



HAVE YOU SEEN JESUS?

If we saw Jesus would we recognise him? How would we know him?

istorical representations of Jesus are depicted in paintinas and statues in thousands of churches. All Christians know his face, in one representation or another. If we saw him teaching in the market place or in a large space on the slopes of the Downs; we would know it was Jesus from what he was saying and from the crowds gathered to listen to him. What if we just happened upon Jesus without other people around him? Is there some way we could recognise him?

T pose these questions in all L seriousness, as during the period between his rising on Easter Sunday and his Ascension; the Bible records several incidents where Jesus spoke to people who failed to recognise him. These were not strangers but people who knew our Lord, had been with him, followed him and listened to him for the three years of his ministry.



was the gardener. Then there were the two believers on their way back to their village of Emmaus. As they walked they discussed the amazing things that had happened in Jerusalem; how their Lord had been crucified; how some of their group had reported finding his tomb empty and had been told that Jesus was alive. They failed to recognise that the person walking along with them was the Risen Christ. Finally there were the seven disciples. What could they do in the aftermath of the resurrection, other than go back to their old occupation of fishing? They did and they caught nothing. A stranger on the shore told them to cast their net on the other side of the boat, which they did. They could not pull it back in, because they had caught so many fish. Only then did John recognise that the stranger was Jesus.

Derhaps the reason that none of them at first recognised Jesus, was that he was in spiritual

rather than earthly form. "Do not hold on to me", Jesus told Mary Magdalene, "because I have not yet ascended to the Father."

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From the Organ Seat

We arrived at 9 o'clock and the sun was shining! Bill and Kit were greeted by their St. John Fellowship friends and Bill went off to be briefed with the other one hundred and fiftyone recipients. Kit, Richard and I found our seats in the Nave. Kit was behind Bill and I was with the Accountants and Library Staff of the Cathedral. The music and pageantry were fabulous. The organ was played from 10.15 a.m. and the processions started soon after. I had had time to read through the Service book and found the happy

"buzz" of people coming in exciting. The

sun gleamed in through the windows and this enhanced the "happy buzz". The five costumed Yeoman Warders came in, carrying above their heads the gold plate with the red and white leather purses. At eleven o'clock the trumpeters announced the arrival of The Queen and Prince Philip whilst we all sang "Praise to the Holiest". The Recipients were seated on both sides of the Nave Aisle and along the North and South Aisles of the Nave. This Royal Maundy Service is where The Queen comes to the people and it had been arranged that she walked each time from the High Altar to the West End and down the Aisles. Many of us had fine views of her and felt the warmth of her wonderful smile. She was wearing a beautifully tailored linen and wool (I think), daffodil yellow coat with a diamond brooch on the left side and a pale yellow hat with a navy blue feather. Later I couldn't help but wonder if the Queen Mum had given her that brooch. Bill and Kit enjoyed the occasion too and I am looking forward to having a good look at the Royal Maundy 2002 money. Well rewarded Kit and Bill! Thank you to them and the Dean for inviting me to witness such a wonderful ceremony and to see Our Queen. God bless her!

A brief background to Bill Lusted's award of the Maundy Purses.

Bill has been a member of St. John's Ambulance Brigade since his teens. He and his wife. Kit, are active members of the St. John Fellowship. He serves as Secretary and Treasurer of the Faversham branch. During the Second World War he joined the Ambulance Service and among other achievements won the Military Medal. After this, Bill worked for the K.C.C. Ambulance Service as an ambulance driver and rose through the ranks to Training Officer. In retirement, apart from their work for St. John Fellowship, Bill and Kit have worked hard as active members of St. Peter and St. Paul's Church, Ospringe. Bill has also served the Faversham branch of the Citizen's Advice Bureau where, for two years, he was Chairman.

last year when Mrs. Shepherd approached my wife asking for details of my voluntary career over the years, saying she wished to nominate me for the Royal Maundy. With the knowledge of our Priest in Charge, the Revd. Penny Fenton, a nomination package was put together which was sent to the Dean of Canterbury and subsequently to the Royal Almonry Office at Buckingham Palace. I knew nothing of this, until in February letters started arriving from the Dean and the Palace confirming the nomination.

At the beginning of March Kit and I were invited to a lecture, given by the Lord High Almoner, at the King's School. Here the origins of the Royal Maundy were explained, as was the procedure to be followed on Maundy Thursday. We knew then that my nomination had been accepted.

