Fridays - Remembering those who have fought for our freedom.


Saturdays - Remembering to help those in need.

Three days later is Remembrance Sunday this year when we continue to remember those who have died in wars since 1914, particularly of course the two world wars. This year, as in recent years, our Remembrance Service for High Downs - Eastling, Stalisfield and Throwley - will be in Throwley Church, starting outside and then moving into the Church. We will be taking all the precautions needed at this time but we will remember together.

Remembering might be about a personal loss. For myself we are at that stage, since my mother's death in June, of beginning to clear the house and we have found some letters written to my Father when he was 14 years old by his eldest brother whilst he was on Service in Africa in 1944. The letters are really moving and I never knew they existed until now. One of the reasons is because they are from Lance Corporal S H Lillicrap - my uncle had the same initials as me and we share the same middle name. They are particularly poignant as my uncle died in the 1953 flu epidemic, 5 years before I was born. A different sort of remembering.

It has made me reflect on the importance of remembering.



history where the Psalmist reminds his listeners of all that God has done for his people. He calls them to remember the mighty blessings of God. For example Psalm 105 starts with these words before going on through the history of God's people:

Give praise to the LORD, proclaim his name; make known among the nations what he has done.

This is about remembering the past to point to the present and to the future; to remember God and his blessings to His people so as to know that He will continue to interact with his people.

We remember on Remembrance Sunday those who gave up so much for us to be able to live in peace so that we continue to seek the peace they fought for.

Safe Spaces launches to offer support to survivors

A new service providing vital support for survivors of church-related abuse has recently become operational. Safe Spaces, commissioned by the Anglican and Catholic Churches in England and Wales, is to be run by Victim Support, a national charity with a track record of providing survivor support. safespaces@victimsupport.org.uk is a free and independent support service, providing a confidential, personal and safe space for anyone who has been abused through their relationship with either the Church of England, Church in Wales or the Catholic Church of England and Wales. Safe Spaces comprises a team of trained support advocates, who have undergone specialist training in supporting survivors of sexual violence and who have received additional specific training in how the churches respond to abuse cases, and the particular issues affecting people who have had or still have, a relationship with the church. The service is for those who may have experienced any form of abuse, including sexual abuse, physical abuse, financial abuse, psychological abuse (including spiritual abuse), domestic abuse, coercive and controlling behaviour.

The service will run for an initial two years, with a view to extending this. Call 0300 303 1056. It has been paid for by the Catholic and Anglican churches involved, supported by a grant from Allchurches Trust.

Walking with God

When lockdown began, I was still relatively new in my current job and found life was getting difficult; like many people across the country. I had to stop swimming, work from home and could not go to church. I know I am an emotional eater and with the decrease in exercise and working close to the kitchen it is no surprise that I started gaining weight.

To begin with I ignored it (who would not) then my mental health started being affected by the lockdown and I started feeling low and depressed and the last straw was when in May I stepped on the scales and was horrified at what they said!

I sought a telephone consultation with my GP and explained how I felt and what I weighed and her first response was anti-depressants. That would have been the easy option but I knew it was not the answer. I needed to lose weight to feel good about myself again and I asked her

for help with that. Those of you who know me know that I lost a lot of weight before with the help of a slimming club but of course they had stopped also. The GP offered to refer me to a weight loss clinic, even though they were not meeting physically I would get support and someone to talk to, to help me tackle my weight and my issue with

emotional eating.

I decided to start walking. So, I got up earlier each day and would walk 2 miles before breakfast and I counted my calories! I upped the walking to twice a day and some days even three times; I try to do between 5 and 6 miles a day. We are so privileged to live in the most beautiful part of the country with wonderful countryside and many varying walks.

How has the walking helped me?

Well it has helped me in more ways than I ever imagined, physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually.

Physically I have lost over 13kg (2 stone) I have lost a total of 30 cm (nearly 12 inches) in total, so my body must be getting healthier, it must be improving my internal organs and my body in general.

Emotionally and mentally Walking raises my endorphins and this makes me feel good, it starts my day off as I can get rid of the cobwebs that have amassed during my sleep and at the end of the day I can put my working day behind me and enjoy the evening with my family. Losing the weight has made me feel better about myself.

Spiritually I use this time to enjoy God's creation. I have seen the seasons change, seen the animals at work, the colours strewn beautifully across the sky. I also use this time to speak to God, to pray. We live such busy lives that sometimes we don't find the time we should, to be with God. So, God walks with me, I talk to him, thank him for the good in my life, pray for my loved ones, our village, our churches, and myself. I also use this time to listen, to reflect, to feel at peace with God. I feel closer to God.

