example of the kind of faith that can sustain us in difficult times. Jesus' willingness to forgive his enemies and pray for his persecutors, in spite of their hatred, shows us the transformative power of forgiveness and the potential for reconciliation even in the most difficult situations. Oh. how we need this in our world today, especially as we

think of what's happening in the middle east and in Ukraine.

Finally, we can learn the meaning of hope and renewal. Easter is a time of new beginnings, of letting go of the old and embracing the new, setting new priorities and allowing Jesus to be our Lord and example. It is a time to reflect on our lives, our faith, and our relationships, and to renew our commitment to God and to each other. In a world that is so full of pain, suffering, and despair, Easter offers us the hope of a brighter future, a future where love, justice, and perfect peace prevail - a life where we can each rise above our circumstances - even when it looks impossible.

In conclusion, the story of Easter is a powerful reminder of the enduring truths of the Christian faith. It invites us to reflect on our values and to seek the renewal and hope that come from a deeper relationship with God, in Christ Jesus. As we celebrate this season, may we be inspired by the example of Jesus, and may we be renewed in our faith, our hope, and our commitment to love and serve others. 

Otterden and Stalisfield W.I.

Steven Beck, as a volunteer of the South Foreland Lighthouse at Dover, kindly gave the Otterden & Stalisfield W.I. Group a wonderful, detailed talk with a slide show on this National Trust property. (With a little help from his wife, Sylvia!) The Lighthouse ensures that shipping is alerted to the presence of the Goodwin Sands, a 10 mile sandbank. Quite apart from the history of the building, it was interesting to hear of the personal details of the Knott family, of whom 5 successive generations with 8 family members were involved in the lighthouse keeping. It is thought by historians that during the period 1730 to 1910 that the Knott family had probably been the longest serving family of lighthouse keepers in history. We had a good turnout for this popular speaker and we will be visiting the Lighthouse later in the year for a tour conducted by Steven.

At our next Meeting on the 2nd April, a Member of the Road Safety

Team from K.C.C. will be giving a presentation on Road Safety for Mature Drivers. Two short video presentations will cover motorway driving, motorway breakdowns, Smart motorways and eco driving, as well as topics specific to the over 65's, such as decline in peripheral vision, reduced mobility and impairment through prescribed drugs. 



News from Citizens Advice Swale

Are you struggling to pay your council tax bill? It's a difficult time for people who are battling rising costs for food and essentials - as well as seeing their bills creep up.

There is support available and you might be entitled to pay less, or not at all, depending on your circumstances.

For example, if you're the only adult living in your home, your council tax bill can be reduced by a quarter.

When the council works out how many people live in a property, there are certain 'disregarded' people that don't count and this can reduce your council tax bill, such as under-18s, full-time students and people with severe mental impairments.

If you or someone you live with is disabled and your home has been adapted, you can ask to be placed down one band.

Swale Borough Council also offers Council Tax Support, which is designed for people on low incomes, and can reduce the amount of council tax you have to pay.

And lastly, if you're struggling to pay for essentials, your council can reduce your bill further, or cancel it altogether, under what's known as a 'discretionary reduction'. This usually only happens if you can provide evidence that you're suffering severe hardship and can't afford to pay council tax.

Whatever circumstances you're in, if you're struggling with your council tax payments, it's important to let your council know. Citizens Advice Swale is also here to help you find a way forward, should you need our support.

It's a yearly paradox. You've brought some flowers to the churchyard to lay on the

grave of a loved one. All around you are graves and headstones, reminders of the inevitable end of life's earthly journey. But it's Easter Day, and from within the church you can hear the singing: 'Jesus Christ is risen today, Alleluia!' Perhaps then you notice a few other things. You're standing among the fresh daffodils and the grass that's suddenly green and growing again. For a moment you pause and reflect on the reverse of an old saying. In the midst of death - we are in life! That essentially is what Easter is about - an annual reminder that death is not the end of the story. Cookham, in Berkshire, was once

the home of the great 20 th century painter, Stanley Spencer. Perhaps his most famous painting is 'Resurrection in Cookham Churchyard', which depicts local residents - many of them recognisable village characters rising up out of their graves to be greeted by the risen Jesus, standing in the church porch. It's a glorious, vivid, shocking reminder of a great assertion. The graveyard is not a terminus, but a junction.

The resurrection of Jesus (and hence our resurrections, too) is the defining claim of Christianity. Christians don't follow the teaching of a prophet who died many centuries ago, or of a holy man whose life is an example to follow, excellent as that may be. They put their trust in a Saviour whom they believe is alive and with them now, and they also

believe that through Him they too will move through the junction of death to the journey that lies beyond - a journey he talked about to His followers.

The annual paradox lies in the inescapable fact of death, indelibly represented by those graves and headstones, and in the equally inescapable fact that - in apparent defiance of all logic - human beings down the ages have clung to the belief that death is not the end.

Every culture has its story of the life beyond - the Elysian fields, Valhalla, Nirvana, Abraham's bosom. But only with the coming of Jesus, and the witnessed events of that first Easter morning, has our instinctive belief been given wings. The paradox is the heart of everything. Death is a fact, but life is greater than death. 'Because I live', said Jesus, 'you will also live'.



24th April - Mellitus, the Saxon pagans, and St Paul's Cathedral



Our present bishops have big troubles within the Church. Mellitus had big troubles outside the Church.

It all began quietly enough in Rome, where Mellitus was born into a noble family, and became abbot of a monastic community. Then in 601 Pope Gregory the Great sent him to help Augustine, who had arrived in Canterbury in 597.

