On the night before a great battle, the Roman Emperor Constantine dreamt of a cross in the sky and the words 'in this sign conquer'. After his victory, Constantine ended 300 years of persecution and Romans were allowed to become Christians. Christianity became the official religion of the Roman Empire. Constantine died on 22nd May in the year 337.

Some 1,500 years later, Jean Henry Dunant (who was born on 8th May 1828) was horrified to see the dreadful suffering after the Battle of Solferino. He spent the rest of his life working for the casualties of war, fightling under the banner of the Red Cross to relieve world-wide suffering.



Remembrance

Taken from My Stable Diary during the 1980s.

In the tack room I painted the walls magnolia. I recovered one of the box ottomans that were used to store the horses' rugs and sundry riding clothes. The hard surface on one of these boxes was ideally suited as a desk, and on this were placed books, telephone and a typewriter, the usual records relating to stable work, plus vet and farrier appointment cards. The walls, moderately decorated with photographs and pictures of a horsey nature, all added up to the atmosphere of cosiness in this room where the saddle, bridle and harness were cleaned. The notice board at that time had many items pinned to it: a calendar, stable reminder pad, current card of local hunt fixtures, rosettes, a copy of the horses' prayer, author unknown, and sundry papers and letters of my employer. The tack room also boasted a sink unit and range, the latter favoured by the cats during the winter months.

The atmosphere in the tack room was always good. It was warm in winter, cool in summer. There was always a pleasant smell of leather and saddle soap, and the views from the window in the 1980s were always lovely. The horses were seldom



poorly, but if there was a thrown shoe or sprain, the tack room was the place to discuss and confide. When all was well again, like the cat, we could relax back into the quiet ambience that was this special room where the summer breezes would creep through the open window and flex the curtains half covering the panes.
