

Visit to Normandy 2005

On 10th June, 40 members of the Normandy Veteran Association caught the mid morning ferry to Calais then settled down for a 270 mile coach journey to the small town of Aunay Sur Odon, near Caen, in the heart of the Bocage country of Calvados, arriving late afternoon.

Next day, after an early breakfast, our coach took us to St. Mere-Eglise, in the Cherbourg peninsula. On our arrival we were surrounded by people armed with autograph books etc., this was the main landing site of the US Airbourne Divisions and, to this day, has a life sized figure of a GI (John Steele) hanging from the church steeple, caught by his parachute straps.

We had a look round the Museum and in the afternoon visited the American Cemetery. For personal reasons, one of the ladies wished to lay a wreath at the memorial. We have our own Padre and took our Standard plus a tape of the Last Post and the Reveille, so, having gained permission from the American authority, we held a short service. There seemed to be thousands of American visitors who gathered round us, wide eyed.

After the service we walked down to the cliffs over looking Omaha Beach and were overwhelmed by people (Mostly young girls, Kit said) who wanted to have their photographs taken with us. Many of them wanted the story of our trip; who we were etc..

Before returning to Aunay we called at a factory producing Calvados and were given a taster, which led to some of us buying a bottle.


Sunday 12th June, an emotional day for the town: 12th June 1944 was the start of four days of carpet bombing which left the town completely obliterated and 153 dead. It has now been rebuilt and bears little resemblance to the pre 1944 town.

We have two requests from BHA. which concern everyone who collects aid, and those who normally do shoe boxes at Christmas.

FOOD: The Ukrainian authorities place a high tax on any food in the aid sent out, so they are not taking food for the foreseeable future.

SHOE BOXES: Although these have been so very much appreciated, and we have been doing that for so many years now, there have been problems with the suitability/equality of the contents. They would prefer, in future, to receive the items loose so that bags or boxes can be made up appropriate to the actual children. If you have already collected shoe boxes however. please don't worry as these will be taken. This will probably be disappointing for many of you, especially those of you who have small children, and have encouraged them to do this at Christmas, in order for them to learn about caring and sharing with those less fortunate than ourselves. We do hope that you will feel able to carry on supporting this charity as there is still a tremendous need.

ITEMS NEEDED: Items that are particularly needed, are socks and underwear for every age group. Helping the impoverished families, the elderly and the orphanages is still very important and, like every other charity, we still need financial support. The shredded paper will also help to fill the paper recycling bins located at the Hall and increase the income obtained from Recycling Credits which will be ploughed back into Hall improvements.

SUCHANA EARLY LEARNING GROUP WEST BENGAL, INDIA CHARITY CHRISTMAS CARDS! £2.99 for ten

The children attending this group have designed four colourful, cheerful cards, which have photos on the back. Sale of cards (and donations) is the group's only income. Please consider buying some. All your money goes directly to the group in India. The only cost has been printing which is done in India.

The group meets at the house and garden of Kirsty Milward and Rahul Bose who have three young children of their own. Kirsty grew up in Kent and still has family in this area.

Suchana is a no-fees group of 51 children aged 3-10 and is a registered charity in India. Kirsty started it because of concerns about the large number of tribal children, their neighbours, who drop out of school quite early on, or never

Only 5% of the women in this area are literate so most of the

mothers cannot help their children with homework, even if they can afford fees for the local school.

If they do get to school the first challenge for the tribal Santali children is that it does not use their own language. The teachers at Suchana target these difficulties and give lots of encouragement to increase the children's confidence in their own background. One achievement was a celebratory performance by these lovely children for their families which included a puppet show of the Santali creation story. Kirsty is building up a library of children's books in Bengali for them to borrow (the language used in schools, hospitals and offices).

The group is beginning to employ health workers to visit the children's homes. It is very difficult for the tribal families to access primary health care.

The continuation from front cover, of Bill Lusted's trip to Normandy.

The Mayor had arranged a short parade and service at the memorial. We didn't parade but joined them at the memorial where the Tricolour and the Union Flag were both flying. After the service we joined the townsfolk at the local hall for wine and nibbles, and got to know some of them.