In 604/5 Augustine consecrated Mellitus to be first Bishop of the East Saxons. Mellitus settled in the capital, Londinium (London), and his wooden

cathedral stood on the site of what is now St Paul's

Mellitus began to evangelise but struggled to make any progress. The Anglo Saxons were very attached to their pagan temples and celebrations. Then Pope Gregory had an inspiration: he told Mellitus not to destroy the pagan temples and banish the pagan feasts. Instead, he should *adapt* them. So, Mellitus simply cleansed the Saxon temples and removed the Saxon idols. He then re-dedicated the buildings to God and re-directed the pagan Saxon feasts towards Christian feast days. Bede reports that Pope Gregory had reasoned: "If the people are allowed

some worldly pleasures ... they will more readily come to desire the joys of the Spirit." The Pope was right – the new approach certainly transformed and spread missionary endeavour throughout the Saxon kingdom.

But then, in 616, Kent and the East Saxons had two new kings. These new rulers reverted to paganism but demanded that Mellitus still give them the Eucharist.

Mellitus refused, was banished, and then fled to Gaul for safety. When it was safe to return, he got as far as Canterbury, where in 619 he was chosen to be the third Archbishop of Canterbury.

News from our County Councillor

The deadline for Kent councils to submit their interim proposals for Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) has now passed, with a joint submission being sent to the government on 21st March. While this marks a key milestone in the process, it has raised more questions than answers about how the transition will be funded and implemented.

The submission reflects the concerns of Kent County Council, Medway Council, and all district and borough councils in the county. Rather than putting forward a definitive roadmap for unitarisation, the response highlights a range of unanswered questions. Chief among them is the issue of funding. Will the government assist with the costs of transition, or will local authorities be left to foot the bill? Many councils in Kent are already facing significant financial pressures, and without government support, reorganisation could put further strain on services. There is also uncertainty around whether the government will provide financial relief to help clear existing council debts, an issue that has been exacerbated by rising demand for local services and ongoing budget constraints.

Although no firm decisions have been made on how Kent's local government should be structured, four key options are being explored in more detail. These options would determine how Kent's districts and Medway are grouped

together into new unitary authorities, potentially replacing the existing county and district system. However, with so many factors at play - including public service boundaries, local identities, and financial sustainability - there is still much to be decided before any final plans can be submitted ahead of the November deadline.

As the process unfolds, it is likely that new restrictions and challenges will emerge. The government's response to Kent's submission will be key in determining what is possible and what compromises may be required. For now, local councils and residents are left waiting for further clarity on what the future of Kent's local government will look like.

I sincerely hope Kent's response gets some clear answers from

government, as the public will finally be given a chance to have their say on these plans over the summer. I firmly believe we should all have been given more opportunity to have a say before progressing this far, and hope that the responses to the consultation will be given the weight they deserve. Time will tell.

With so much still up in the air, one thing remains clear: this reorganisation will have a lasting impact on how services are delivered in Kent for years to come. Ensuring that the new structure is properly thought through and adequately funded will be essential to avoiding unnecessary disruption and ensuring the best possible outcomes for residents.

PALM SUNDAY and HOLY WEEK

13th April - Palm Sunday,

Jesus at the gates of Jerusalem

Churches remember how Jesus arrived at the gates of Jerusalem just a few days before the Passover was due to be held. He was the Messiah come to His own people in their capital city, and yet He came in humility, riding on a young donkey, not in triumph, riding on a war-horse.

As Jesus entered the city, the crowds gave Him a rapturous welcome, throwing palm fronds into His path. They knew His reputation as a healer, and they welcomed Him. But sadly, the welcome was short-lived, for Jerusalem would soon reject her Messiah, and put Him to death. On this day churches worldwide will distribute little crosses made from palm fronds in memory of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem.

17th April – What is Maundy Thursday?

Maundy Thursday is the 5th day of Holy Week. 'Maundy' comes from the Latin word for command, 'mandare'. On this day the Church looks back to Jesus' command to His disciples that they should: "Love one another as I have loved you."

On the evening of Maundy Thursday Jesus shared the Last Supper with His disciples, before going on to the Garden of Gethsemane and being arrested. It was the last evening He had with them before His crucifixion.

18th April - Good Friday, the day the Son of God died for you

Good Friday is the day on which Jesus died on the cross. He was crucified at 9am in the morning, and died six hours later, at 3pm. It is the most solemn day in the Christian year and is marked by the removal of all decorations from churches. The custom of observing a period of three hours' devotion from 12 midday to 3pm on Good Friday goes back to the 18th century. The 'Three Hours of the Cross' often take the form of an extended meditation on the 'Seven Last Words from the Cross', with periods of silence, prayer, or hymn-singing.

19th April – Easter Eve or Holy Saturday

Easter Eve is the last day of Lent. It is the day between Good Friday and Easter Day, and represents the one full day that Jesus was dead. It is a day of quiet reflection and anticipation for Christians worldwide.

20th April - EASTER, the most joyful day of the year for Christians

Christ has died for our sins. We are forgiven. Christ has risen! We are redeemed! We can look forward to an eternity in His joy!

Hallelujah!

The Good News of Jesus Christ is a message so simple that you can explain it to someone in a few minutes. It is so profound that for the rest of their lives they will still be 'growing' in their Christian walk with God.

Finally, why Easter eggs? On one hand, they are an ancient symbol of birth in most European cultures. On the other hand, hens start laying regularly again each Spring. Since eggs were forbidden during Lent, it's easy to see how decorating and eating them became a practical way to celebrate Easter.

We have music, gaming, craft, table tennis, table football, outside games in the Summer, craft table, tuck shop (everything 10 - 50p), free cake and drink.


