



Thief on the Cross: Luke 23: 32-43

Luke's account of the crucifixion emphasises the mocking of the crowd, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself' (35,37,39). In their view a Messiah does not hang on a cross and suffer. In considering the man who was crucified with Jesus, we are also confronted with the issue of how Jesus secures salvation for us.

One Criminal's Taunts

The words of one of those crucified with Jesus reflected the crowd's taunts: 'Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us.' He highlights the question of Jesus' identity: how can he save others, when he cannot save himself from death? And yet, unlike his companion, he failed to see that the cross itself is the means of salvation.


OSPRINGE CHOIR NOTES





FROM THE ORGAN SEAT

In 2006 Faversham Choral are celebrating their 40 years. I well remember Fred Ash who helped to found it. He introduced me to Kent County Organists and was always encouraging me with my organ playing. It was a great honour to be asked to play for his funeral. Sometime in the late 70s Ospringe and Preston Choirs sang The Crucifixion at St. Catherine's. Fred was the organist for this and he was a delight with whom to work, a real gentleman too. Have you any memories of the early days of Faversham Choral? If so their Committee would be pleased to know. On Saturday, 19th March, at All Saints Whitstable, Faversham Choral are inviting everyone to Come and Sing Stainer's Crucifixion (see separate notice). We are wondering which daffodil will come into flower first as the buds are through in the churchyard.

There have been some wonderful snowdrops flowering on several graves and three clumps under the tree at the East End. They remind me that God keeps His promise to send the Seasons every year.

When I go to practise there are often folk sitting on the seats by the new memorial tablets in the churchyard. It is a splendid quiet spot in which to sit and often catches the sun. A stone in memory of Major and Mrs. Simmons has recently been added with the quotation "to the green fields beyond". Major Simmons served with the Royal Tank Regiment. Their flag is brown (representing "through mud", red ("through blood") and green ("to the green fields beyond"). The Royal Tank Regiment won the Battle of Cambrai (in Northern France) on 21st November, 1917 and it was at this battle that tanks were first used. The first prototype had been tried out in Chatham. Cambric Cloth comes from Cambrai. Their Regimental March is "My Boy Willie". Last Saturday, 12th February, I went with Kent County Organists to St. Margaret's, Lee, very near to Blackheath Common. It has recently been beautifully restored and they have restored the wonderful Victorian decorations. Clever lighting has made it much brighter. They have made several recesses into rooms, added a red carpet and made a tasteful sweep into a spacious crypt. There are 8 beautiful frescoes almost in the





pre-Raphaelite style too. Their 3 manual organ is well used and the organist, Andrew Scott is also the tuner for Harrisons. This church replaced a decaying one in 1841 and Samuel Sebastian Wesley gave the opening recital in 1842. In 1927 the organ was rebuilt for £3,450 and today after its recent restoration is valued at £350,000. Edmund Halley, of 'Halley's comet' who was Astronomer Royal, is buried in their old churchyard.

I saw this memorial wall tablet there and was moved by it.

In memory of MARIA, wife of John Henry Bolton of Lincoln's Inn and Lee Park.

Tender, affectionate and unselfish,

zealously devoted to her mission of wife and mother replete with unostentatious piety, endowed with sparkling wit and humour, and versed in that literature which calls forth all that is good and excellent in human nature.

She was an ornament to her sex and the delight of all who approached her. "Age could not wither nor custom stale her infinite variety"

She died deeply lamented 14th October, 1864.

So, what is Easter all about?

Easter is the most important festival in the Christian calendar. It is the commemoration of Jesus' death and his rising from the dead, also known as the resurrection. It comes at the end of Lent. The week leading up to it is called Holy Week.


Palm Sunday is the first day of Holy Week and celebrates Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem riding on a donkey. Crowds of people came out of the city to greet him, throwing down palm branches on the road. Our churches give out small crosses made from palm leaves, as a reminder of Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem and his death on the cross.

On Maundy Thursday we remember when Jesus ate the Passover meal with his disciples, breaking bread and drinking wine, which is now known as the Last Supper. Since then this meal has been symbolically re-enacted by many Christians as a way of drawing closer to God. This is called the Eucharist, which means 'thanksgiving'. It is a reminder that Jesus sacrificed his life for mankind.

The Bible tells us that, later that night, Jesus was betraved by Judas Iscariot. After his arrest, Jesus was brought before the Jewish high priests who found him guilty of blasphemy because he called himself the Son of God. They handed him over to the Roman governor, Pontius Pilate.

As was the custom at the time of the Feast of Passover, Pilate gave the crowds the choice as to which of two prisoners should be freed: Jesus, or Barabbas, a notorious criminal. Ironically, the the same crowd who had welcomed Jesus with palm branches a few days earlier now chose Barrabas to be released, and Pilate condemned Jesus to death by crucifixion.

