
2008 is the 90th anniversary of the end of the First World War.

During that war, some of the worst fighting took place in the Flanders and Picardy regions of Belgium and Northern France. After the complete devastation, the poppy was the only thing which grew on the land. McCrae, a doctor serving there with the Canadian Armed Forces, was deeply inspired and moved by what he saw. He wrote these now famous verses:

In Flanders' fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below. We are the dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders' fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe; To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high, If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders' Fields.

Formal remembrance services in churches become ever less common as the years go by. In part, it's because those who have any direct experience of war are, in stable countries, a small minority. In part, it's also because such services in the past have been uncomfortably jingoistic at times.

Some churches have tried to avoid all of this by re-naming them 'peace' services. But whatever title they are given, all remembrance services are peace services - although that begs the question of what we mean by 'peace'.

It won't be too many weeks before we are singing about "peace on earth, goodwill towards men". And yet those words are sung to describe a country living under foreign occupation, where guerrilla warfare was a part of daily life. It seems an odd sort of peace.

In his play 'Murder in the Cathedral', T.S. Eliot writes of Becket wrestling with this theme: "Did Jesus mean peace as we think of it: the kingdom of England at peace with its neighbours, the barons at peace with the king, the householder counting over his peaceful gains?"

There's the paradox. We can have Jesus' peace, but it doesn't mean that we'll never have to face conflict. Not all

peace is good peace. Nations - and each of us individually - can make peace by giving in to what is wrong, by letting evil win.

Of course, there's always the temptation to take the easy way out when it comes to resolving conflict, to accept what's wrong and to excuse ourselves by saying that we're doing it for the sake of keeping the peace. But that sort of peace isn't worth having and is unlikely to last anyway.

Building true peace can be costly. It will mean that we have to admit our own part in the mess, that we have sinned, and that we have to be prepared to forgive other people their sins too. It's a peace based on suffering and sacrifice - based on the cross.

So whatever form our remembrance services take, they are all peace services. We remember those who have died, and who are still dying as a result of conflict. We confess our part in it, even if it has only been a passive involvement. And we commit ourselves to playing our part in building true peace; not cheap peace, not peace at any price, not peace through compromise with evil. We promise to try to do God's will for his world, so that lasting peace, honourable peace may be built.


The clocks went back at the end of October so do not forget to alter your timers accordingly.

My working life with Granville Wheler

This, then, was the life as it was lived in the wonderful employ of Granville Wheler. Beside the horse care, the mucking out of the stables, the grooming, the feeding and exercising the horses, the general care and maintenance of the yard, the secretarial duties, gardening programme and, latterly, house companion, was the heart stopping beauty of picturesque Otterden as it was then. In spring, while riding through the newly woken beech wood, inspiration for poetry was everywhere, interrupted only by the creaking leather of the saddle, as it moved with the motion of the horse, and the chinking bit on the bridle that flustered the birds.

In summer the smell of horses and leather, mingled with that of camomile and linden blossom, picnic lunch breaks in cornfields and sweet smelling woods, eating wild strawberries, walking through bracken and seedy grass, shaded by heavenly English oaks, or resting on the sunny banks under a wide brimmed hat.



In autumn the breath taking scenery begging to be sketched. The fungi, hazel nuts, chestnuts and conkers all added to the muse and, of course, the ever present changing leaves. In winter, watching wild white clouds cross a muddled sky and seeing the horses breath as we walked through a crackling frosty morning; the opportunity to write pages of prose later, describing nature at her time of rest.

Stuart Weir of Verite Sport considers a first class golfer... Stewart Cink: "taking me to the golf club was easier than finding a baby sitter..."

Stewart Cink is one of the best golfers in the world. At the time of writing he is ranked 6 in the world. He has won five times in the USA, most recently the Travelers Championship in June 2008. He has also twice lost in a play-off after finishing joint first in a US tour event.

2008 was a great year. He was runner up to Tiger Woods in the World Golf Championships - Accenture Match Play Championship, and finished third in the US Masters, as well as second place in the PODS championship.

Stewart Cink has yet to win a major, but has finished 3rd in the US Masters (2008), 3rd in the US Open (2001), 3rd in the USPGA (1999) and 6th in the Open Championship (2007). He has played in 4 Ryder Cups (USA v Europe) and 3 President's Cup, (USA v The Rest of the World).

Golf has always been part of his life: "My parents used to take me to the golf

club because it was easier than getting a babysitter and I would play on the cart. People ask me when I started playing golf. The answer is I don't know because it was earlier than I can remember. I used to set myself targets - break 60, 50, 40 for 9 holes.

"My first breakthrough came in a junior tournament in Alabama where I lived when I was 8. There were only two players in the under eleven section and I won. The following year I lost to Brian Gaynow a US tour player - who even got a hole in one. So by the age of 9, I had learnt that it was more fun to win than to lose".

He got a scholarship to Georgia Tech, which gave him the chance to practise a lot and develop his game. But a chance encounter was to change his life. "The golf team had lunch together each day. Once a player brought a friend who was a church minister. The minister asked me

to consider: if I died that day, would I go to heaven or hell? I replied 'heaven' because I was a good person, I did not cheat on the golf course, and I would help an old lady across the road. I was embarrassed by the question because guys don't talk about personal things like that. "It was seven years before I learned the right answer to that question - that I could only go to heaven because Jesus died on a cross to take care of my sins. There is no one who is perfect and the basis of my life is believing that Jesus died for my sins. I don't believe in Jesus in order to get more birdies, but he gives me a great sense of peace. Having Christ in my life makes the valleys less deep and the peaks less steep.

"Winning tournaments, playing Ryder Cup are great, but they only last a week - in Jesus I have something that will last forever."