To enable me to continue my walks I have bought myself a waterproof jacket. So, if you see someone wearing a red jacket who appears to be talking to herself, it isn't Father Christmas it is me taking my daily walk with God.

Eastling Primary School News

Eastling Primary School has had a wonderful and busy start to the year. Unfortunately there are some of our normal school events which we are currently unable to hold due to the restrictions. The school has been amazing at making adjustments to ensure our children have a full and rich curriculum and learning experiences. We are extremely fortunate to have two school minibuses which means that we are still able to have school trips.

On Friday 25th September as planned the whole school had an outdoor learning day. All the classes participated in the cooking organised by 'Wild Classrooms'. The children in Acorn class made bird feeders, autumn sun catchers, went on a nature walk around Eastling and made a friendship web. Silver Birch class did tie dying, walked to the woods - where they did some describing work for their English learning and made sculptures in the style of Andrew Goldsworthy. Willow class planted seasonal fruit and vegetables in their

planters. They decorated pebbles as insects to put into the planters and made bee hotels. Oak class made Greek Laurel Reef headbands, played Ancient Greek Games and created wild art

On Friday 9th October Silver Birch visited Faversham Gunpowder works and Faversham Creek as part of their learning on the local area. They were learning about the history of industry in Faversham.

A team from Oak class took part in a virtual football challenge organised by the school's sports partnership.

Willow class had a Stone Age Day on Friday 16th October. They started the day by walking to the woods to find suitable sticks. On their journey to the woods the children identified different species of trees and hedgerow. Back at school they used potato peelers to peel the sticks and used them to cook fish. They seasoned and cooked the fish over an open fire, made vegetable kebabs and cooked them on the hot stones. They also

made Stone Age flatbreads. Acorn class are enjoying their weekly nature walks. On Tuesday 20th October Acorn class visited Sevington Pumpkin Farm. The children had a wonderful visit with their first time going in the school minibuses. They brought pumpkins back to school to carve and decorate ready for the annual Eastling Primary School pumpkin carving competition.

On Tuesday 20th October a team from Willow and Oak class took part in their first 'The Little Debate' against Alexander McLeod Primary School in Greenwich. The motion was: The school summer holidays should be longer than six weeks. Our team were opposed to the motion and won. The team had been working all term with Mrs Mansfield at the lunchtime club.

Term 1 ended on Friday 23rd October. As the Friends of Eastling School (FOES) were unable to hold the annual Halloween disco, the children were invited to come into school in fancy dress.



Richard Bewes considers the beginning of the Church Year...

The message of Advent? – history is going somewhere!

'And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling clothes and laid him in a manger...' (Luke 2:7)

'They will see the Son of Man coming on the clouds of the sky, with power and great glory.' (Matthew 24:30)

What a contrast between the humble birth of Jesus in Bethlehem - and his eventual return! No one knows when that day will be, but it will be earth-shaking. In the meantime, Advent reminds us of the last of six great saving actions of God in Jesus Christ.

The Birth of Jesus at Bethlehem was to inaugurate our salvation. The Death of Jesus at Calvary established it – forever. The Resurrection of Jesus at Easter confirmed it. The Ascension of Jesus to heaven celebrated it. The Gift of the Spirit at Pentecost drove it worldwide. And sixthly will come the Return of Jesus at the world's end - to consummate and complete it.

The message of Advent reminds us that history is not circular or locked into an unending stalemate. Neither can we ever accept a notion of successive reincarnations, for the Bible is clear that man is destined to die once, and after that to face judgment (Hebrews 9:27).

The Bible has had many pre-runs of that final 'Day of the Lord.' Noah's flood, the overthrow of wicked Babylon; these and other upheavals were but pointers to the final 'Day of our Lord Jesus Christ' (1 Corinthians 1:8), when all wrongs will be stopped, and the Lord shall reign with justice.

> For the Bible is clear that world history is leading to a Conclusion, to the new heaven and the new earth. That will be inaugurated when He shall come to judge the quick and the dead. Christ's return will usher in the final triumph, bringing

about the dismantling of the whole apparatus of Evil that has so harassed us across the centuries.

The Cross and Resurrection secured the victory over evil. Christ's return will make it final! Believers echo Paul's words in 1 Thessalonians 4:17 - 'And so we will be with the Lord for ever.' If we have a strong view of the future, we can be sure it will energise us in the present!

In the meantime, Advent is coming round once again. It's time to celebrate the first of God's six mighty acts that secured our salvation - and look forward to the future.

"Don't suffer in silence this winter"

Charity's plea to the farming community in England and Wales by Alex Phillimore

National rural charity The Farming Community Network (FCN) is urging agricultural workers in England and Wales not to suffer in silence this winter, as the industry enters one of the most challenging periods it has ever faced. FCN runs a confidential national Helpline (03000 111 999) and e-Helpline (help@fcn.org.uk) which is open every day of the year from 7am to 11pm. FCN's Helpline is operated by volunteers who are from farming backgrounds and understand farming pressures.

