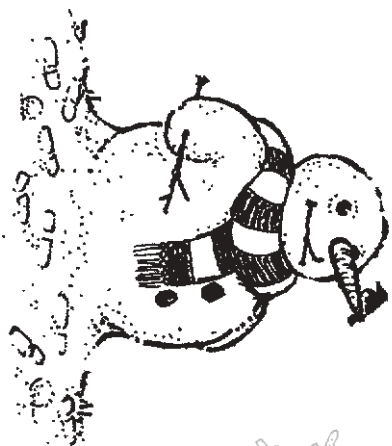

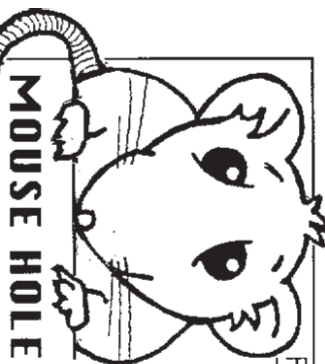

### Chocolate Snowballs

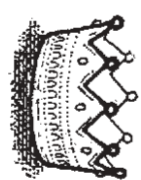
A yummy treat to make with left over Christmas cake.

1. Put a sheet of baking parchment on a tray.
2. Melt 150g of dark chocolate in a bowl over a pan of hot water.
3. Chop / mash 500g of fruit cake into crumbs, gradually add the to the chocolate and stir in well.
5. With CLEAN HANDS taking 2 teaspoons of the mixture at a time, roll into balls and put on the baking parchment.
6. Melt 350g of milk or dark or white chocolate in a bowl as before.
7. Put one cake ball at a time on a fork, dip in the melted chocolate until covered. Leave on the tray to cool...then share with your friends.

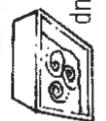

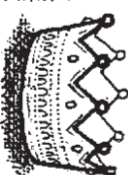

Message for the Month

Imagine the feeling of loss when you have finished reading a book in which you have enjoyed following the lives of certain characters, and you really would like to read a sequel. Or, perhaps worse, imagine a favourite T.V. soap ending - the characters are so real. We share their experiences and really want to know what is going to happen to them.

We usually think of the New Year as a new beginning, a fresh start, but, perhaps, it is much more like a sequel to the old, a continuation of the story of the previous twelve months.

There were so many experiences, some of them happy, some sad. Some so important that they have left their mark on our soul or our character; and, much as we feel last year is behind us, these experiences will inevitably affect us this year.

To a certain extent each day is like that. We are creating sequels all the time. The behaviour of the child (or puppy!) today is often the result of our treatment of him yesterday. If we were too busy, or couldn't be bothered, to check his naughtiness yesterday, he will try it again today, with even more determination. If he "gets away with it" again, the following day will be even worse. Conversely, if we keep him happy and good today, by administering discipline with a large helping of love and attention, tomorrow is much more likely to be peaceful and happy.

Almost everything we do today is contributing to the sequel which life is writing for us. Many of us are concerned about the permissiveness of young people today; their lax morals, their drug-taking, their peculiar attitude to life. If we are middle aged, we look back on our own youth and



say in shocked tones "We were never like that in our young day." Of course we weren't. But, weren't the middle aged people saying that same thing about us? None of us stop to think that the actions of the present generation are the result of the actions and attitudes and circumstances of the former one.

Unwise decisions made at the end of the 1939-45 war led to political divisions and persecution 20 years later. Are we now living the sequel of arming one country against another? What was done, was done, and the form of the sequel was already decided.

So often we see only the present moment, and we do what seems best at that moment only to find much later that, if we had looked ahead to the sequel which would inevitably come, we would never have acted as we did.

In the realm of thought and word we must think of the result. It is so easy in moments of thoughtlessness to say something, even as a joke, which will have a very unhappy sequel.

Solomon in his wisdom realized that we are creating sequels all the time. He gives us good advice in the book of Proverbs. We read in chapter 23, verses 17 and 18 (RV) "Be thou in the fear of the Lord all the day long, for surely there is a reward". This does not mean that our lives must be ruled by fear of what God will do to us if we don't please Him. That is a negative way or life and will bring an equally negative sequel. "The fear of the Lord" means reverence for God which leads to obedience to His Laws. Of course, we need to know His Laws before we can obey them, but many are given to us in the Bible and others have come to us through man's developing knowledge of the physical world and man's needs. So we have

learnt, for example, that cleanliness, good food, sufficient sleep, and love and contentment, lead to a healthy body and a healthy mind. We know that if we neglect them the result - the sequel, will be illness of mind or body sooner or later.

