





The next day they went to the beautiful whitewalled town of Inveraray, the hereditary seat of the Duke of Argyll (Campbell Clan). Then on to Loch Awe, which is 22 miles long and in places I mile across. For years this Loch acted as a moat protecting the Campbells of Inveraray from their enemies in the north.



At the northern end is Ben Cruachan (3,689ft.) which dominates the Loch. Below the mountain are the Falls of Cruachan

and the pass of Brander where Robert the Bruce routed the Clan MacDougall in 1308.

Finally, on the journey home they passed through Moffat and Gretna Green; Moffat (an Annandale town) has a statue of a Ram in the High Street, symbolic of the surrounding sheep farming area and Gretna Green, famous since 1710 for the Smithy, was the first place over the Scottish border where young couples from England could be married without parental consent. In 1940 the law was changed to stop the Smith performing the ceremony, but the Blacksmith's shop still has the anvil over which couples were married. The coach travelled over the border, through the beautiful northern countryside back to Kent.

We looked at Pat's souvenirs and noted that Norman's ancestors were the Mackay Clan! Thank you to Pat for the interesting talk and also to Vicky for providing Scottish tunes to the hymns we sang at the beginning of the meeting.


