





performance delighted a packed house on the evening of Saturday 12th December. The fabric of the original tale was stretched and moulded to accommodate an unfrocked Santa with two sprightly reindeer, a surgeon who eventually rescued Little R.R.H. from the wolf's belly with the assistance of his singing and dancing nurse and a surprise appearance of 007 James Bond himself. A cast of 11 children provided the chorus and acted as patients receiving the most implausible diagnoses from the G.P., who scattered corn to the groans of his audience.

The basic saga of wicked skulduggery was carried magnificently by the ferocious alpha male wolf with his two scarv pack members, who thoroughly earned their boos and catcalls whenever they passed through the audience. Virtue was upheld (just) by a skilfully overplayed, slightly wacky Little Red Riding Hood whose charitable conveyance of goodies through Spuckles Wood to her totally plausible granny, set the scene for the story. In the course of the action not a trick was missed funds.

Great writing

A brilliantly produced and directed from traditional pantomime cues and response was guaranteed from the enthused audience.

In order to frame all of this action. ingenious beautifully painted scenery seemed to expand the cramped Stalisfield stage to enable a woodland glade to be portraved. which was finally transformed to an operating theatre in which the improbable surgeon rescued Little Red Riding Hood, who emerged pertly from inside the wolf, in a cunningly executed theatre scene.

All this was ably backed by the backstage crew who performed their essential magic without perceptible hitch. Lighting and sound were provided by Alan and Maggie, who spent a lot of time installing their equipment for our benefit and to such good effect.

The Low Expectation Theatre Group will never be able to play under that name again. pantomime must rate as the very best of Village enterprise. The only regret is that it really was a onenight-only production.

New Year's Honours

We are all familiar with the Queen's New Year honours list, which celebrates peoples' significant contributions in life. But what would God's New Year honours list look like? Who are the people he chooses to honour?

Psalm 1 gives us an answer to these questions. The person who is blessed by God is compared to a tree: 'he is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither. Whatever he does prospers' (3). They are strong and well-nourished, able to cope with drought and storms, while being fruitful.

Will this be a true of us during 2010? By contrast, we can be more like bonsai trees. whose growth has been stunted. St BATHILD: 30th January reading doesn't seem to delight

No. I hadn't heard of her before either but Bathild, whose feast day is 30th January, had a very interesting life.

She was born in England in the 7th century and while only a young girl she was carried off by pirates and sold into slavery in France. She was bought by Erchinoald who worked for the king of the Western Franks, Clovis II

Bathild must have been very unusual because, in time, Clovis made her his wife. When her husband died she became Regent for their son. She built monasteries and nunneries, and did all that she could to stop the slave trade which had brought her to France.

From a slave to a gueen is a big step. When her son became king. Bathild joined one of the numeries she had founded. From a slave to a queen, to a servant of God

died aged 65, on the 18th November 2009, after a long illness. Beloved husband of Gill, father of Peter and Robert, father in law of Beth and Sarah and grandfather of Rupert, James and Lucinda. Funeral service was held at St. Mary, Stalisfield, on the 25th November. Donations to the R.N.L.I., c/o C.W. Lyons & Sons Canterbury, CT1 1ND, 01227 463508. Mr Wallace was a parishioner in Eastling from 74-78 and then Stalisfield from 88-2000, when he moved down the hill to Charing, although he still attended Christmas eve services in Stalisfield. "In the bleak midwinter" seemed more appropriate at St Mary's Stalisfield than other less exposed spots. He felt particularly attached to the church in Stalisfield, since he walked the dog past it every day, and arranged several fund raising auctions for the church in the 90's.

Using a diary to pray in 2010

Life without time for prayer and reflection can easily spin out of control. With so many pressures and demands pushing in from all directions these days, the need to step back and find ways to commune with the Divine is essential. Using a diary to pray is not just a resource for writers. There is no wrong way to do it. In this age of technology, it may be a much welcomed luxury to engage in writing several longhand pages each day you can carve out the time. Whether your words take the form of your own stream-ofconsciousness, or a letter to God or to yourself, listen. Pay attention. Be honest. Pray.

Diaries are windows. They allow you to see a glimpse within the deepest part of you, and to let light shine into the darkest corners of your soul. These pages (and God) can handle anything you write in them. Try trauma, drama and self-pity. Then listen to the soothing echo of release. This is prayer. Try tantrums, confusion and anger. Then listen and let go. This is prayer. Try questions, hopes and dreams. Then listen and let your soul rest. This is prayer. Try gratitude, praise and wonder. Then listen and let yourself celebrate. This is prayer.

When you take time for inner reflection and waiting, quieting your inner self before God, you will see and hear the things of God. Turning your attention away from outer concerns, you will enter into light and discover God's kingdom within. Once things are visible and committed to the realm of conscious thought, then light can shine on its pages and offer a respite. All witnesses will be present - your heart, your thoughts, your spirit, your mind, your emotions, and God. The words in these pages prove you are human, alive, for better or for worse. They create honesty with yourself and intimacy with God.

Prayer is a song of the heart and inside these words will be woven melodies of thought and explorations of discord, creating harmony and a wholeness of spirit, true freedom. A diary is a meeting place, a tool for prayer, where God can fill your memories with reminders of his faithful presence, enlighten understanding with healing, and centre your heart with a steady peace.

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


