The Canon's Column

One of the projects on my desk at the moment is the prayer card for lighting a peace candle and a booklet of prayers for peace that are to be our benefice project as we remember the centenary of the beginning of World War I on August 4th. We have been reading and watching various items in the newspapers and on television or radio looking back to the time of the first war and the great changes it brought to our world.

I have suggested that between Aug. 3rd and Remembrance Sunday, we light a candle and pray for peace at the beginning of our services. I know, from previous experience, that people appreciate resources to help them focus their prayer time and so a booklet of prayers for peace will help us all to pray regularly for peace.

So often, when events happen, great disasters or tragedies, we want to do something but we don't know what would be appropriate. I can remember taking a service in a nursing home after a terrible disaster in another country. Several of the residents asked me if I had heard about it and said how helpless they felt. They so much wanted to do something even in their limitations. I suggested three things about prayer that they could try. Firstly, we begin with prayer whenever something catches our attention, upsets us, or concerns us. Prayer is always the place to begin. Secondly, we begin by


asking the Lord to guide us. When we pray this way we are opening ourselves to the Lord's presence and we are allowing Him to speak to us and to work through us. Thirdly, when we feel there is nothing we can do because of distance or our own limited situation, praying and sharing our prayerful concerns with others will open opportunities for the Lord to work in the world.

I believe in prayer. I believe prayer works because in prayer, we are opening up to God about our significant concerns, sharing with Him our own lives and relationships. When we do this we are ready for Him to talk to us.

In my own prayer life, I have learnt that when I pray for something, I must be ready for God to say to me "if you are sincerely concerned about...., you must be part of the solution by.....' It doesn't happen all the time, but often enough for me to realize that prayer is significant interaction with God.

As we look ahead to marking the centenary of the beginning of the First World War on August the fourth, we need to remember that from before the turn of the 20th century and until now, there has not been one year when there has not been warfare somewhere in the world. Praying for peace and being willing to help peace come about could be a redemptive act and a fitting memorial for the beginning of the First World War.

Forgive and Forget

In fact, if you forgive, it is easier to forget. That's the finding of a recent study which lends weight to the advice that it is best to do both.

It seems that when you are a victim of a transgression, the best thing you can do is to forgive. If you do, you will be more likely to ignore the precise details of what happened, and you will be able to move on more

quickly. The ability to overcome your strong emotions against someone and also to quash the memory of something you want to ignore are both linked to the same mechanisms in your brain. The research was done at the University of St Andrews. It also revealed that if you choose NOT to forgive, then the details of the scenario of the 'crime' remain in your mind in greater detail. As one psychologist explained: "It is well established that to forgive others can have a positive benefit for an individual's physical and mental health. The ability to forget upsetting memories may provide an effective coping strategy that enables people to move on with their lives."



David Winter looks back at possibly the most devastating war in history...

The Battle of the Somme -

the WW1 battle that changed history

On 1st July, 98 years ago, two vast armies went to battle in the Somme area, in north-eastern France. A week of heavy shelling preceded the Allies' attack. It is recorded that 1,738,000 shells fell on the rich fields either side of the Somme river during those seven days - though goodness knows who counted them. With the deafening roar of the big guns in their ears, the allied soldiers emerged from their trenches to be met with the inevitable hail of bullets from the German machine guns. By the end of the first day's fighting over 60,000 British soldiers were casualties and no less than 19,240 had been killed. The most devastating battle of modern times - and possibly of human history - was under way.

The Battle of the Somme, as it was called, was the first to see tanks and aircraft employed on a large scale. It was fought along a 25 mile front. The battle involved vast numbers of men -British and soldiers from no less than eight countries of the Empire, French and German - and more than a million of them were eventually killed or injured. As the generals

poured more and more troops into the battle in the vain hope of what they called a 'breakthrough', nothing much happened beyond the constant slaughter.

The battle went on through August, September and October and only ended, on November 18th, when the utter futility of the whole exercise seemed to dawn on both sides. As they counted the casualties - 420,000 British, 200,000 French, nearly half a million Germans - they could also

calculate the net gain of all that bloodshed. The Allies had pushed the Germans back all of six miles. It

was later worked out that for every mile taken 88.000 men lost their lives. There were amazing acts of valour and heroism in the course of the battle. No fewer than 51 Victoria Crosses - the highest award for gallantry in battle - were won by British combatants. At home, the press tended to focus on such heroic deeds rather than on the carnage on the battle-field, but the truth eventually emerged. To misquote Winston Churchill, 'Never in all the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so many'. Every town, every village, every family would bear the scars of suffering for years to come.

Lessons were learned, of course most obviously the futility of trench warfare. Battle and war would never be the same again. Face to face, inch

by inch, cold steel to cold steel, knee deep in mud men fought and died. All across northern France the millions of graves still bear their silent testimony to the dedication and courage of young men who had their lives snatched from them in battle. Mars, the god of war, had had his greatest moment, though his appetite was not quite satisfied yet.

Lest we forget
