
Although we had a hiccup on the Leopards' Residential this year, we still do intend to push in a range of activity days for them to make up for the sad cancellation of their annual overnight stay.

It's going to be a great month! Mr Dave Walsh, Head teacher









Canon's Column June 2017

As I sit down to write my last column for the High Downs' Parish Good News Magazine, I wonder what to say. My goal in writing these columns has always been to attempt to inspire the reader to see God's presence in the varying aspects and situations of life. One of the books on my shelf at present is "This Incomplete One". As I start to write this last column, the title catches me and makes me think that there is always an incompleteness when leaving an area or even when someone dies. The book is about some parents reactions to the death of one of their children. It is an inspiring account of how people were able to see God's presence in the midst of their grief and

Another book on the shelf is "A Letter *Not Sent*", which is about the continuing desire to communicate with those who have died before us. It applies to any relationship that comes to an end. What is there that still needs to be said on parting?

From the time our son was about three, my standard statement to him, when he was going out to play in the garden, was, "don't get lost, don't fall in, don't get wet." I said it so often that I don't think either of us paid much attention to the injunction, it had simply become part of our automatic communication pattern. One day when he, as a fourteen year old, was going out the door, I called him back to me, after repeating the mantra, "Son, what does it mean to you when I say, "don't get lost, don't fall in, don't get wet"? He came back in the room and in a voice and tone of a budding adult he said, "I have thought about that at different times, mostly I think you say it automatically as if I am still the three year old going out to play, but I sometimes think it still has a message for me; recently I thought about it and for me as a teenager, I think you are

telling me not to drink booze like some of my friends, don't fall in with the wrong group and I like to think that the "don't get lost" is your way of telling me not to lose my sense of values". He then left an awe struck father wondering where that wisdom had come from. Three years later, I repeated the mantra as we left him at the airport for a year as an exchange student; he looked me in the eve and smiled, both of us thinking about its meaning in this new situation.

As I plan my book packing and write this last column, what do I want to say as my parting words?

Don't Get Lost – I think my son summed it up best; 'you don't want me to lose my values". Our Christian faith has a set of values that have shaped our society and many of the great and inspirational people of our world. In our current age, our values and commitment to Christ can get lost in the midst of the expanse of media and information to which we are exposed.

Don't Fall In – falling into things is usually an inconsidered or mistaken act, be deliberate in the choices we make, understanding, as much as we can, the range of consequences each choice we make in life could bring to us.

Don't Get Wet- by this I mean don't let yourselves become saturated with things that are really of no consequence and may impede and distract you from those things of importance.

Finally I would like to leave you with the blessing of God's grace and presence that I have tried to present during my time here with you.