On Good Friday, many churches have a time of devotion, meditating on the events leading up to Christ's death: his interrogation, flogging, the mocking by the Roman soldiers, and his journey with the cross to Golgotha, the place of his death. Finally he was stripped naked and nailed to the cross, where he hung in agony for three hours, jeered at by the crowds, before he died. This is the day when people traditionally eat hot cross buns, because the cross on the bun is a reminder of the cross Jesus died on, and a reminder of that Jesus died to save us celebrates this on Ascension day. all.



Easter Sunday marks Jesus' resurrection. The Bible tells us that Mary Magdalene went to the tomb, followed later by some of Jesus' disciples. They discovered Jesus' body had gone and that the tomb was empty. Jesus then appeared to Mary and many of his disciples, speaking with them on separate occasions during the following forty days. As he left them for the last time, Jesus promised to send the Holy Spirit so the disciples would know God would never leave them. He then ascended into heaven. The Church

Where are the accounts of Easter in the Bible?

The account of the Easter story can be read in Mark, Chapters 14 to 16, or Luke, Chapters 22 to 24, and elements of it can be found in the other gospels too. Many of the events in the Easter story are foretold in the Old Testament in Isaiah chapter 53.

Why does the date of Easter change from vear to vear?

The date of Easter Sunday varies from year to year because it is based on the lunar calendar. It is celebrated on the first Sunday after the full moon, on or after March 21st.



God does wonderful things

It's some years since I became a Gideon. Some may say it was by chance but I believe it was by design, God's design. It all started just over six years ago. I can remember it as though it were yesterday. The surgeon said in a matter of fact way, "You have a malignant tumour and if it is not immediately removed by surgery, it will kill vou." This was so unreal. I thought he was talking to somebody behind me. But then the awful truth began to sink in.

On the evening before the operation day I was terrified and almost walked out of the hospital to go home with my wife Sylvia, at the end of visiting hours. When she left I sank to a new low. I could not believe that this was happening to me. I had been a practising Christian for about forty years. "Why me?" I kept thinking. "What happens if it all goes wrong? How will I die? What will happen to Sylvi and my family?" Frankly I was in a mess.

I hadn't forgotten my faith and I tried to pray. It didn't seem to feel right at first. Then I spotted the little blue Gideon Bible placed in a holder fixed to the bedside cabinet. I grabbed it and began to read; anything, I don't remember what, but the words were encouraging and I began to pray. I had never prayed like that before. I read and prayed into the night then fell asleep and woke as I was being prepared for surgery.

The operation was a success and, whilst I appreciate that the cancer could return, I take nothing away from the skill of the surgeons and nurses who were superb, but I am sure that this was outside normal human control. I was, and still am, greatly indebted to the Gideon who placed that Bible.

didn't talk too much about my experience because nobody wants to admit to weakness by being afraid. However, about a year later a good friend said to me, without provocation, "Have you ever considered becoming a Gideon?" At that time I wasn't sure who or what Gideons were. Being a relatively strong Anglican I have always been cautious of little known Christian organizations. I said I would think about it, but inwardly my heart jumped at it and within a few months I became Gideon. Why is it so important that we should make the word of God more readily available to everybody? It's a well known fact that in this country fewer people attend worship compared with a few years ago and there is less emphasis on teaching the Christian faith in schools to allow more teaching on other faiths. Whilst the majority believe in the existence of God, few own a Bible and if they do, only a minority regularly read it. Strange it may seem, I welcome the current approach to religious education because it gives young minds a sense that there is more to life than just living and dying. Seeing God from different views gives a stronger faith later in life. Christianity is the only faith that demonstrated a loving God reaching out to us, through Jesus Christ. The coming of Jesus at Christmas changed our understanding of God for ever. That's what much of the Bible is all about.

However, because of ignorance, there is a, lot of misunderstanding and exaggerated criticism about the Christian faith resulting in apathy. That is why Gideons believe that everybody, regardless of nationality, existing belief and faith, should have the opportunity to read the Bible. Gideons therefore place Bibles in many different locations

such as hotels, motels, schools, hospitals, residential homes, hostels, dentists' and doctors' surgeries, prisons, police stations, ambulance stations and even in undertakers' chapels of rest. They are placed wherever Gideons believe the Bible will be respected and perhaps read. At the last count, this is done in 179 countries throughout the world. Gideon Bibles are the New International Version and used by all Christian denominations. The Gideons International is an association of professional and business men, drawn from all Christian denominations; like Methodists, Baptists, United Reform, The Church of England and many others. The Gideon ministry is placing and presenting God's Word (The Bible) in the main stream of life.

Gideons provide their own expenses for administration, travelling and subsistence, but the cost of purchasing the Bibles that are given away is met by donations provided by Friends of the Gideons and others. Every penny given is used for the purchase of Bibles.

Being a Gideon is a really rewarding ministry. Feed back is provided by those who have found Jesus Christ through receiving, or even finding, a Gideon Bible and reading it, sometimes in extraordinary circumstances. We are delighted when this happens, but we always remember that the glory belongs to our Lord, Jesus Christ.


