

We are definitely moving towards a lovely season of the year for a village school with our beautiful field and sporting facilities.

Eastling School News

All the places in our new intake have not yet been snapped up so, if you have neighbours with children, please let them know about our school as we're finding it difficult to reach 'new' parents outside the village community. The education authority has not helped by doubling placements in each of the town schools, so it is possible you know people that aren't happy with the placement they've been offered.



The school recommences after the half term break on Monday 2nd June with all its after school clubs continuing as normal. So, on Monday we have Lego club, Photography and HUGG (gardening) club; Tuesday our Library (open to siblings), Study club and potential for a KS1 sports club if demand increases; Wednesday is Key Stage 1 sports, KS2 sports and ICT club; Thursday provides an Art club and KS2 sports whilst Friday is taken up with our popular Youth club, open to all.

Special events in June include the start of our excellent induction process for new parents with a New Parents evening on Tuesday 3rd June, when Mrs Pieroni will be available to meet new parents and their children. This is followed on Wednesday 11th with a Teddy Bears Picnic on our field for the new intake (and for other parents we have a whole school picnic on Friday 13th June)

The Friends of Eastling School group have some fantastic events planned for this month, including their second "Bottle day" on Friday 13th when children can arrive at school in nonschool uniform for either a monetary donation or a donation of a "good as new" prize for the FOES school fête (Due on July 13th- clear your diaries!!). They are also venturing into new grounds, literally, with a "Field disco" scheduled for Friday 20th June - all the fun of our usual family discos, but on our field!

There will be a surge of neatly presented, well coiffured children on the morning of Wednesday 11th June as the school class photos are taken if anyone would like a pre-school class photo taken, come up to school for 9:00am.

On Friday 6th June we have a special sporting activity day for our Tigers class as they attend the Margaret McMillan activity centre to undertake a long day of adventurous activities, including low ropes, tyre challenge, survival challenge and orienteering. We hope this will be the precursor to a Residential Week for our Leopards class which takes place on the Isle of Wight, commencing on Monday June 30th.

Would the Ark have floated?

Did you see the recent film, Noah'? Apparently the film got some y o u n g scientists thinking this Spring, and

they reached for their Bibles and computers. After numerous calculations, they came up with their verdict: Noah's Ark WOULD have floated, even with the weight of two of every kind of animal in the world (around 70,000 creatures) packed away inside of it.

It seems that a group of master's students from the Department of Physics and Astronomy at Leicester University analysed in detail the exact dimensions of the Ark, as set out in Genesis 6:13-22. The passage says that God instructed Noah to build a boat that was 300 cubits long, 50 cubits wide, and 30 cubits high - and all of gopher wood. The students averaged out the Egyptian and Hebrew cubit measurement to come up with 48.2cm, making the Ark around 144 metres long. Though it would have been a pretty tight fit for the animals, at least the ark would have floated.



Lest we forget

Ray Keen of Rooks Hill Cottage

Rav Keen was born in 1921 and died in 1958, aged just 36 years, but much happened in his short life.

He began as a horseman and later as a farm worker on the Belmont estate, before working for the Wheler family at Otterden. Ray was a sergeant in the Home Guard during the Second World War when he met his wife Elsie during her time as a land girl. They,

like many others, raised their children during the hard time of post war Britain. But Ray is best known for his help in the community; his tireless work in organizing happy social events such as whist drives, dances and particularly one which I remember, Father Christmas at the children's Christmas parties held in Stalisfield village hall during the 1950's. His life was short but he is not forgotten and his children grew, each making a success of their lives and a credit to his memory.

Barnabas

Paul's first missionary companion

Are you going to Cyprus on holiday this year? If so, spare a thought for the Cypriot who played such a key role in the New Testament.

He was Joseph, a Jewish Cypriot and a Levite, who is first mentioned in Acts 4:36, when the early church was sharing a communal lifestyle. Joseph sold a field and gave the money to the apostles. His support so touched them that they gave him the nickname of Barnabas, 'Son of Encouragement'.

Barnabas has two great claims to fame. Firstly, it was Barnabas who made the journey to go and fetch the converted Paul out of Tarsus, and persuade him to go with him to Antioch, where there were many new believers with no one to help them. For a year the two men ministered there, establishing a church. It was here that the believers

were first called Christians.



It was also in Antioch (Acts 13) that the Holy Spirit led the church to 'set aside' Barnabas and Paul, and send them out on the church's first ever 'missionary journey'. The Bible tells us that they went to Cyprus, and travelled throughout the island. It was at Lystra that the locals mistook Barnabas for

Zeus and Paul for Hermes, much to their dismay.

Much later, back in Jerusalem, Barnabas and Paul decided to part company. While Paul travelled on to Svria, Barnabas did what he could do best: return to Cyprus and continue to evangelise it. So if you go to Cyprus and see churches, remember that Christianity on that beautiful island goes right back to Acts 13, when Barnabas and Paul first arrived.

In England there are 13 ancient church dedications and not a few modern ones. Barnabas the generous, the encourager, the apostle who loved his own people - no wonder he should be remembered with love.

The Wav I See It: Remembering D-Day - the day the liberators came

had waited for so Under stormy skies and grey cloud and accompanied by a lengthy bombardment of German t h e positions from the

air, a huge fleet of ships set sail across the English channel. There were large naval vessels, but also hundreds of troop landing craft, packed with heavily armed soldiers, tossed up and down by the heavy seas. Some said afterwards that the sea sickness was worse than the eventual landing on the Normandy beaches, though I think there's a touch of bravado there!

The invasion of the Continent, aimed at driving the occupying enemy forces from the lands they had held since 1940, had been long expected, yet when it came the impact of the news was sensational. My own family had thought something was 'up', because my older brother, who was an RAF radar engineer (and emergency lorry driver) had been strangely out of touch for quite a long while. The reason, we later found out, was that he, with the entire invading force of some 150,000, was secretly encamped 'somewhere in southern England' awaiting the order to embark. Weather was one problem; the other was ensuring that the enemy was taken by surprise.

Then, on 6th June it happened. The news bulletins were slow to confirm that this was actually the long-awaited invasion - an 'action' was taking place involving navy, air force and army personnel along an unidentified French coastline.

70 years ago, on 6th Emerging from the sea mist, the June 1944, the invading force did indeed take the event much of German defenders by surprise for a Western Europe few hours, but quickly the defences were manned and it was under long took place. heavy fire that many allied troops stormed up the beaches and tried to secure positions on land. My brother drove his truck up one of those beaches on the third day of the invasion, and, as he put it, there were plenty of bullets flying around. At the same time, allied paratroopers had been dropped behind the enemy lines - a brave and risky undertaking, but one that again took the defenders by surprise.

The landings were along the coast of Normandy - an area well known now to British holiday-makers. The first major town to be captured was Caen, which was terribly damaged in the battle. Yet the French people were overwhelming in their welcome for the invaders, even though many homes were destroyed and villages all but flattened.

I remember a holiday many years ago when we visited Vers-sur-Mer on that same coast, a small seaside village where the invading army was largely British. There was (and probably still is) a memorial to the event, the wording of which I have never forgotten. Having recorded the date and details, it simply said: 'The allied forces, in freeing our little community, also began the liberation of the whole of Europe'.

'Liberation' is a wonderful word, and liberty a great human concept. As my brother and his colleagues made their way north through France, Belgium and then into Germany itself, they were welcomed (even in Germany, eventually) as those who were bringing the priceless gift of freedom to millions of people.

It is a gift to be cherished, never taken lightly, and never abused.