On the day, 28th March, our son Richard, as chauffeur, my nominator Vicky, Kit and I were up bright and early. We had allocated parking and on arrival Kit, Richard and Vicky went straight to their reserved seats. I reported to one of the Wandsmen at the International Study Centre for a final briefing. The Lord High Almoner said, "If I've got it right, when you go to

your seat, you will find your partner sitting immediately behind you. If I've got it wrong, I'll be in the Tower in the morning."

My Most Memorable Day The story began back in November of Everyone we met was most friendly and caring, we had no worries and were made to feel like VIPs. Before the service started there was plenty to see, with various processions of brightly gowned and uniformed dignitaries.

The Maundy Money was distributed by The Queen in two halves; firstly, after the lesson, which was read by HRH The Duke of Edinburgh, to those on the South side of the Nave. Then, after the second lesson, read by the Dean, it was given to those of us on the North side. Her Majesty was most charming. When she gave me the two purses she made me feel that I was the only person who mattered. I was fortunate in that she exchanged a few words with me. For me, that set the seal on the magnificent service.

After the service, Kit and I were invited to

lunch in the International Study Centre. The smiling people who waited on us also made us feel very special. Altogether it was a most memorable day and one never to be forgotten. The distribution of Alms is of great antiquity and can be traced back to the reign of Edward 1st. The word Maundy comes from the Latin Mandatum, meaning a commandment. The

opening words of the service are, 'Jesus said, "I give you a new commandment".

The coins are contained in two purses, a red one. which this year held a new 50p and a £5 jubilee coin. These represent a symbolic allowance for clothing and provisions and a payment for the redemption of the



Royal gown. The White purse contains specially minted silver Maundy coins to the value of one penny for each year of the Sovereign's life.

In earlier times the Maundy Ceremony was held wherever the Sovereign was in residence. For many years it took place in the Old Chapel Royal, now the Banqueting Hall at Whitehall. From 1890 until 1952 it was held at Westminster Abbey. During the present reign, it has been celebrated at Westminster on fifteen occasions and also at various Cathedrals around the country. Canterbury is the only one to have hosted it twice, in 1965 and this year. Apparently Her Majesty requested Canterbury as it is her Jubilee year and also as it is Dr. Carey's last year as Archbishop.





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he following are extracts from a diary written during the British Humanitarian Aid Convoy Of Hope that left England on 9th March 2001. The journey took us to Chernigov, its surrounding villages and orphanages, in the Ukraine. I can honestly say that I was not prepared for the events and emotions that I would experience, throughout the ten days of our journey. What I can say, however, is that without the support of my family, friends and all my sponsors; this was a journey that I would not have been able to experience. So I would like to take this opportunity to thank all those involved for making this journey possible for me. I feel that it is one that I will never forget. Given the opportunity, I would dearly love to repeat the experience.

Friday 9th March until our arrival in the Ukraine on Monday 12th March:

The journey was a bureaucratic nightmare, even before we left Dover! Progress through Belgium, Holland and Germany was all right but the problems started in earnest at the Polish border, where we were delayed for one and a half hours. We had to drive on until 21:00 before stopping in a lay-by for the night. The next morning, whilst the ablution facilities were non-existent, there were shops and we were able to buy local bread, butter and cheese to sustain us on our journey. We knew it was going to be a hard day's drive, as we had to cover almost all of Poland and pass through customs into the Ukraine in the day. We drove without a break, only stopping for lunch and fuel.

Apart from having to wash our hands, shoes and wheels we had no problems leaving Poland. However, at the Ukrainian freight clearance terminal, we encountered major problems with the Ukrainian bureaucracy. Our documentation required as many as seven different stamps. Even with that complete we encountered further delays but we finally got away. We had to drive on through the night and finally pulled in to our parking area at 03:30.

We were taken to their flat on the fifth floor of a block with no lift. Although the outside of the buildings is not very inspiring, the inside of all the homes we visited are bright and warm. Despite the fact that all hot water for the city comes from a central supply and is rationed, joy of joys, we were able to have a bath. Two of the children had given up their bedroom so that, secondly, joy of joys, we could sleep in proper beds.

Wednesday 14th March: We had an unusual breakfast, consisting of a national, unidentifiable but tasty dish followed by pancakes and lemon tea. Luda is trying very hard to learn English using children's picture books. so we spent some time helping her with pronunciation.

