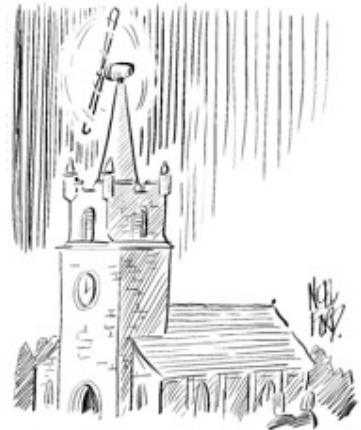

Prayer: a beginner's guide

The good thing about prayer is that there's only one way to go wrong, and that is not to do it. The best way to do it is to just get on and do it. If prayer at its simplest level is listening to God and talking to him, you don't need long books to tell you how to do it, you just need a conviction that prayer is a good thing to do, that you're someone God wants to hear from and that he's worth talking to.

Is prayer a good thing to do? Never mind for the moment about whether prayer 'works' or not: Jesus prayed and he encouraged his disciples to pray too, so if we're following him, we need to be praying. Full stop.

Are you someone God wants to hear from? The message of the Bible is that however unworthy, sinful and useless we may feel as human beings, God can't wait to hear from us and is sitting on the edge of his seat like a love struck teenager, hand poised ready to pick up the phone the second it rings.

Is he worth talking to? He's the one person who knows us inside out, the one person with infinite power at his fingertips, the one who has the true perspective on an entire world's story. Not a slot machine to pay into in the hope of one day getting 'an answer to prayer', but a person. Who likes us.

How might you begin to pray? What sort of a person are you? Do you like a good gossip? Then gossip to God. Are you the strong silent type? Then be silent in his presence. Say hello... say the Lord's Prayer ... say 'Oh God' and mean it... deliberately be silent and still for one minute ... read a story from a Gospel and imagine what you would say to Jesus if you were there... tell him about what is worrying you or thrilling you ... copy the great pray-ers of the Bible and of the Church... write a letter to him ... listen and look for a few moments in a place you consider holy... You can't go wrong. Prayer is good. God longs to hear from you. He's worth it.

A new team led by Revd. Caroline Pinchbeck, rather nervously took over the organisation of the Bluebell Walk this year from Peter and Angela Cheeseman. Both, however, still provided a huge amount of very welcome support and the team is extremely grateful to them.

On the day itself, we were lucky with the weather for the sixth annual bluebell walk. Despite some rather depressing forecasts, rain held off until around 2pm, by which time most walkers had completed their routes. Although some of the bluebells had in places just gone over, we were fortunate that in the main they were still beautiful.

About 250 people took part in the walks, which were of 3, 5, and 8 miles length. The majority did the short and medium lengths, but quite a few brave souls did the longest, which took in some stunning countryside through Divan Wood and Otterden.

We are grateful to the Otterden and Belmont estates, local farmers and shoots for allowing us to erect markers over their land.

Thank you to all the kind volunteers who helped organise the event, its publicity and put up (and took down!) the markers. They include Paul & Jane Hamley, Jane Baker, Sharon Clark, Julia Bailey, Liz Bell, Roy Piles, Janet & David Bensted and, of course, Peter and Angela Cheeseman. Thanks also to David Breaker who designed and printed all the maps, Helen Davies who produced the posters, and the Reid family for providing the marker posts.

We are delighted to announce that the sum total raised on the day for Easting Church was a tad over £1,200. A huge thank you to all those who contributed.

God the Three in One

On 7th June we celebrate Trinity Sunday.

The doctrine of the trinity is one of the most important of the Christian faith, for it goes to the very heart of what God is like. The Bible is quite clear: there is one God, but he is revealed in three 'persons' - the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Have you ever wondered at what point in the Bible God is revealed as being more than one person? Well, you don't have to read very far: only to the first chapter in Genesis, where God (Elohim - a plural noun) says: Let US make man in OUR image. (Gen. 1:26)

The Bible reveals a pattern: God the Father lives in heaven and has never been seen. God the Son became the incarnate Jesus Christ, who made known to us the Father, and God the Holy Spirit, who is unseen, has been sent to live within and to equip his people, the Church.

The Trinity is basic to our salvation - for these three persons in the one Godhead have combined to save us from our sins: it is the WILL of the Father, the saving WORK of the Son, and the indwelling WITNESS of the Holy Spirit. (John 14:16, 23-26).

Otterden Chronicles

In the winter of 1839 there was a murder at Otterden. According to records, it took place just yards from where I live at Bunce Forstal, The unfortunate woman who met her grisly end lived here, in a small cottage called 'The Wren's Nest', which fell down too many years ago to accurately record.

The woman's name was Hannah Giles and her assailant, one Samuel Seager, who was subsequently found and hanged. The murder of Hannah Giles and the trial of Samuel Seager are well recorded in an excellent book by Mark Mullins called 'Old Ashford Borough Murders'.

It appears that Hannah was shot and had her throat cut. The gun fire itself set light her clothes alight.

The motive seems to have been jealousy, as she would not reciprocate Samuel Seagar's attentions, though it is thought that they had once been friendly. It would appear that Otterden in the 19th century was quite a rough area. Difficult to imagine today, but on reading these accounts I often think that this would make an interesting television drama as it is an historical event. Even though the topic is macabre, the images of Otterden then, its landscape, the poor and ruling classes living side by side, the murder of Hannah and the trial and conviction of the villain, would make a more interesting television play than many seen today.

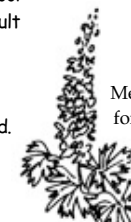
