

Eastling School News

May has a very strange timetable for the school with the provision of two bank holidays (1st and 26th) reducing the number of days the school is open before the end of term 5 on Thursday 22nd. Even so, our activities have not been diminished - most important is the SATs week - when we cautiously expect to reach the upper reaches of the performance tables for local and national schools (in line with our excellent, 100% success rate for grammar school placement!). This week is from Monday 12th May.

Our extra-curricular events also continue to provide a rich and vibrant education for the children of the school. These include a magistrates visit (16th May), a rescheduling of our GIST road safety event (the last one was cancelled due to unbelievably inclement weather!), our next football tournament (20th May) where we defend our position as league champions and a visit by the local fire prevention team.

On Friday 9th May, the FOES group not only opens its arrangements for the school fête (Sunday July 13th) with a non-uniform 'bottle' day, but also tries out a new event on the Friday evening - a 'field' disco (for children who attend the school) which takes place between 3.30 and 5.30pm. On Friday 23rd May, whilst children are off enjoying the sunshine and the start of their half term break (23rd May - 1st June), staff will be discussing the way that the new National Curriculum will be implemented in the school from September 2014.





Canon's Column

In a few weeks time, Norma and I will be going on a holiday in Yorkshire and as part of our preparations, I have been searching for a church to attend along our route. I came across this description of one of the churches:

Large Victorian structure with a big "wow factor" on entering through the west door. Sympathetically re-ordered 2000-2006 with flexible seating, enhanced lighting, heating system, decorations, nave altar, sound system with loop, stations of the cross. Community area comprises Reception/Meeting Room, Kitchen, Toilets with Baby Change, Parish Office. Facilities for the disabled include access pathway from public highway, reception and nave on the same level. A warm, friendly welcome from an all age congregation.

It's obvious that the church and its parishioners have put a lot of time and effort in to meet the needs of the present community in the restructuring of their building. They have modernized to make the church more comfortable and accessible. In my own experience, having or not having a toilet affects people's attendance as they age. That was the case in my previous parish.

Barney White-Spunnel in his column in the Daily Telegraph on Easter Monday talked about the need to again make the village churches the centre of the community where the church is not only open daily but in use on a daily basis.

The kind of changes made by the rural church in Yorkshire requires planning, commitment and involvement of the whole community. The church of St. Michael and All Angels, Throwley, is beginning this process with the acquisition of land for a parking lot and

driveway access. They have also completed the relocation of the vestry and opened up the back of the nave. St. Mary's, Stalisfield, is moving forward as well with plans to put in a toilet, a kitchen counter and some open space at the back of the church. St. Mary's, Eastling, has begun its process with the changes to its worship patterns and the installation of a toilet.

Whenever we are faced with making changes in our lives or our situations, we are really involved in a three step process. The first step is the ending process, the letting go, the losing. This applies to changes at work, to the loss of a spouse or family member, even a pet. We need to recognize that we will lose something significant and that the loss is painful. We have to prepare ourselves to move on. Problems arise for us whenever we have trouble letting go and we hold on in spite of the loss, the death, the change.

The second stage of the transition process is called the neutral zone. This is that time of the ups and downs, the confusion as we reorganize our thoughts and patterns of doing things as we deal with the change or loss. But this is also the time of exploration and innovation, a time to check our options and new activities to do.

The final stage is the new beginning. This brings with it renewed energy and purpose, a new fuller identity that is full of possibilities and potential.

As Christians in our present world, we are already in a time of change. I would like us to take control of our situations and work out our own futures, remaining an important part of our communities. That is only possible if we work to be a creditable service and resource to the community.

WW1: Woodbine Willie

The Rev George Anketell Studdert Kennedy was the son of a parson who followed in his father's calling and in 1914 became vicar of St Paul's, Worcester. Within a few weeks the Great War began and George, like many other young clergy, immediately volunteered as an army chaplain and soon found himself on the western front, right in the middle of the 'war to end all wars'. By the time the war was over he had achieved an odd new name, a Military Cross for 'exceptional bravery' and an honoured place in its annals. The young chaplain had become 'Woodbine Willie' - a nickname given him by the soldiers in the trenches, but which stuck with him for the rest of his life.

People under fifty probably won't have any idea what a 'Woodbine' was, but for my generation it was the cheapest way into the forbidden joys of smoking. 'Woodbines' - small cigarettes - were available in packets of five (rather than ten or twenty) and so even pocket money could buy them. During the Great War they were the standard popular 'fag' in an era when almost all men smoked. Indeed, my father, tending wounded and even dying men as an army medic, would routinely light a cigarette and place it between their lips.

'Woodbine Willie' carried a permanent supply of Woodbines in his pockets along with his Bible - hence the nickname. He gave men a 'fag', and at the same time, in the most natural way, offered them encouragement, sympathy and prayer. He insisted on sharing all their experiences, including going into No Man's Land to minister to the injured and dying - allies or enemies.

The chaplains serving on the battle-field won the universal respect of the troops. They insisted on sharing the life of the trenches and getting to know the soldiers personally. This led many chaplains, including Studdert Kennedy, radically to alter their approach and even their theology. They quickly realised how remote the average soldier was from formal church services and the language of the Bible and the Prayer Book. They came back after the War determined to change things in church, but it wasn't easy.

Studdert Kennedy moved from being a typical Edwardian parson, who thought that the main object of a war was to win it - he once joined the troops for bayonet practice - to being a convinced pacifist who thought the best thing to do with wars was to end them.

After the war he became a vicar in the City of London, a published poet and in the early days of radio a popular broadcaster. When he died in 1929 it was reported that crowds lined the pavements as his funeral procession made its way through the streets. Food for the Fed-up was the title of a book he wrote principally for the soldiers in the trenches. It was the Creed explained in their language. The Unutterable Beauty was the title of his Collected Poems, many of them based on his experience of the western front. He did indeed find a mysterious beauty in the grim humour, honest fear and raw courage of the men with whom he had so often shared a fag and a prayer.


THE GREAT WAR

Exhibition on Charing in the First World War

From 14 June to 23 July Charing and District Local History Society will hold a major exhibition, sponsored by the Heritage Lottery Fund and Ashford Borough Council among others, about Charing during the First World War. It was probably typical of many larger Kent parishes near a railway station, in that it ran two VAD hospitals and frequently billeted troops. As well as telling the story of the 280 men (and occasionally women) who served, it will also look at how the village coped and how lives were affected.

The exhibition will be staged in 14 venues across the parish, each displaying relevant material - e.g. the churches will concentrate on the fallen, the school will have details of the schools and the lives of children.

There will be two open weekends - 14/15 June and 5/6 July when all the material will be available to view (Sat: 10am-5pm, Sun: 2-5pm), and there will be various extra events. Please see the website www.charinghistory.co.uk, local paper etc., for details. Admission is free.
