SCHOOL NEWS





People and Places of the Past by Dorothy Murray

Horse transport was the only means of conveying goods in the country.

Tom Woolley farmed a small farm at Slade, Otterden, following his father in the 1800's. As well as this he carted goods for neighbours and helped on Hurst Farm at busy times.



The next photo, taken in 1890, is of Otterden Estate workmen cutting and carting timber. Much chestnut was grown and, when felled, was cut into lengths for stakes and posts for fencing. The stakes (or spiles) were then steeped in a tank of creosote (or tar) as a preservative. Ash wood was cut mainly for firewood, needed by every home.

In the second photo Tom is seen

weighed approximately half a

hundredweight.

delivering a load of hay, one ton of 40

trusses. Hay was cut out of the stack by

hand with a heavy hay knife. Each truss

tree trunks having been felled on the Otterden Estate. Five horses were needed to transport them down the hill, through Lenham to the railway station, on the way to Yorkshire. They would lay for 10 years to season. The heavy horses came from Yorkshire by train each year and were stabled at Court Lodge Farm, Lenham. Young boys enjoyed running beside them to watch the unloading at the station.

With apologies from Editor. Omission from last month's article: "Sheaves were fed into the top (of the threshing machine), the corn came down a chute into sacks, weighed (two and a quarter cwt for wheat) and carted to the granary."

TEEN meets GOD: Katie's story

I was born 3 months premature. I weighed 1lb 6 ozs at birth and was put into intensive care at UCL Hospital for 13 weeks. Doctors, really to this day, are astounded that I'm alive and pretty much healthy. It was because of this whole experience that my parents realised that God was real and had a plan for our lives.

However, it was when I was 11 years old that I decided I wanted to own their faith for myself. This Jesus - who I'd heard about all my life - seemed like a pretty decent guy and I wanted to know him! In our children's group at church one Sunday we were all given an opportunity to give our lives to Jesus. I remember standing up in front of my church, the following week, and receiving my first Bible. Then the scary season of life started: Secondary school! We all know that being a teenager isn't easy, but it certainly helped me knowing for sure that God was always on my side, even when I felt the world was against me. At school I dealt with various medical issues, such as two operations on my spine at age 12, and friendship issues that turned into bullying. Then, at 15, I went through one of

Then, at 15, I went through one of the worst seasons of my life. My best friend had told me he wanted to die. This was a catalyst for what later turned into depression. I had counselling for a year at school, and that woman was, and still is, one of my favourite people. Her sessions didn't just help me get through this mental health issue, but she kept my eyes utterly focused on Jesus. Despite the

constant battleground that was going on in my head, I learned in this time what a relationship with Jesus actually looked like.

So now, four years later, there isn't even a hint of depression coming back. My relationship with my maker is really strong, because I figured out that He isn't just interested in you when things are going good; Jesus wants to be in your pain, holding your hand too.

Katie is 19 and lives in Nottingham.
