

Remembrance ...

"They died that we might live" is the inscription on the war memorial in St Mary's Eastling. In the revival of the play, Journey's End by R.C. Sheriff, the climax of the play is a stage plunged into darkness, while the names of those who died in the Great War are projected on to the backdrop. Their names may be cast in stone or bronze on a war memorial or grave: vet, each vear their names are brought back to life as they are read out at thousands of services around the world. They may be known by some, but often their names provoke us to remember the sacrifice of many in the desire for peace over the generations.

In the last year, war and conflict between nations has been at the top of the world news agenda. In recent months the re-emergence of the threat of nuclear war has been brought to the fore of our attention. Often, we might feel overwhelmed by these accounts, and fear that peace may never be a possibility. On Remembrance Day, the Bible texts are used to focus our minds Christ's teaching of peace, here are some of them. One such text is "Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God" (Matthew 5:9). Another is "Greater love has no-one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends." (John 15:13) This can be interpreted in various ways, and many have and still are interpreting them for our times. It challenges us to reflect on the cost of friendship. Are we prepared to forego our own needs and desires for the benefit of others?

More importantly, it reminds us of wewill Christ's sacrifice on the cross. He laid down his life, in order that remember 🕑 we might be given life, eternal life at that. In Christ, we find them reconciliation, peace and love because, as John's gospel tell us, Christ is the way, the truth and the life. (John 14:6) The journey of faith upon which Christ leads us means that we have to imitate the love that God has made freely available to all. Also, it means a commitment to work for peace whether in our families, our communities and in the wider world.

As Winston Churchill said in one of his speeches at a crucial time in the Second World War, "we will neither fail nor falter, we will not weaken nor tire." Though at times, we may feel weary in this task, we are each called to ensure that Christ's death was not in vain. and we proclaim that Christ is the Prince of Peace. So on Armistice Day (11th November) and on Remembrance Sunday (12th November) bring those names to life again as you remember them, and recall Christ's sacrifice for, "He died, that we might live". 
