



The Art of Conversation - Has it died?!

When did you last have a really good If we turn to encounters within the Bible. conversation? Was it a really good conversation in it truest sense?

Taken from the Latin conversation is meant to be open-hearted, open- ended. In contrast to a 'discussion', conversation means that we talk with openness where our opinions can be changed. We do not have a pre-set agenda, and we allow the course of the conversation to journey down various cul-de-sacs, diversions and dead ends, without any concern. The novelist, Rebecca West, describes the wrong sort of conversation as being an 'intersecting monologue'. One half of the conversation allows the other to respond while they 'take breath'. West defines a good conversation as being an 'improvised concerto' where both parties have an equal contribution to make and listen in turn, which is essential to the development of the conversation.

So often, in our world today we substitute the realities of conversation with the technological efficacy of communication with a text, or email. We all know that a phone conversation or conversation over a meal takes on a very different form and generally is refreshing. Yes, we do have better forms of communication which mean we can keep in touch with relatives and friends, and no-one can deny that it is not a good thing. But emails and texts do not truly allow for any deeper building of friendships and relationships.

we see how conversation with God is important to discern the future. If we look at the story of Moses in Exodus, Moses shares his desperation and sense of failure with God; he also negotiates a change of plan. More importantly, as we journey in the final days of Lent towards Easter, we hear of how often Jesus talks to those who hold his fate in their hands. We hear him talking to God in the Garden of Gethsemane, and on the Cross. We hear how Jesus talks to Pontius Pilate about the meaning of his (Jesus') life and death; to the disciples in the 'farewell discourses' at the Last Supper. We hear how he talks to the two disciples after his resurrection on the road to Emmaus.

It is during Lent that we have an opportunity to deepen our relationship with God, by 'conversing' with Him, as we journey with Christ to the Cross. An opportunity for us to do that will be to reflect upon the Easter story in Stalisfield Church from Thursday 20th March to Sunday 23rd March (Easter Sunday). We will be building a labyrinth for anyone to make this journey, and as you travel in prayer you can 'talk to God'. The church will be open from 10am -4pm so that you will be free to make the journey in your own time. Do come and experience it, it is something that should not to be missed. Caroline Pinchbeck



As you all can see it's lambing time again and the fields are once more beginning to fill with ewes and lambs.

In the fields at and around Arnold's Oak you will see not only young lambs, but also newly born ones and even occasionally a lamb being born. Ewes are quite secretive about giving birth so they often hide away in a corner for the big event !

On our farm we lamb outside. Some farmers bring the ewes inside for lambing and then turn them out later. There are lots differing views about the best system to use. We have used this method for many years, believing that this is the most natural and least stressful way for the ewes. Not so for the shepherd however, who spends his whole time during lambing moving from field to field !

This "extensive" farming practice does mean that we can't be everywhere at once and therefore we are always extremely grateful to anyone who lets us know about a ewe or lamb which they think might have a problem.

Sometimes, however well intentioned, intervention produces unintended consequences. Our biggest problem is people bringing

lambs to us or even worse, as happened last year, taking them home and putting them in their aga! If lambs are handled a lot and moved from their mothers, the ewes will often reject them and refuse to take them back. This means they either become an orphan lamb we have to rear by hand or, worse, actually die. Please do let us know if vou are concerned at all. Don't worry about bothering us unnecessarily, we would rather go out than leave one of our flock in difficulty.

Another problem is lambs who appear to be 'abandoned' and bleat constantly. It is, I know, very heart wrenching - it's meant to be. They want their mum to come back! Some have lovely mothers who respond immediately. Others have mothers who have had lambs for years and simply aren't worried. They know where their baby is, they just feel no need to stop eating! The lamb doesn't know this and keeps on shouting. Occasionally however, the lamb really has been abandoned.

So, how do you tell if it is in trouble? If it appears to have been abandoned, but eventually stops shouting and just lays down by itself then it probably

The third installment of Audrey Keen's working life with Granville Wheler: My Stable Diary

Granville Wheler seemed most happy between the years 1965 and 1985. His principle interest at that time being the design and completion of his steps, an idea which evolved in the late 1950's. These are an impressive flight of steps which can been seen to this day, towards the gate entrance to Otterden Place.

After this, his main occupation and interest was his railway. The railway was an idea conceived through his fascination for horse drawn railway wagons and the steam era. He had built a short railway track, no more than a quarter of a mile, which was part of his life's dream of having the south side of the estate filled with railway track. But this was impractical and, of course, never happened. The idea had been to transport timber, once cut into trunks, by the horse and wagon waiting on the line. That was the idea!

The horse he certainly did have - a handsome and gentle Suffolk Punch named Count

With lambs you see laying alone in the field looking weak, if it will let you touch it then that is a sign that it probably needs help. It could have become unwell. Lambs, like small children, can deteriorate rapidly. A good test [for those who want to do this] is to put your finger into the lamb's mouth. If it is cold to the touch it needs urgent help. [I am obliged to say: please wash your hands when you have done this!]

Once again, thanks for your interest. We hope that you all gain some pleasure in sharing with us the experience of being a part of this life cycle.
