Message for July



In June, Year 2 at Eastling Primary School visited St Mary's Church as part of a project looking at why certain buildings are sacred. Andrew, as Churchwarden, welcomed the teacher and pupils and as well as telling them something of the history of the Church, he gave them all an opportunity to play the organ – which they thoroughly enjoyed.

Before the visit he and I were talking about why, when the first churches were planned, it was the custom to lay them out facing east. Which encouraged me to check out this fact. The Dictionary of Liturgy and Music*, which I felt to be a reliable source, states under the heading Orientation:

"The deliberate alignment of Christian worship, and the construction of places designed for Christian worship, on an eastward, oriental, axis. Though the pagan practice of facing the sunrise no doubt played a part, Christian liturgical prayer is directed to Christ, the rising sun, whose return is looked for."

Other sources make this point in different ways including references to the altar standing at the east end of the chancel, in an area known as the sanctuary.

As often happens, when you start to research one fact you then come across a range of other interesting information. For example, that until the late Middle Ages there were no seats in the nave, although there were stone benches which went around the walls for those who were too frail to stand for a long time. As sermons got longer and longer, sometimes up to two or three hours, seating began to be required and hence the introduction of pews.

Reading about the length of sermons reminded me of something else I learned just recently.

Last year I became a Non-Executive Member of the Chapter of Canterbury Cathedral, which includes becoming a Lay Canon as part of that role at the Cathedral. I feel incredibly fortunate to not only have held this role at St Paul's Cathedral in London for nine years, but to now be associated with Canterbury's magnificent Cathedral,

much closer to home, and which has been in the background of my life, and that of my family, for many years.

I was asked if as a Member of Chapter I might consider giving a homily one Sunday in the Cathedral as part of Evensong. Unsure of what a homily entailed I was reassured to learn that these addresses are more of a personal reflection on life and faith and are a maximum of 5 minutes.

We are all blessed with amazing opportunities to learn new things. The pupils who visited Eastling Church learned something about sacred spaces – and what it is like to have a go at playing the organ.

The churches in our Benefice, whether small and perfectly formed, or on a mid to larger scale, are all wonderful buildings with their own histories and unique way of enabling us to experience God's word, and we don't need to be in a sacred building, church or Cathedral, to encounter God or be amazed by the wonder of Creation.

In the Song of Solomon in the Old Testament there are these evocative words: "For now the winter is past, the rain is over and gone. The flowers appear on the earth, the time of singing has come and the voice of the turtle-dove is heard in our land." (Song of Solomon 2:11-12).

The early churches were planned to face east, where the sun rises bringing light and a source of inspiration. We haven't seen much of the sun yet, but in these days when dawn comes early, heralded by bird song, new growth appears in our countryside, and we have the promise of light for longer. Our spirits are lifted, people smile more, and we feel more positive about tackling some of those problems sitting on our shoulders, and there is the continuing promise of inspiration.







The Rotary Club of the Weald of Kent held its annual North Downs Walk on Sunday 9th June. We enjoyed ideal walking weather, the best turnout and one of the best results in recent years.

The event is a sponsored walk in support of Cancer Research UK and of the walkers' own choice of good causes. With a variety of routes from 1 mile (fully paved, therefore suitable for wheelchairs or baby buggies) to 9 miles including a climb up the North Downs, we attracted a full range of ages and abilities of walkers, including Guides, Air Cadets, keen hikers and some family teams. Almost 400 walkers had preregistered and downloaded sponsor forms via the Weald Rotary website and many more entered on the day, making a donation to CRUK. There were over 450 walkers in total. Early indications, based on the pledges on walkers' sponsorship forms are that the Walk will have raised about £24,500 once Gift Aid is included, of which about two-thirds will go to CRUK and the rest to causes nominated by the walkers. Geoff Haffenden, president of the Weald Rotary Club, said, "This is a fantastic result and a real community effort involving the walkers, volunteers, local farmers and of

Chas Bedford, chairman of the organising committee paid tribute to the small army of volunteers who acted as route marshals, greeted walkers at checkpoints, registered walkers and sponsor forms, and

staffed the kitchen – producing 500 ploughman's lunches, strawberries and cream, and hot and cold drinks. "A lot of walkers have praised how friendly and professional our helpers were. I want to thank all of them. I also want to thank Family Funeral Service, our event sponsor, who have underwritten all our expenses, meaning that every penny raised in sponsorship has gone to the charities and not to overheads."

