

Message for the Month

Hello friends

I am writing this just after a fundraising Open Mic event was held at Doddington Church. It was a fabulous afternoon packed with local musicians of all genres from blues, jazz, acapella, shanties and more, coming together to celebrate the power of music. Some of it was toe-tapping with lyrics as familiar as favourite shoes; some of it was gentle and evocative, drawing forth memories long forgotten; some of it was beautiful, transcending time and place. Who among us doesn't have at least one favourite song? Music has that ability to cut through barriers - to bypass the rational and to speak directly to the heart; to linger in parts of the brain when dementia has robbed the power of speech; to bond and unite people of different sides - those who sing in choirs will testify that it's hard not to love people when you sing together.

The power of music goes back to the mists of time. The bible writers knew it:

'the trumpeters and musicians joined in unison to give praise and thanks to the Lord' 2 Chronicles 5:13.

When we are joined together in music-making something

very powerful happens to us our physicality and our sense of community. 'Sing and make music from your heart to the Lord' Ephesians 5:18-19. God wants us to express our emotions, to bring our authentic selves to him. Music can be a means of us connecting with God, and a means of God connecting with us too, speaking through the movements of the heart and the lyrics that will not let us go. What is your song? What hums in you to accompany your days, to soothe sorrow, to encourage joy? Is there a refrain to hold you and remind you how much you are loved?

Music sustains hope in difficult times - amongst many examples, the early gospel songs soothed the souls of oppressed people shackled to a life of slavery. Our world is increasingly a difficult place where fear and anxiety seek to take the upper hand. Might music be one of the ways that God can use to to calm us, to unite us, to reassure us of his love and to tell us 'You are the sunshine of my life, that's why I'll always be around!







News from Citizens Advice Swale

Are you worried about debt and rising bills?

With energy, water and broadband bills on the rise, it's getting increasingly difficult for many people to cover their expenses. It's important to know you're not alone in finding things difficult and that financial support might be available to help ease the burden.

Checking benefits eligibility

A significant number of eligible people don't claim the benefits that are available to them, so it's important to understand what you're entitled to. You may be able to claim benefits if, for example, you're at working age and on a low income, you're sick or disabled, are of State Pension age with a low income or no income, or if you're a carer. Contact us for help with checking you're receiving everything you're entitled to.

Reducing outgoings

If you claim benefits or are on a low income, you may be eligible for a reduction in Council Tax. Discounts can also be given to students, those living with a carer, or people who live alone, to name some examples. If you have children and claim certain benefits, or are on a low income, you may qualify for free school meals, transport to school, or support with the cost of uniform.

We may be able to help you pay for things like energy and water bills, food or other essential costs, through the Household Support Fund. Contact us to find out more. To reduce other expenses, you may be able to switch to a cheaper broadband deal, get a water meter fitted, or access discounted travel options. We can help with this too.

Creating a budget and prioritising bills

If you're finding it difficult to stay on top of bills, budgeting tools like the one on the MoneyHelper website can be very useful in helping you understand what money you have coming in and going out each month.

If you're behind on bills, you should prioritise paying rent, mortgage payments, Council Tax and energy bills, as these are known as 'priority' debts which have the most serious consequences if missed. Once you've got priority debts under control, you should look at credit card or store card debts, missed Buy Now Pay Later payments or payday loans. Whatever debt you're dealing with, it's important to speak to the person or company you owe money to as early as you can. You could show them a copy of your budget to let them know what your financial situation is and then see if there are any steps you can take to start dealing with your debt.

Just remember, you're not alone and we're here to support you.

CLIMATE CHANGE IS HAPPENING.

The Met Office has issued a number of warnings concerning the possibilities of wild fires in the UK following warm, dry weather. Kent and Sussex are included. At the time of writing, some farmers and gardeners are concerned by the prolonged lack rain.

A study undertaken by the University of New South Wales suggests that 40% could be wiped off the global economy in the event of a 4C rise in temperature. According to the researchers, this figure takes into account ways in which economies around the globe are tightly connected by financial systems, supply chains and trade. According to the World Meteorological Organisation, global temperatures are expected to rise by 3.5C this century.

Environmentalists are pointing out that massive problems could arise in regard to food production, including in the UK. Farmers are brilliant at adapting but such a massive change in temperature would be very, very difficult - as it would likely to be accompanied by drought and wildfires.

At the time of writing most parts of the UK are enjoying warm weather and blue skies while other countries are threatened with flooding; central USA could record what would normally be four months' rain in just one week. While fears of this Extreme Weather Event were growing, other parts of the US have been suffering devastating wildfires fuelled by excessively dry weather.

Last year torrential rain caused millions of pounds of damage to Nepal's largest hydropower plant. Currently repair work remains incomplete. Nepal had committed to reaching net-zero by 2045 but inevitably success is threatened in a country that is largely dependent on hydropower.

