The Revd Canon Paul Hardingham considers what it means to follow Jesus.

The Way of the Cross

'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow Me.' (Luke 9: 23)

These words of Jesus are spoken at a turning point in the gospel. Jesus challenges the disciples about His identity and their commitment to Him: 'who do the crowds say I am?' (18). It is at this point that He 'resolutely set out for Jerusalem' (9:51). On our journey through Lent, as we look to events of Good Friday and Easter, what are our priorities as Jesus' disciples to be?



To deny ourselves: this means to saying No to ourselves and Yes to God, as we humbly submit our will to His. Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane 'not My will but

Yours be done.' (Luke 22:42). It means putting Jesus first in everything: our work, family, ambitions, possessions, marriage, finance and future. We will not be guided by self-interest, but by allowing God to show us how to live in His way.

To take up our cross: this reminds us that the disciple is not immune from suffering, as we follow Jesus along the way of cross. Just as He carried His cross to Golgotha, we cannot avoid experiencing suffering in a fallen world. Every day we are to live in way that demonstrates to everyone that we have died to ourselves, our selfish ways and ambitions, and seek to live for God. It means breaking old selfish habits and ways of thinking, as we allow God to renew us by His Spirit.

In all of this we cannot lose, because like Jesus, it is only through death that we find God's new life. 'He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain that which he cannot lose.' (Jim Elliot)

Andrew Saunders kindly came along for our first Meeting of the year, accompanied by his wife and Member, Judith. As Andrew started off his working career in Nursing, he was the ideal person to illustrate how to perform CPR (on a dummy) and the use of a Defibrillator, as we have one installed by the entrance to the Village Hall. There was a good turn out of our Group, with only a couple not able to attend, indicating that our Members felt it a worth while talk which could save a life. Andrew spoke in straight forward language with no jargon incorporated and was amusing as well. Although the Defibrillator does instruct on its usage, it was certainly good to know what to expect, saving seconds in a situation when seconds count.

A couple of our group, attended the Mature Drivers' Seminar held at Ditton Community Centre on 11th February. This was organised by the WI and was over subscribed last

year. The Instructors were supplied by KCC, who tour various venues in Kent. The seminar was aimed at the over 60's, the majority of whom took their driving test many years ago. It was designed as a refresher course, updating us on the rules and regulations of the road nowadays and recent legislation on various aspects, for example car seats for children. The instructors did point out that our age group has less accidents than the teenage/twenties age group and the course was to help us continue to drive safely for a long a possible. The point was made that if we give ourselves sufficient time and space we will not have an accident. As we age we need to take into consideration that our reactions may be slower and prescribed medication may have side effects such as tiredness, so we need to drive within our capabilities. There was a free handout at the end of the

Seminar, comprising of a couple of booklets compiled by different organisations covering the contents of the course, together with an up to date Highway Code book. The morning certainly gave us food for thought.

A Bucket of Tadpoles: Springtime, Curiosity, and the Theology of Science

When I was nearly three, I knocked a bucket of tadpoles all over the patio. Those unfortunate creatures must have been collected to educate my brother and I on where frogs came from, but a toddler can't just stand by and watch. Can I see up close? Or maybe I was 'helpfully' moving it to another place. I just remember doing something I shouldn't have done, and tadpoles on the ground. I was sad that I wouldn't get to see those creatures grow up.

I might have been great at destroying things when I was a child (my family would probably say I still am), but I absolutely love watching living things up close. The more I learn, the more my sense of wonder grows. For a

tadpole to become a frog, large sections of its gut, salivary glands and muscles must die, as well as the

gills. The cells in those tissues are programmed to curl up and disintegrate, and are then swallowed up by a specialised kind of white blood cell. Legs grow from small sacs of cells on the tadpole's body, and one of my textbooks says that 'The nervous system is also remodelled' - which I suspect is a bit of an understatement.

This knowledge removes a little of the mystery of how a tadpole turns into a frog, but there is plenty more to discover. These few details also reveal the cleverness of the process. Metamorphosis is surprisingly common in the animal kingdom. How is that an efficient

way to grow up, or is efficiency not the most important thing for an animal?