Right down through the ages men have felt that there is a sequel to life itself, that death is not just the end. Some thought they would come back to earth in another form. Others thought they would go on to a similar life elsewhere, burying utensils, food and weapons with the dead to equip them to begin a new life. Others have thought that the soul wanders in purgatory waiting to be released by the prayers and money of their loved ones who are still on earth. The religious men of Christ's day argued about it, but Christ was explicit in His teaching. He knew that there is an after-life and that in all certainty it is a sequel to this life. He told stories to illustrate this: The ten virgins (Matt 25. 1-13), the sheep and the goats (Matt 25. 31 - 46). He showed that heaven is not just a reward but a glorious sequel to a life of preparation. So we see that our attitude to God, our acceptance or rejection of His love will determine our future. We are already writing the sequel. The future life will be a continuation of the story of this life.

So, as we go through this year, may we be careful to keep the laws of God, to think not only of the moment, but of the result which will come from our actions and words. Let us not "grow weary in well-doing" or lose confidence in God, for surely there is a sequel, and the content of it is in our hands; but with the help of God it can be successful one.

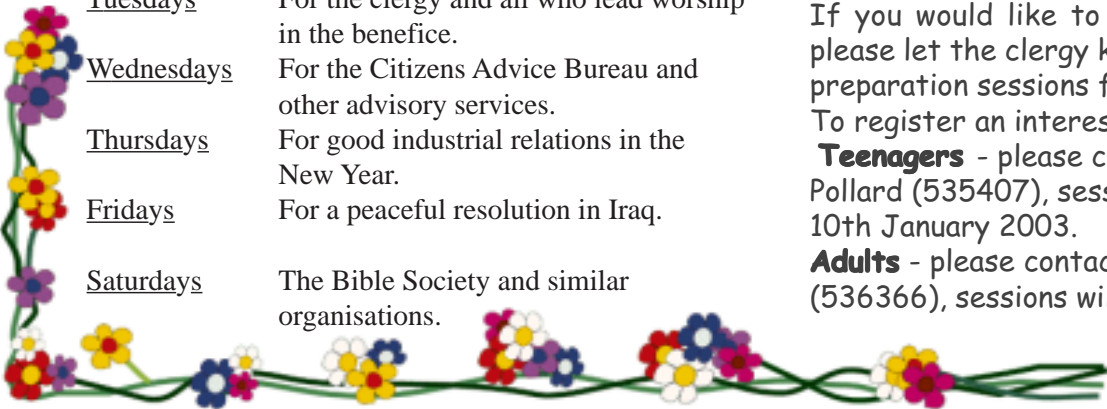

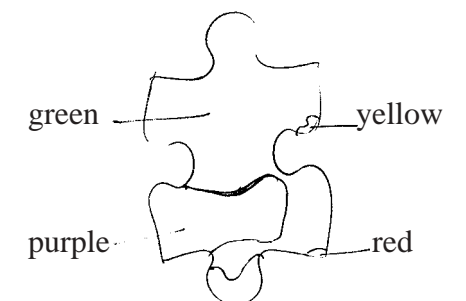
### The Missing Piece

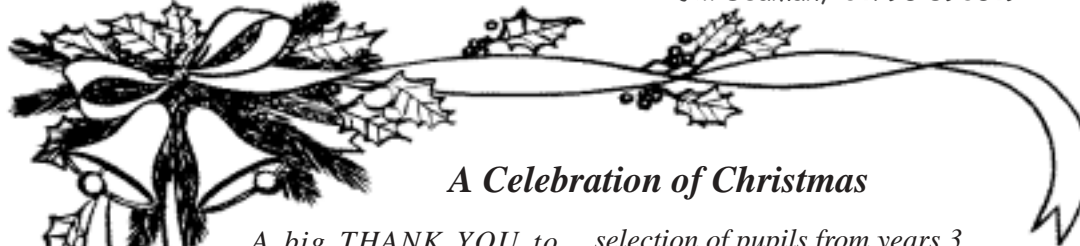