Following that was a huge Barbecue in

the town square. We had special seating and were waited on like VIPs - and all at no cost to us, courtesy of the Mayor.

After lunch we went to visit the memorial to the 49th (Polar Bear Division), but we couldn't get close to it as it was having a major overhaul. Then on to the cemetery at Fontenay-le-Pesnel for a short service

and wreath and laying ceremony. Next to the village of Cheux, the start line for operation Epsom, a failed attempt to take Caen. We looked at the church, partly rebuilt but still bearing the scars of 1944, then across the road to the village hall, in the forecourt of which is a memorial to the 43rd (Wessex) division, heavily involved in Epsom. We laid a wreath at the memorial then went inside the hall to a reception; wine, soft drinks, homemade cakes and a chance to meet the local people.

13th June - Visit to Caen. We had hoped to see the Musée De La Paix, but there was a queue about a hundred yards long waiting to go in, so gave that a miss. We spent some time in the shop then visited the English Garden of Peace, opened last year by Prince Charles but not yet complete. It consists of a large rectangular lawn, entered through an archway of roses. On two sides are

> borders with shrubs and cottage garden style flowers. The last side contains Plinths with names, numbers and badges of all the divisions involved in Normandy, plus one for the Navy and one for the RAF. I had my photo taken beside the 3rd Division, and we both had one taken beside the RAF plinth.

We then went to Pegasus Bridge for lunch, followed by a coffee in the Café Gondre, the first place to be liberated (6th Airborne Division), bought some souvenirs, visited the Airborne Museum and finally made our way down to the coast at Lion-sur-Mer where, for the first time in 61 years, I stood on Sword beach and saw where I came ashore on D Day - they had rubbed out my footprints! 14th June - Visited Juno Beach, site of the Canadian landing. We were given a Canadian Freedom and Peace lapel badge, then on to the seaside resort of

Arromanches. We had lunch and spent the afternoon looking at the remains of Mulberry Harbour. Once more, we were surrounded by people wanting photographs and conversation which, I must say, we all enjoyed.

Day 6 - 15th June was a shopping morning at Villers-bocage, where there is a large street market on Wednesdays. Unfortunately it was raining, so we spent most of the time in the Coffee Shops and in the supermarket. The rain cleared by midday and we were off to our lunch date which was a camp out in the country, north of Vire, the main town of Calvados. The camp is run by a family named Ashworth, the lady originated from Wigan. We were given a marvellous lunch, followed by entertainment and finished with a walk around the wonderfully kept grounds. 9am on our last day saw us off on the long journey back to Calais and the ferry.

The following poem was on the back of the service sheet used in Aunay Sur Odon. Bill found it very poignant and emotional and thought others might like to read it.

Sleep on dear friend

Though nigh on 60 years have flown since last we passed this

We, who have aged and mourned, again Remember you this day.

Sleep on, midst the phalanxed lines of marble white stretching to eternity and nigh. We stand and contemplate When we shall be united, you and I.

Sleep on, the peace you so dearly bought in blood and tears Still remains a shadow That silhouettes our fears.

Sleep on; sleep on dear friend The life that you gave should not have been for little gain. War is filthy; war is wrong.

We who are left must still persuade the young. Wars must never ever start again.

Wartime Memories

Dorothy Bilcliffe at 6 years, and her sister 3 years were evacuated from Margate to Rugby, Staffordshire, for four and a half years. They were billeted with a very loving couple who became 'Auntie' and 'Uncle' to the little ones. Dorothy repaid some of the love by funding a tin of 'Zebo'

black lead polish, which had practically disappeared from shops. The stove was soon restored to its original brilliance with Auntie's enthusiastic polishing.



Dorothy also remembers her first blood orange, banana and tinned salmon, and being able to buy a whole loaf and six cream splits at one time.

Don and Ned Watts lived at Huntingfield as boys and walked daily to Eastling school.

Walking through a cornfield they were suddenly aware of an enemy plane, flying low with its machine guns firing,



coming straight for them. Today they still both realise just how blessed they were to survive such a frightening experience.


