


Parent and Toddler Group



Painter's Forstal village fete will be on Sunday 8th August at 2pm on Lorenden Meadow, Whitehill.




Granville Wheler 1929 - 2004

Mourners from Kent and Yorkshire joined together for the funeral of Granville Hugh Hastings Wheler at the Chapel of St. Lawrence, Otterden.

The historic chapel, full of memorials to the Wheler family, was packed for the service taken by Revd. Penny Fenton, Priest in Charge.

In an address by Mark Granger, land agent for the Otterden and Ledston Estates, it was underlined that Mr Wheler had been passionate about both estates and the people who lived and worked them.

Mr Wheler was born at Syndale on November 6th, 1929, when a peal of bells was rung at Ospringe Church to mark the event. As a child, the family spent the year split between Kent and Yorkshire.

During the war, he was sent to Lakefield Preparatory School in Ontario and, on his return, attended Eton and gained a place at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he read law.

After university he joined the army, where he learned surveying skills which were later put to good use on both estates.

Mr Wheler's involvement in forestry was not confined to design. He loved his woodlands and always wanted them maintained to a high standard. The 1987 hurricane was an enormous shock to him.

His methods of extracting timber from the woods was ingenious. Mr Wheler designed and laid a horse-drawn railway track reflecting his love of railways. The Otterden and Boardfield railway had level crossings and a loading bay.

Mr Wheler had a great love of history and an encyclopaedic memory of events concerning his ancestors and the estates. He gave talks to the Castleford Historic Society and visitors during Civic Trust weekends.

He viewed his ownership of both Otterden and Ledston as one of stewardship, maintaining and improving them for those who followed.

He was a religious man with a strong faith and was at Ledston Hall chapel the week before he died.

He supported many individuals and groups including the First Faversham Scout Group, known as Wheler's Own.

During his address, Mr Granger revealed Mr Wheler had established the Wheler Foundation, a charitable trust into which both estates now pass.

"For all of us who knew Granville, some of us for all our lives, we will miss him," he said.

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FROM THE ORGAN SEAT

On 15th May I had the pleasure of playing for the wedding of Katie Dolman to Craig. Carol and Ron were there to make us all welcome. Katie and Craig live in a lovely village, Appleford-on-Thames near Abingdon. Katie, escorted by Ron, walked to their tiny church and everyone sang brilliantly on a splendid warm, sunny afternoon. The organ is a gem! (Now are not all organs gems in Vicky's eyes?! Well, not quite; I try and write about the good ones!) This organ was still as it was built originally apart from having an electric pump added, a genuine Samuel Green sound! It was a tiny chamber organ, built in 1777 by a renowned organ builder of the time, Samuel Green. In May, 1855, it was presented to St. Peter and St. Paul. Appleford by Theobald Esq. of Sutton Courtney, the nearby bigger village. Sutton Courtney and Appleford share a wonderful priest, Revd. Helen Kendrick, no relation to the famous Graham! She took a great service and Katie and Craig knelt on the wedding kneeler borrowed from Ospringe St. Peter and St. Paul! (Pam Bell, who stitched it with her Mum, was delighted to learn of its use). The organ has one manual and eight stops and a kick pedal. I had a good practice on it the day before and chose pieces which I thought suited that organ. Katie came in to Wagner's Bridal March and left to Mendelssohn's Wedding March. During the Signing of the Register I played Mozart's Adagio for a Glass Harmonica and I was delighted with all I played. It was a lovely day which we were delighted to share with the Dolman family and friends and meet Craig's family too.

I liked this, written in the Second Century A.D. "Live not as though there were 1000 years ahead of you. Fate is at your elbow. Make yourself good while life and power are still yours" Marcus Aurelius Antoninus, A.D. 120 to 180.

It reminds me of the message written on the wall of Champion Hall, Painter's Forstal, by that lovely Faversham stalwart, George Champion, and which I must write down next time I visit the Hall.

This is from a letter to "Evergreen". 'Spotted on a Church Noticeboard!' "When you were born your mother brought you here, When you were married your partner brought you here, When you die your friends will bring you here, Why not try coming on your own sometimes?"

Yes, I can recommend taking part in the worship in our churches here in Ospringe and The Benefice!

Please does anyone know about the World War One Grave of 201145 Private W.J.Hadlow, Gordon Highlanders, died, Age 25 on the south side of the Church? The Parish Council has added some poppy wooden crosses.