We then all went to Aratta, the Centre where the organisation is based, where we collected toys and sweets required for the rest of the day. It was planned that we should visit some of the families that Aratta supports. This was so that we might get a better understanding of the people and the conditions that they live in and thus get an awareness of what our supplies and efforts achieve.

The families that we visited live in either large blocks of flats or, by western standards, shacks but in every case they are beautifully kept

> We then continued our visiting which included Luda who is disabled by arthritis and lives with his mother on the sixth floor of a block of flats that has no lift. He goes up and down the stairs several times a day without complaining and is an extremely cheerful man, as is his mother. Once again we were fed like royalty on local dishes.

The next visit was to the flat of a mother with six children, the father having been murdered. They were all extremely cheerful despite the fact that there was no food in the fridge, so it had been turned off. We did not leave until we had supplied the eldest son (a teenager) who was the man of the house with the resources to restock the fridge.

Our final visit of the day was to a family where a traditional Ukrainian dinner had been prepared, during which numerous speeches were made, the third of which is always to the ladies (present and elsewhere). Each speech was accompanied by Vodka. This was followed by dancing to traditional Russian music. We returned to our hosts and in due course retired to bed with many thoughts about the conditions that we had witnessed during the day.

Thursday 15th March: Today we unloaded the vehicles into the storage area for Customs inspection. The Customs officers not only opened every box and inspected its contents, but recorded the date of manufacture and serial number of everything electrical (for what purpose, who knows?). Then everything was very quickly put away in small lockup rooms ready to be transferred to Aratta when required. Just for a change, it rained during the whole operation.

Jester went off to do some of his magic shows. We then went on to Aratta, where we were asked to take part in an informal interview by their National Television about our understanding of the differences between our way of life and theirs. We again had a full Ukrainian meal.

We then went to an orphanage, which the people at Aratta had only found out about on the previous Monday, although it had been in existence for the past thirty years. They look after one hundred and twenty-seven young mentally disadvantaged people (this includes being left-handed) aged from three to twenty-four years old. After a short while to get to know the staff and children, who were a delight to meet, we watched a magic show by Jester. It was a great success and it was so rewarding to see so many happy faces, despite the language barrier.

We were then invited to wash our hands prior to eating (yes you guessed) another full Ukrainian meal less than two hours after the previous one.

It was very quiet on the bus on the journey back to Chernigov; the day's experiences seemed to have overawed everyone.

Friday 16th March: Today we went back to Aratta where we were warmly welcomed as usual. Some of the local girls put on a display of traditional dancing and we were asked to join in to everyone's amusement.

Paul and I took time out for a stroll around some local shops and the price difference for a variety of items was quite an eye-opener. Despite the poverty around, things like computers and the associated bits are common items and so cheap.

We returned to Aratta for more food, followed by some emotional speeches and a beautiful gift for each of us.

Saturday 17th March: It was time to say farewell to these lovely people before setting off for the first of two visits.

We travelled in convoy first to Timki, which is an orphanage for young people up to the age of twenty-three years, who are mentally disadvantaged. Due to the old Soviet policy of hiding such people away, both orphanages were in the middle of forests. Consequently we had to travel along extremely bad roads and unmade dirt tracks. As a result of this, two vehicles got stuck and we had to temporarily abandon Harlequin.

As usual we were made most welcome and were able to spend some time with the young people outside while Jester set up his show. It was rewarding to see these young people laughing and happy, despite all that life had thrown at them. After Jester had put on another excellent show, which was enjoyed by everybody, including us, (quess what?) it was time to eat. Unfortunately immediately after eating we had to move on as we had another visit to make.

The next visit was to Stara Bassan, which is an orphanage in its true sense, for five to sixteen year old children. Most of the children had been abandoned by their parents who were unable to cope with them due to poverty, drink or drugs. Again the same routine - meet the children, a show by Jester, followed by a meal.

It was time to set off for the Polish border and due to the hospitality, farewells, bad roads and later snow and ice it was a long haul. Just to help things along we came across a road accident involving four people and a motorcycle. Paul, as a paramedic, offered to give first aid and to contact the local emergency services. This was politely but firmly declined, as those involved did not consider it serious enough! If a similar accident had happened in England it would have involved Police and Ambulances.

Seven hours after leaving the second orphanage we arrived at the lakeside at 03.30 a.m.