Scientists are essentially grown-ups who are still very much in touch with their inner two-year-old. They refuse to stop asking questions, even when finding an answer becomes decidedly more awkward than opening a textbook.

Many scientists are people of faith, and this also drives their questioning. They believe that God created a world that was very good, that the purpose of all Creation is to praise Him, that we are made in God's image, and that we are tasked with looking after Creation. So Christians, of all people, should be enjoying and investigating our

surroundings. These are the bones of a theology of science which serves some of us very well, and keeps us looking into things like buckets of frogs – that is, until a two year-old comes and knocks them over.



Update from our M.P. Helen Whately

It's been a busy start to the year in Parliament. After years of wrangling and uncertainty we have finally left the EU. I know there are still strong views on this, but most people I spoke to during the election wanted to move on, and that's what we've managed to do.

The focus is now on building a new relationship with Europe and the rest of the world. There are huge opportunities for our country in the decade ahead, not just in our new role in the world, but also with our growing economy and a commitment to levelling up investment and opportunities across communities. In the last few weeks in Parliament we've put NHS funding increases into law, introduced Bills on the environment and agriculture to make the most of having control in these areas once again, and set out plans for a £5 billion fund for better bus and cycle links to help every region outside London. I'm continuing to work hard to get Kent its share of new investment.

I know some people have been through the horrible experience this month of seeing flood water enter their homes. It's a reminder of the pressures we face in Kent - and the need to make sure new developments work with our plans for tackling climate change.

Making healthcare better for everyone

I'm delighted to have been appointed Minister of State in the Department for Health and Social Care, as part of last week's reshuffle. My new responsibilities include social care, the NHS workforce, as well as learning disabilities and autism.

Solving the crisis in social care, and achieving our commitment of 50,000 more nurses, are two of the most important things for making sure people get the care they need. I'm looking forward to working with fantastic NHS and social care staff across the countryincluding here in Faversham and Mid Kent, to make healthcare better for everyone.

Full fibre broadband coming to Faversham

Faversham, Sheldwich, Painters Forstal and Davington will be some of the first places in the country to benefit from a full fibre broadband network. This is part of Openreach's work to connect market towns, villages, and rural areas to super-fast broadband. Work on installing the fibre cabling is expected to start in April so painfully slow speeds and files than wont download should become a thing of the past very soon. I know there are many places in Kent that need better broadband, but this is a step in the right direction.

Independent inquiry into East Kent maternity services

I was shocked and deeply saddened by the death of baby Harry Richford at QEQM Hospital, Margate, and the extent of the failures at the maternity unit revealed by the Inquest.

Parents need to know they're in safe hands on the maternity ward – and clearly in this case there were terrible failures.

Action has been taken quickly and I'm assured that the Trust is a safe place to give birth, following an inspection earlier this month. An independent inquiry has been commissioned by NHS England so that these terrible failures never happen again.

Temporary bridge brings relief to

It's a huge relief to have the temporary bridge in place over Faversham creek. People and cars can now cross the creek once again. I know it's been tough for people and businesses around the creek since the old bridge closed last year, so it was great to formally open the bridge last month.

Whilst this temporary bridge is good news, clearly this is not a long-term solution. We need a functioning bridge across the creek once again – to allow people and cars to cross and boats to pass through. I'm working hard to make this happen.

An update on Cleve Hill solar plant

The campaign to save Graveney Marshes enters the next, crucial stage. The Secretary of State is due to receive a recommendation from the planning inspectors by the end of February about whether to grant permission to build the UK's largest solar plant next to Faversham.

I've been continuing to do all I can to oppose this development, working with the GREAT campaign to highlight the environmental damage this plant would inflict on a beautiful strength of the North Kent Coast. A final decision will be made by the end of May, so campaign work will step up a gear over the next few months.

North Street 'garden village' needs to be rejected

I've called on Swale Borough Council to reject plans to build 5,000 new houses at North Street.

The development is one of four 'garden villages' being considered by Swale's Local Plan Panel as a way of delivering new homes in our area.

North Street is completely the wrong place to build 5,000 new homes. It's hugely unpopular and would do enormous damage to an area of high landscape value as well as putting further pressure on local roads. It's time for Swale to put people's concerns to rest and reject this development
