sports and youth clubs remain. On Thursday 15th Jan we open up


our school for parents to come to our "Book Look" when they can tour the school with their child to



"We saw ... and we came"

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, *Magi from the east came to Jerusalem* and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to *worship him.*" (Matthew 2:2)

The visit of the wise men is celebrated on 6th January; the season of *Epiphany* (Greek: the 'Manifestation' of Jesus to the non-Jewish world of the Gentiles). These eastern visitors highlight the theme of Jesus as Universal Saviour. They 'saw his star when it rose'. If 'the star' had been simply a

combination of, say, Jupiter and Halley's comet, then these learned men from Mesopotamia might have been interested and even excited but it would have hardly have signified to them the one, unique and life-changing event that required a 300-mile journey! Don't even try to reduce the star of Bethlehem down to something like a conjunction of planets – or you will never grasp what happened. This was a supernatural event, greater even than the crossing of the Red Sea or the gathering to heaven of a godly man in a fiery chariot.

These were learned men – but also

And Matthew 2 has nothing to do with astrology or horoscopes. It connects with the supernatural happenings in nature that highlighted each stage in the life of Jesus – the dove (his baptism), the shining light (transfiguration), the darkness and earthquake (his death), the cloud (his ascension). Hence the star around the time of his birth. So "We saw ... and have come."

1. There are those who see – but don't 'see.' It took Gentile visitors to shame Jerusalem and its leaders. Every generation has to be educated afresh about Jesus Christ, the world's Messiah!

2. There are those who see - but don't come. All saw the star, and the local scribes knew the prophecy of Micah 5:2 that the new King would come from Bethlehem – but ironically it was the Gentile visitors who alone made the pilgrimage.

3. There are those who do see - and do come. From Herod onwards right up to today – murderous efforts are made to wipe out all reminders of the Babe of Bethlehem. But in the current unprecedented and astonishing advance of evangelism world-wide, the international worshippers of Jesus form the widest and fastestgrowing family of belief ever! **Richard Bewes**

Looking to the future

With the retirement of the Rev'd Angela Cheeseman from active ministry, there will need to be some changes made to the schedule of services within the Churches of the Benefice. Secondly, after much prayer and some discussion, the ministry team running the Free Style service at Eastling Church has suggested that the service format has run its course and needs to be renewed. The process of assessing our worship needs and initiatives will go along side the Benefice wide forward planning project that we are beginning in the new year. We are going to be facing potential changes in ministry resources and financial capabilities as we look forward to the next two to four years. This is why it is going to be important for us all to be involved in the discussions that are going to be taking place in the future. The first set of discussions will involve the leadership people in the various churches. This will then be followed by some facilitator lead morning or daylong workshops later in the year.

None of us like changes, particularly changes we seem to have little control over. This is why it is important for as many people as possible to be involved in this discussion process. If you have ideas, suggestions, interest in moving our churches forward, please feel free to get in touch with any of the Wardens or PCC members. We will all be making lists and keeping track of interest and support for the future of our churches.

I started this column with the statement that there will need to be some changes to our current service schedule. The

realignment of the Parishes into the new Benefice of High Downs was done with the intention that the regular ministry of the three churches (and Otterden Chapel) would be accomplished with the ministry leadership of one part time stipendiary priest available on Sundays and two days per week. Now, with Angela's retirement from active ministry, our ministry resources are our two Readers, Hugh Perks and Norman Fowler, with Caroline Ramshaw in training to be a licensed Reader. So, how are we going to provide the leadership for the services we currently have at the times we are currently holding the services? At present we have a Holy Communion BCP service at 8 am every Sunday in Eastling Church. We also have a 10 am service every Sunday in Eastling Church in one format or another. Both Throwley and Stalisfield churches have two services per month at 10 am, alternating Sundays. The 10 am service on fifth Sundays of the month is a Benefice wide service rotating between each of the three main churches.

What I am going to propose for the 10 am service for the next several months as we go through our forward planning will be the following:

At Eastling Church

First Sunday of the month Holy Communion CW Second Sunday of the month Morning Praise – a new format of contemporary Morning Praver Third Sunday of the month Morning Praver BCP Fourth Sunday of the month

Young Style or Cafe Style (alternating)

At Stalisfield

First Sunday of the month Morning Prayer Third Sunday of the month Holv Communion (BCP and CW alternating)

At Throwlev Second Sunday of the Month

Morning Prayer Fourth Sunday of the month Holv Communion (BCP and CW alternating)

This schedule will change my contact with Stalisfield and Throwley to one Sunday per month. I propose to be regularly involved with the Morning Praise service at Eastling and one suggestion is that this could become a teaching service with the sermon focused on questions from the congregation or on teaching sessions on various topics or books of the Bible.


And – on the happy side - the Church of England last year found January to be the top month for couples getting engaged! Perhaps a New Year brings a desire for new love and a new commitment in our lives.

Biblical Cooking

If you can prepare this dish without looking up the references in the Bible, you should be on Mastermind! It is suggested the Authorised Version is used. Ingredients :

- 250g of Judges 5:25 (end);
- 2 250g of Jeremiah 6:20;
- 3 1 tablespoon of 1 Samuel 14:25;
- 3 of Jeremiah 17:11; 4
- 5 250g of 1 Samuel 30:12;
- 6 250g of Nahum 3:12 (chopped);

50g of Numbers 17:8 (blanched and 7 chopped);

8 500g of 1 Kings 4:22;

- 1 2 tablespoons of 2 Chronicles 9:9; 9
- 10 a pinch of Leviticus 2:13;
- 11 1 teaspoonful of Amos 4:5
- 12 3 tablespoons of Judges 4:19

Preparation: Mix 8, 9, 10 and 11, and put them aside. Beat 1, 2 and 3 to a cream. Still beating add 4, one at a time. Mix in 8-11 then add 5, 6 and 7 and beat again. Then add 12. Bake in a low oven for 1.5 hours