Sunday 18th March: Today's travelling involved getting back through the borders and being bogged down and delayed by bureaucracy.

An unusual sight as we neared the border was a Russian Mig fighter mounted on a plinth at the side of the road where a Russian Air Force base used to be.

Monday 19th March: During the day the weather deteriorated quite rapidly with heavy snow and icy roads. We had crossed into Germany and drove (carefully) until 23.00 and spent a somewhat chilly night (- 10C).

Tuesday 20th March: We were on the road by 07.00 looking forward to getting home. For once the journey was uneventful and we arrived in Calais in time to catch the 15.15 Sea France service to Dover and to go our separate ways.

David is accompanying Tony on another trip to the Ukraine on 3rd May 2002. Hopefully this diary gives some insight into the plight of the people in this area and how much any help we can give means.

My son, Tim and his friend, Simon, both did splendidly, coming in at 3.57 and 4.29 respectively. Among the three of us we've raised over £5000 for Colon Cancer Concern. I would like to thank all my local friends for your incredible interest and support, which has meant so much to me. You will be getting your official letter (with photo!) just as soon as Mike gets back with the laptop.

Several people have asked what my next challenge will be - that's easy -Grandmotherhood, which will be a somewhat longer-term project than a few months Marathon preparation. Ben and Sacha expect their baby at the beginning of June, so we are all getting very excited. Come to think of it, doing the Marathon was not unlike being in labour - hours of huffing and puffing and grunting and groaning and finally an unforgettable feeling of exhaustion, elation, achievement

Now it's all systems go for the

This month we welcomed Ann Morris who gave a talk on the London Marathon. She told us of her reason for running for the Great Ormond Street Hospital Children's Charity 'REACH'.

Ann told us

"For seven years the words 'Thank You' have never seemed adequate. From the moment we carried Rhiannon through the doors of Great Ormond Street Hospital, they never failed us.

Rhiannon was then a very sick nine-monthold baby. We took her to the high dependency unit specializing in the treatment of children with cancer and those in need of bone marrow transplants. My husband, Andrew and I felt that we had 'handed over' our youngest daughter, Rhiannon, into the care of Great Ormond Street for a measure of safe keeping, that was way beyond our reach. They never failed us.

Rhiannon was diagnosed with a very rare and aggressive strain of leukaemia. As a result we remained in Great Ormond Street for five months with a critically ill child. Her survival was dependent on her being given 'massive' doses of chemotherapy, which wiped out her immune system. Almost two years of less intensive, but still very invasive and difficult treatment followed this.

Throughout this time, Rhiannon's care was ultimately the responsibility of an amazing lady, Professor Judith Chessells. Her medical excellence determination and

instincts have brought us this far. She has spent her working life researching paediatric haemotology and pioneering treatments for infants and children diagnosed with

As a way of demonstrating our appreciation for all the dedication, love and truly brilliant care provided by every individual involved in Rhiannon's recovery so far and as a tribute to Professor Chessells' work, we have always wanted to offer something back.

When I was granted a place in the 2002 London Marathon I wanted the sponsorship monies I raise to go to a charity or research budget, not of our choosing but of the Professor's. Her suggestion was 'REACH'; a special purpose fund of Great Ormond Street Children's Charity, set up in 1992. The 'REACH' fund supports research into cancer and blood disorders in children, with the aim of improving methods of diagnosis and

Miracles do happen, Rhiannon has defied all the medical odds by remaining in remission from her form of leukaemia. She is one of only a handful of children in the world to have survived to date. Sadly not all marathon is also a tribute to the se other brave little souls who showed enormous courage, strength and determination but who have not been so lucky as Rhiannon to survive.

New treatments are providing so much hope in the fight against leukaemia. So please, by supporting my run, help me raise money for the research fund, which will provide hope to others faced with the profound fear and uncertainty similar to ours. These few words show our good fortune and explain my madness in agreeing to run a distance, which I would not normally even contemplate

Ann explained the procedure one has to go through on registering for the Marathon, in which 50,000 people take part. She told us you are given tags for your shoes, in order that your running times can be checked along the way by laser machines. We were told about the well-organised facilities; such as the transportation of runners' possessions from the start to the finish of the race; the availability of drinks whilst running the course and the many toilet facilities en route. Ann discussed the route she will run and told us of the wonderful atmosphere amongst the runners and the crowd. We wish her a successful run!
