Remembrance

A number of years ago Jeremy Clarkson from Top Gear, presented a documentary, 'The Victoria Cross: For Valour'. This told the stories of some VC heroes, including his own father-inlaw, who he never knew. Moved by these stories. Clarkson went on to ask, 'How can we call the likes of David Beckham a hero for scoring a goal? I wonder who your heroes are today?'

In this season of remembrance we think especially of those who have sacrificed their lives in war. However, Jesus calls us all to a radical and supernatural heroism when he says, 'You have heard that it was said, 'Love your neighbour and hate your enemy.' But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be children of your Father in heaven,' (Matt 5:43-45).

God calls us to love even those we regard as our enemies. It's easy to love those we get on with or find attractive. The love of which Jesus speaks, as throughout the New Testament, is agape love. This quality of love seeks and works only for the good of the other person. When we can pray for someone we don't get on with, God begins to answer your prayer by softening our attitude toward them. We love them because they are individuals created in the image of God and in need of God's forgiveness and grace, just like us.

This month marks the 25th anniversary of the Enniskillen bombing in Northern Ireland on 8th November 1987. An IRA bomb exploded during a Remembrance Day service, resulting in 11 people being killed and 63 injured. What is remembered most from this day is the interview Gordon Wilson gave only hours after the bombing. It brought him to international prominence, as he described the conversation with his dying daughter Marie, as they lay buried in rubble. To the astonishment of listeners, Wilson went on to say, 'But I bear no ill will. I bear no grudge... She's in heaven and we shall meet again. I will pray for these men tonight and every night.' The impact of his words lay in his willingness to forgive the bombers, and as a result Wilson went on to dedicate his life as a campaigner for peace and reconciliation. He perfectly models Jesus words for us. 'No words in more than twentyfive years of violence in Northern Ireland had such a powerful, emotional impact.' (Jonathan Bardon).



The Church of England decision to ordain women.... 20 years on

Canon David Winter shares his memories of that memorable day.

20 years ago this month, on the 11th of Ducklington the two of us literally November, 1992, the General Synod of the wept with joy. Little did we think Church of England voted to allow women to become priests. (The first women were ordained as priests in March 1994). Canon David Winter remembers it well....

I remember sitting in the living room of the rectory with my late wife on the afternoon of November 11th 1992. We were watching the televised debate of the General Synod of the Church of England on whether or not to admit women to the priesthood.

Both of us had, over a period of time, come to believe that St Paul meant exactly what he wrote when he said that 'in Christ there is neither male nor female' (Galatians 3:28), even if at the time he didn't himself see the full consequences of that belief in terms of the world and the Church of his day. Christine had been brought up in the Brethren, and in her childhood it would have been unthinkable for a woman even to say a prayer in a mixed gathering. I was a lifelong Anglican, and until probably the nineteeneighties it would never have occurred to me that vicars could be anything but male.

Yet now we sat, in rapt attention, as a magnificent debate unfolded. If only Parliament could argue like this: no anger, no insults, a sensitivity to the views and principles of others, and all presided over with immaculate courtesy and restraint by the Archbishop. But how would the vote go? Experts predicted that it would be close, probably so close that the measure to ordain women would fail to reach the necessary

But it happened. There was prayer before the result, but unrestrained joy (at least outside the chamber) by those who had longed for this moment. And at the rectory in

then that our own daughter, not long out of university and making a career in publishing, would fifteen vears later follow in the steps of those pioneer women priests.

At the time, no one knew quite what to expect. Would church people welcome a woman curate (and later vicar)? Would the general public accept the idea? Would the advent of women in the ministry draw people into the church, or possibly put them off? Well, now we know. The 'Vicar of Dibley' helped (ves. it really did!). But more important was the living impact of women, some young, some quite senior, working in parishes and chaplaincies up

and down the land, until today nobody is even slightly surprised if the vicar who turns up to discuss a funeral, baptism or wedding happens years!

to be female. The sky has not fallen in. There are still, of course, people in the Church who cannot accept the priestly ordination of women, and who are now worried that soon there will be women bishops. Yet time and again parishes advertising for a priest choose a woman candidate, usually because they have seen the ministry of women in action. It's the 'proof of the pudding'.

In the very first chapter of the Bible it says that God 'created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them'. (Genesis 1:27). It's taken a long while for the Church to accept the fundamental truth of that. and also of those words of St Paul even longer than it took it to accept the same principle regarding slaves.

The amazing thing is that it's now impossible to think of the Church of England without its women priests. That's quite a revolution in just twenty

All praise for the wildlife

On reading a book on the rural rides of William Cobbett, I note he was an authority on native English trees. Paintings and prints depicting the period show lush oaks, beeches and elm trees everywhere. Imagine the woodlands of that time (1821 - 1831.) No worry of insects

destroying the elms or threatening the oak trees, no fears of over-felling woodland to satisfy the increasing need for wood products: machines needed for this work were years away. There was just the occasional sound of the peasant's axe



wood in order to cook his food or boil water to wash himself.

Some things in history change for the better, others do not. The depleting woodlands is one of the latter, but while it saddens me to see this happen, it is interesting to note how wildlife, sensitive to modern change, frequent more readily gardens and hedgerows and come close almost trustingly, looking to us for food they need for themselves and their families. I am fascinated, not only to see a mother bird feeding her young, but to watch as she teaches it to drink water from the birdbath and also literally teaches it to bathe. It has always been so, but happens frequently now and closer and closer to the house.