FCN is encouraging those experiencing feelings of isolation, anxiety or other concerns this winter to call or email its Helpline for a confidential chat. The charity, which provides support to farming families and others who work in the industry, has seen a significant shift in the reasons people are calling its Helpline during recent months – with an increase in calls relating to mental health.

Mark Thomas, FCN's Helpline Manager and Regional Director for the South of England, said: "Nearly half of all calls made to our support Helpline over the past four months have related to mental health and wellbeing, overtaking financial difficulties which has previously been the most common factor in calls received.


"Come out and fight!" - but they took fright This mountain among men.

Unanimous support from Archbishops' Council on safeguarding proposals

The Archbishops' Council, at a recent meeting, voted unanimously for safeguarding proposals to offer both immediate practical support to survivors of abuse and also to strengthen independence in the Church's safeguarding work.

The Council approved a proposed plan for an interim pilot support scheme for survivors and agreed to draw down reserves for an initial support fund to support those who have come forward. The Council also committed to urgently pursue the principle of independent safeguarding recognising the need for greater independence and transparency of safeguarding.

The pilot scheme is designed to enable the Church to respond in particular to those survivors' cases which are already known to the Church, where the survivor is known to be in seriously distressed circumstances, and the Church has a heightened responsibility because of the way the survivor was responded to following disclosure.

Experience with these pilot cases will help inform the setting up of the Church's full redress scheme for victims and survivors of abuse as that is developed. Part of the value of a pilot scheme is that it will enable the Church to explore different ways of working and to learn important lessons for the future.

This is an endorsement by the Archbishops' Council of General Synod's unanimous vote in February for a more fully survivor-centred approach to safeguarding, including arrangements for redress.

Archbishop Justin Welby said: "To fail on safeguarding casts a profound stain across every good thing we do. I have said this before and I continue to stand by it. But I am acutely aware as we come towards the end of this year that while there is a genuine commitment for the safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults to be the highest priority of all parts of the Church, it is evident we still have not got it right.

"The report published today is a stark and shocking reminder of how so many times we have failed – and continue to fail - survivors. Apologies are vital, but they are not enough. We have to listen. We have to learn. And we have to act.

"In calling for the enquiry, through a letter to the then Home Secretary Theresa May in 2014, I was aware that although it would be something that survivors had demanded it would also be a deeply painful process to tell their stories. I am very grateful to them for their

courage. We cannot and will not make excuses and I must again offer my sincere apologies to those to have been abused, and to their families, friends and colleagues.

"There is clearly much to respond to and an in-depth consideration of today's report is vital. IICSA has shone a light on the past and present to help us better inform our future safeguarding work. They are owed our thanks which we give wholeheartedly. I pray this report and its recommendations will result in the changes needed to make our Church a safer place for all now and for future generations."

Moral questions from the pandemic


You may have missed it at the time. The movie 'Contagion' didn't make much of an impact when it was released for public viewing in2011. Perhaps it was thought to be unrealistic. It was about a highly contagious, unknown virus, transmitted by an infected bat to a pig in a Chinese marketplace. From there it spread like wildfire round the world. It was fiction then of course, but not so far-fetched as to be distant from reality, as we now know. Deadly viruses, and the plagues they cause, have been part of world history since time began. In the early days, when travel between continents was infrequent, their spread was slower and usually confined to local regions.

CONTAGION

The way the film's imaginary plot develops bears an uncanny resemblance to what we have experienced this year. Panic buying empties supermarkets, whole populations adopt social distancing, scientists work flat out to identify the virus and then search for a means to combat it. Meanwhile, millions are infected, and quarantines are imposed.

The story progresses far beyond the reality which is familiar to us. The irresponsible use of social media and false rumours of a cure lead to the looting of pharmacies. Emergency food supplies are ransacked, law and order break down. Troops police the streets. Then there's a breakthrough: a vaccine is discovered. But that raises a new moral problem: who will get it first and what would be a fair distribution system?

The movie is still available via Netflix, or you can buy a DVD online. Despite the inevitable carnage of the pandemic and the suffering it portrays, it contrives to have a relatively happy ending. In real life, we haven't got that far yet. But, please God, we will. After all, most deadly diseases are now under control and both vaccination and immunisation are part and parcel of everyday life; old 'uns take it for granted that their GP will summon them for an anti-flu jab each winter. But we may face an ethical dilemma when it comes to a vaccine for Covid-19. If there's an initial shortage, who should get it first? Should money come into it? Are Christian principles applicable?