London Marathon 2004

I ran in the London Marathon in April, and have been asked by Good News to tell of my experience.

The Marathon started in 490 BC. The Athenians won a battle at Marathon, about 40 kilometres or 25 miles north east of Athens. A man called Pheidippedes ran to Athens to give news of the victory. He delivered the message and then collapsed and died.

Given this start it is amazing the marathon ever caught on as a sporting event!

In 1896 the Olympics were revived with the Marathon as a key event. In 1908 the Olympics were held at the White City in London. By this time the Marathon distance had grown to 26 miles. The Marathon started at Windsor Castle, waved off by the Royal Children.

When Queen Alexandra arrived at the White City, she noticed that the finish was the other side of the stadium. She demanded that the finish should be moved to underneath the Royal Box. The officials did this, and that is how the Marathon became the classic distance of 26 miles and 385 Yards.

An Italian, Dorando Pietri won the marathon. He had collapsed in the stadium, run the wrong way round and was then carried to the finish by officials. I now know how Dorando felt. If only the Royal box had been somewhere else perhaps the distance would have been shortened. Still, no one carried me, and I definitely didn't run the wrong way!

Then, in 1981, Chris Brasher – who was a member of the team that paced Roger Bannister when he ran the 4-minute mile – thought that we should have a regular marathon in London.

However, most people thought it would fail to attract more than a few entries. They were wrong!

It is now far and away the biggest marathon in the World with 33,000 finishers. The majority of these finishers were in front of me in April, but some were behind me.

But why did I want to run the marathon? When I was on holiday in Australia 3 years ago I broke my right leg – both bones – this was on the first day and it did spoil the holiday a bit. Being disabled, even for a couple of months, brought it home to me how fortunate able-bodied people are. I vowed to run a marathon when I got fit.

Training.

Over the winter I ran along the A2 and around Faversham town centre, as it was too dark to run in the lanes. I struggled through the cold, and dark, and rain – it even snowed on a couple of occasions. I live in Water Lane and I knew when I was nearly home, as I could smell the chips at Ospringle Fish Bar. Reg Tumber helped out with the training, providing us with 42 copies of Good News to deliver at the end of every month.

Then Spring arrived. Marvellous, I could then run through the lanes, over the fields, finish at the church. This really is a most attractive Parish, and it is a pleasure to run round it. Towards the end of the spring training, Reg again helped out by extending our Good News paper round – adding in Lewis Close and part of Lower Rd.

The Big Day.

It rained, and rained, and rained. I was soaked through but the crowds and bands along the course kept me going. Someone said "At least it kept you cool". They were right, 5 hours in the rain certainly does keep you cool, The course takes one past many famous sights, such as The Cutty Sark, near where my husband was born, though he me tells it has changed since the Boer War. Tower Bridge, twice, over once at 13 miles, and then a loop back under at 22 miles. The cobbles at 22 miles are great 'fun' but I did get a lot of encouragement from the Beefeaters (but no gin).

Then Big Ben, nearly home, the Palace and it's over. A medal and a silver foil blanket. Desperate for something to eat and drink.

I saw some amazing sights on the route, people running through all the emotions, tiredness; pain; high spirits; fear; elation; pride; each with a personal victory at the finish, irrespective of their time (but I will mention that I was in front of Jeffrey Archer and the Coughing Major).

I am so impressed with the runners who dress as Rhinos. How do they do that? So heavy, so awkward. They deserve their medals, their moment of triumph against adversity.

And for the record: Paula Radcliffe holds the women's world record at 2 hours 17 minutes 18 seconds. Paul Tergat the men's, at 2 hours 4 minutes 55 seconds, and I did 5 hours 25 minutes 23 seconds – Plus over £400 for Macmillan nurses (donations still accepted).

And finally.....
Women weren't allowed to run Marathons until the 1970's - too far for the fair sex!!!

This year for the first time, visitors will be able to see a Grade 1 listed property of outstanding national historic and architectural importance The Abbey Barns are the most substantial remaining buildings of Faversham Abbey founded by King Stephen and Queen Matilda in 1147.

This is a unique opportunity to visit places such as The Mayor's Parlour, where the oldest Cinque Ports charter will be among ancient documents on display, the 16th century Old Grammar School with its rudely carved names and initials of generations of Faversham schoolboys, the Guildhall with its council chamber, Chart Gunpowder Mills and many, many more.
