What has struck me about Morning Prayer, during which we read a Psalm or two each day, is how helpful the Psalms are and how relevant they are in our current situation.

During Lent the Psalms used each day are Psalms of Lament such as:

Psalm 102:1-6

¹ Hear my prayer, Lord; let my cry for help come to you.

² Do not hide your face from me when I am in distress. Turn your ear to me;

when I call, answer me quickly. ³ For my days vanish like smoke; my bones burn like glowing embers.

⁴ My heart is blighted and withered like grass; I forget to eat my food.

⁵ In my distress I groan aloud and am reduced to skin and bones.
⁶ I am like a desert owl, like an owl among the ruins.

Psalms that bring us to a place of honesty before God, our heavenly Father, where we can express our feelings about our current situation yet acknowledge in the midst of all that trust in God our Father.

New Ways to Worship



A free phone line of hymns, reflections and prayers

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, has launched a free national phone line to bring worship and prayer into people's homes while church buildings are closed because of the coronavirus.

Daily Hope offers music, prayers and reflections as well as full worship services from the Church of England at the end of a telephone line.

The line – which is available 24 hours a day on **0800 804 8044** – has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services during the period of restrictions in mind.

The service is supported by the Church of England nationally as well as through the Connections group based at Holy Trinity Claygate in Surrey and the Christian charity Faith in Later Life.

Although thousands of churches across the country are now running services and prayer groups online while public worship remains suspended, many people – especially older people – do not have access to the internet.

On the day I write we were taken to Psalm 96, a great Psalm of praise: Psalm 96:1-4

Sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth. Sing to the Lord, praise his name; proclaim his salvation day after day.

Declare his glory among the nations, his marvellous deeds among all peoples.

For great is the Lord and most worthy of praise;

A Psalm that points us to God and to who He is and that He deserves our praise. When we do this we are taken beyond where we are, the here and now, to a new place of relationship with God our heavenly Father.

Psalm 100

¹ Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth.

² Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs.

³ Know that the Lord is God. It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture.

⁴ Enter his gates with

thanksgiving and his courts with praise;

give thanks to him and praise his name.

⁵ For the Lord is good and his love endures forever;

his faithfulness continues through all generations.

I have found the Psalms so helpful to me at this time, which has brought reflection on the direction we have been journeying in as a world, as a nation in terms of what is most important to us. The Psalms help me in anchoring myself in God. I finished with the first two verses of Psalm 62, a psalm of David:

¹ Truly my soul finds rest in God; my salvation comes from him. ² Truly he is my rock and my salvation; he is my fortress, I will never be shaken

Funerals during the coronavirus restrictions

Funerals have changed almost beyond recognition under the strict new rules to prevent the spread of coronavirus. Church of England funerals may now take place only at crematoria or at gravesides. Only immediate family may attend, and they must keep their two-metre distance.

To help those who are grieving-at-a-distance at this difficult time, the Church of England has published a simple guide. It provides both prayers and also suggestions of how people can pay their own tribute at home to the person who has died. These include finding a photograph of the person who has died, writing down memories of them, and lighting a virtual candle in memory of their loved ones.

The Revd Canon Dr Sandra Millar, Head of Welcome and Life Events for the Church of England, said: "It's so difficult when you can't go to a funeral... to say your last goodbye and know that your special person's life has been honoured, prayers offered, and God's love experienced." Loneliness at the Virtual Chelsea Flower Show, 19th – 23rd May

All sorts of themes are chosen for the Chelsea Flower Show, but this year's theme turned out to be scarily appropriate for the Spring of 2020: loneliness and mental health.

For, according to Sue Briggs, RHS Director General, "many feel they need gardening in their life now more than ever before, for their mental and physical wellbeing during this national emergency."

Writing on RHS website (<u>www.rhs.org.uk</u>), Sue Briggs says: "This applies to everyone from those who are having to selfisolate to families planning, maybe for the first time, to grow their own food."

And so, "for these reasons, and to do more to support the industry, the RHS will create a Virtual RHS Chelsea Flower Show, to celebrate our great horticultural industry and gardening heritage." The Virtual Show will run from Tuesday 19th May to Saturday 23rd May.

Guy Barker, chief horticulturalist at the RHS said: "Nurturing plants can make you less lonely and release you from troubles."



Eastling Gardeners' Club The visit by Eastling Gardeners to Norton Court Gardens on 19th June has been cancelled.

When mowing your lawn, avoid cutting your dandelions is the advice of the president of the British Ecological Society, Prof Jane Memmott. It will help to save the bees.

Leave your dandelions alone

She explains: "Dandelions are a fantastic source of pollen and nectar for the early pollinators in particular. If they were rare, people would be fighting over them, but because they're common, people pull them out and spray them with all sorts of horrible things when they should just let them flower. If you leave the lawn to three or four inches, then dandelions, clover and daisies can flower and then you end with something like a tapestry, and it's much nicer to sit there and watch the insects buzzing about."

Prof Memmott encourages everyone to get a bee hotel for their garden. "There's nothing nicer than being sat in a chair with a glass of wine and watching the bees going in and out of your own personal little beehive. Even just a potted plant on a doorstep will provide lunch for a bee or a fly or a butterfly."

The Archbishop's address will be streamed through TES from 10am on Thursday 30 April 2020. It will then remain available on the Oak National Academy website: https://www.thenational.academy In addition to the assemblies, the Church of England is also partnering with Oak National Academy to provide separate weekly collective worship sessions led by schools, which will be accessible to those of all faiths and none. This will be part of the Church of England's forthcoming #FaithAtHome programme, which launches later in the week. Thursday's event is expected to be the biggest school assembly ever held in the UK.

Since its launch on Monday 20th April Oak Academy has seen over two million lessons accessed. Providing a sequenced plan of video lessons and curricular resources for teachers, as well as parents and their children. Assemblies at Oak National Academy will be held in partnership with TES and be delivered by a range of wellknown faces. They will focus on topics like hope and resilience, as well as practical advice and support. They will act as a moment for the country's pupils to come together and provide reassurance during this uncertain time.



Blessed are the truth-tellers

ITV News journalist and presenter Julie Etchingham, a practising Christian, has defended the role played by journalists during the Coronavirus pandemic.

Julie told the Christians in Media website, "Reporters are coming in for a lot of flack for the questions they are asking government. But what else are we for? We all get that this is a crisis like no other; that few in government have ever had to navigate such a challenge.

"But, if we're still attempting to function as a democracy in the face of this, then scrutiny is clearly crucial. Many in our frontline services and the wider public are demanding answers. We are there on their behalf. We don't always get it right. This isn't a moment to trip people up, but urgently to get to the truth."

As a Christian who has worked in communications for around 50 years, I strongly support Julie Etchingham's view. Now is the time for truth and accuracy to be at the centre of all our communications.

So, yes, we need to be praying for and supporting the frontline health service staff, the public health experts, the scientists researching vaccines to combat the virus, and the key workers keeping our societies running.

But we also need to be praying for and supporting the men and women working in and with the media to publish, upload, broadcast and distribute the most accurate information, without spin or distortion.