Some parts of India experienced temperatures of 1.3C above normal in February. Last year the country recorded its highest- ever temperature: 50.5C.

Following Mr Trump's tariff impositions, global supply chains are under pressure including some of the parts needed in clean energy production.

Good news related to Climate Change and the environment is rare and so a report that Australia is recording a 40% decline in plastic pollution along the coastlines of major cities is very welcome. Further, the country has pledged to reuse all plastic waste by 2040.

Considering the scars on Jesus' hands...

The ordeal is over; the scars remain

"Unless I see the nail marks in His hands and put my finger where nails were, and put my hand into His side, I will not believe it." (John 20:25)

How patient Jesus was, in giving 'Doubting Thomas' a second chance! Earlier, the risen Christ had said to His disciples, "Peace be with you!" (verse 19). And it is only because of those scarred hands that His peace is made available.

There have been many religious leaders in history – but only one had scars as the proof of what He had achieved. It is also evident that - after Christ's bodily resurrection - the scars were never obliterated. "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe" (verse 27).

The ordeal was over – but the scars remain – for ever. At the end of time - in the future New Creation – our Lord Jesus Christ will still have those scars, when He is affirmed as 'the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world' (Revelation 3:8). The apostle Peter himself echoed the timelessness of the Cross of Calvary (1 Peter 1:20). The Cross and Resurrection form the centrepiece of our entire human story.

The scarred hands... It is vital that one and all should receive the lesson that Thomas learned that day: "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed" (verse 29)

There is no such thing as a Dog Poo Fairy

Concern has been raised about the amount of dog mess left in our village. As well as being generally unpleasant, dog excrement can cause toxocariasis, leading to serious health issues like breathing problems, seizures, and blindness, especially in children.

It is a criminal offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 for anyone to fail to clean up after their dog when it fouls



any footpath, highway, verge or other open space to which the public have access. Failure to pick up and dispose of dog mess is an anti-social offence and you could be fined £250 or face prosecution. You won't be offered a pass if you say you didn't know, and not having any bags is not an acceptable excuse either, so make sure you have some with you when you leave your home.

Please clean up after your dog and help make our village a cleaner place to live.

Danger on rural roads

Did you know that driving on rural roads is more dangerous than driving on urban ones? According to the NFU Mutual's Rural Road Safety report for 2023, the number of lives lost on rural roads was a staggering 70% higher than on urban highways. Also, collisions on rural roads were around four times more likely to result in a fatality than on an urban one.

The reasons as to why this should be include: changing speed limits, blind corners,

field entrances, narrow carriageways, single lanes with no hard shoulders, limited or no road lighting, mud and debris on the road, livestock and wild animals on the road, and agricultural vehicles.

And so it is that the NFU has campaigned to improve rural road safety, and it has now published its 'Code for Countryside Roads' to guide people as to how to drive safely. More info at: https://www.nfumutual.co.uk

Update from your local MP Helen Whately

A lot of people think catapults are just kids' toys. Yet I am receiving more and more emails from people sharing stories about how they are being used to cause devastating harm.

That's why I am campaigning for them to be classed as 'offensive weapons' so the Police have the powers they need to take action. I have been told how catapults have been used to knock out people's teeth, seriously maim or kill pets and wildlife, as well damage property including shattering car windscreens and breaking house and shed windows. Reports about the damage catapults cause is growing more serious and more widespread.

I have been working hard to change the law. Last year, I led an initiative with other Kent MPs pressing the Home Office to do more to tighten up on catapults.

In January I met the Policing
Minister to push for them to be
classed as offensive weapons and
grant the police the right to
confiscate them.

I am now looking at whether I can get the forthcoming Crime Bill amended to achieve this. In the coming weeks I will be asking more questions in Parliament and following up with Ministers to keep up the pressure.

Sometimes anglers use a special kind of catapult to spread bait – but there's no reason for anglers to be affected by a crackdown on catapults used as weapons.



Why you should draw your curtains at night (especially if you live in the country)

Most of us draw our curtains at night, in order to ensure privacy. But there is another very valid reason: to help protect local wildlife.

It seems that insects who live in the countryside are very susceptible to bright lights, which can badly disrupt their overall health and general behaviour.

As one scientist explained: "We don't know exactly how fatal it is, but one estimate is that 33 per cent of all the insects attracted to light die before morning. And even if they don't die, they're spending all their time at the light instead of doing the things they're supposed to be doing."

Light pollution is now seen as adding to what some scientists have called "insect Armageddon", with a 75 per cent decline in insect populations in 30 years.

As one scientist said: "Small individual actions such as drawing curtains can make a big impact to our smallest creatures."