Rotary is committed to protecting the environment; all of the disposable lunchboxes, cups and cutlery were Vegware compostables, and were accepted by KCC for composting. Other waste was separated into categories for recycling, leaving almost no 'general waste' going to landfill.

Weald of Kent Rotary have been running the North Downs Walk since 1985, missing only 2020 due to lockdowns, and plan to continue running it as long as there are walkers. Next year will be both the 40th Walk and the 50th anniversary of the club. The provisional date is Sunday 8th June 2025.

It's difficult as a scientist to hear information that is fascinating, but which also involves so much suffering for other people. I worked for a time in a leukaemia research lab. We had to let other people's pain drive our research without it crippling our ability to concentrate on our work. But, during lockdown, I found myself – as a biologically-educated bystander – avoiding looking into the science of COVID-19, because the reminders of its impact on people's lives were everywhere that I looked.

One of the ways I managed my own feelings during the pandemic was by digging deeper into what God has revealed to us about His character, letting that fuel my faith, my prayers, and my actions. For more academic types like myself, study – particularly of the Bible – can be one of the primary ways we connect with God and hear from Him. It's not wrong to be comforted by books, so long as the contents turn our eyes upwards and outwards.

First of all, God hears: "The Lord is close to the broken-hearted' (Psalm 34:18a). In Jesus God took on human form, and He showed us His heart for

the world. When His friend Lazarus died, He wept (John 11). God is "the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort" (2 Corinthians 1:3).

Human sin has affected the whole of creation, and I believe this is largely the direct impact of our mismanagement of creation and mistreatment of each other. COVID-19 may well be another animal's friendly virus, pushed by human activity into causing havoc in bodies where it doesn't belong.

But God's world remains good. It is still fruitful, praising Him, as Psalm 19 describes. Even pictures of a deadly virus can seem beautiful – especially to a biologist! These good things are hints of the promised "new heavens and new earth" mentioned in the New Testament. One day "creation itself will be liberated from its bondage to decay" (Romans 8: 21), and for everyone who follows God, "He will wipe every tear from their eyes" (Revelation 21: 4).

Behind the debates about suffering is sometimes the assumption that God doesn't care. My experience is that God does care deeply, and He invites His Church to care for those around them – especially the most vulnerable. He is with us, He hears us and grieves with us, He helps us and promises a better future.

Four lessons from Sport

This summer will be dominated by Sport, with everything from Euro24, through tennis, cricket and motor racing to the Olympics in Paris. Despite the wide differences in the various sports, there are four things each athlete will have in common: focus, discipline, communication and commitment. Such things guarantee success in our Christian walk, too.

Focus. What is it you want to gain, above all things? Paul said: For me to live is Christ, to die is gain. (Philippians 1:21) That sort of commitment is the Christianity that will survive any persecution and hardship.

Discipline. Just as athletes immerse themselves in everything to do with their sport, surround yourself with Christian riches that will feed your mind and spirit. Deliberately choose good Christian music, read the lives of well-known Christians, and seek

out mature Christians for friendship and even mentoring. Christianity is like sport, it flourishes best when it is enjoyed with others!

Communication. What would happen to an athlete if he or she stopped speaking to their own coach, for weeks on end? So this aspect begins with Psalm 46:10: 'Be still and know that I am God.' Fundamental to your faith is your prayer life alone with God. Jesus said 'No branch can bear fruit of itself, it must remain in the vine. (John 15.4) The Psalms covers every aspect of our walk with God day by day - so if you don't know how to begin to pray, simply begin by praying the Psalms. And read the Bible every day. God speaks to us through the Bible and prayer keep the lines of communication open!

Commitment. This is nothing more than the resolve to keep going, no matter what the obstacles. Paul had a driving ambition: 'That I may know Him, and the power of His resurrection,

and the fellowship of His sufferings, being made conformable unto His death. (Philippians 3:10)

And the final result of all our efforts? 'Our citizenship is in heaven....' (Philippians 3.20).

We meet on 2nd and 4th Wednesdays of the month, 7 - 8.30pm in the village hall. It is free to come.


We have music, gaming, craft table tennis, table football, outside games in the Summer, craft table, tack shop (everything 10 - 50pm), free cake and drink.
