# November Message

'Remember, remember the fifth of *November*....' the old saying goes as we remember Guy Fawkes and the gunpowder plot. We are also invited to remember on the 11th November as we think about all those who have given their lives in war. On 1<sup>st</sup> & 2<sup>nd</sup> November the church celebrates All Saints Day followed by All Souls Day. These festivals were adopted by the early Celtic Christians from the pagan festival of Samhain which celebrates this time of year when the veil between this world and the otherworld is at it's thinnest. On All Saints and All Souls Day we still retain those elements of remembering and honouring the dead.


I think there is something about the melancholy nature of the whole month of November that invites us into remembrance, as we leave behind the colours of summer and autumn and head into the barrenness of winter. The clocks have changed, our days grow short as our fires grow long and the smell of woodsmoke hangs in the air. Scents and smells have a way of transporting us directly into particular memories. My mother used to wear a rose-scented perfume. Many years after her death, I came across a similar perfume in a National Trust shop. When I

sprayed the tester onto my hand, I could immediately see and feel my mother's presence. It was like an extraordinary time-machine! The Roman Catholic Sister Joyce Rupp writes 'Remembrances associated with a positive scent keep us in touch with pleasures we've known. They can also reconnect us to our loved ones, along with helping to balance discontent when it swirls through us. We can retain hope's aliveness with positive memories when we pause to deliberately recall who and what gifted us by holding us in the arms of kindly acceptance."


Perhaps November offers us an invitation to make a spiritual practice of remembering. Not all memories are pleasant ones, of course. They can bring up hurtful experiences that haunt us and there is a time and a place for looking at these and finding out what they want to say to us. But a suggestion from Joyce Rupp for November is to pause at the end of each day and within that quiet space to look for a cherished memory. When it enters your awareness, welcome it, embrace it, savour it. Gather the gratitude and hold it close to your heart.

# Finding the right Key

Ever since early times it has always been necessary for something to be locked up. Keys, in all kinds of shapes and sizes, have been needed to protect valuable commodities from thieves. Also, when people had to be punished or protected from others, they were confined in prisons with suitable locks and keys.

Apparently, the oldest discovered keys, made of wood, were found in ancient Nineveh – the city visited by the prophet Jonah. They are some 6,000 years old. Later, the Romans invented more sophisticated locks and keys made of metal.

At the time of Jesus, the Jews needed access to the Kingdom of Heaven, and He came to open it up to them. Jesus spoke to the disciple Peter and said He was going to give him the 'keys' of the Kingdom. (Matthew 16:18-19) Peter would unlock priceless Gospel truths. These keys were given to a trusted servant to open the doors of faith to all who wanted to hear.

Later, Paul described Jesus as an important key. The apostle was concerned that people in Colossae were in danger of following false doctrines and philosophies. Paul knew that all understanding and perception about God was found in Jesus. Only Jesus had the key to all concealed spiritual treasures. Paul wanted people to know Jesus, who would open the door to all they needed to know about their relationship with Him and their purpose in the world.

Sometimes we can lose a key. May we never lose hold of Jesus who is *our* key to life today and for evermore!

He (Jesus) is the key that opens all the hidden treasures of God's wisdom and knowledge. (Col 2.3)


We have music, gaming, craft, table tennis, table football, outside games in the Summer, craft table, tuck shop (everything 10 - 50p), free cake and drink.

### Are you eligible for Pension Credit?

Are you over State Pension age, or know someone who is? If so, it's important to be aware of the benefits available through Pension Credit.

Pension Credit can top up your pension income and help with day-to-day living costs.

Even if you own your home or have savings, you may still be eligible to claim Pension Credit. By doing so, you could also gain access to several additional benefits, such as:

- Winter Fuel Payment and other help with heating costs.
- Help with rent and Council Tax, easing the burden of monthly bills.
- A free TV licence for those aged 75 or over.
- Assistance with NHS services, covering NHS dental treatment, glasses, and transport costs for hospital appointments.

To be eligible for Pension Credit, your weekly income should be below £218.15 if you live alone, or £332.95 if you have a partner who lives with you. In certain circumstances, the qualifying income level may be higher.

Don't miss out on the support you're entitled to.

#### Justus - leading the Church in troubled times

Does this sound familiar? An Archbishop of Canterbury tries to bring unity and calm to a Church split down the middle over seemingly irreconcilable differences, and all the while to promote the Gospel to the wider non-Christian society, in the face of widespread ignorance and even hostility towards Christianity.

This isn't Justin Welby, though. It was Justus, a 7<sup>th</sup> century archbishop of Canterbury. Like Justin Welby, he had a passion for mission – he began as one of the Roman missionaries sent in 601 by Pope Gregory the Great – to reinforce Augustine. Once in England, he was quickly put to work – becoming the first ever Bishop of Rochester, in 604. It was then that he joined with other church leaders to urge the Irish and British (Celtic) Christians to repair the great church divide of the time – to conform their customs to those of Rome. (They were largely ignored.)

In 616 things got worse. There was a pagan reaction in Kent and Essex, and without any support from the pagan King Edbald, Justus and Mellitus knew it was time to get out – quick. They escaped to France, and the whole English mission seemed in peril. Then – an unexpected breakthrough occurred – the king was converted. So back came Justus, to become Archbishop of Canterbury in 624. Pope Boniface V had faith in his ability and courage – he bestowed on him both the pallium and the power to consecrate bishops in England. When Justus died 10<sup>th</sup> November 627, he was buried at St Augustine's monastery. Then, in the 11<sup>th</sup> century, Justus was moved to a site in Canterbury Cathedral, behind the high altar.

# Spider time of day

Are you afraid of the big spiders that come into your house each autumn? Then avoid wandering around your house at about 7.35pm each evening.

It seems that that is the peak time for creepy crawlies to scuttle around your house, looking for a mate. An entomologist at the University of Cloucestershire adds: 'We think that while people are more likely to be sat down and able to view spiders at 7.30pm, the pattern of sightings in rooms other than living rooms suggests that it is not just people driving the pattern - so we think it probably does reflect some spider ecology too.

No one is sure why spiders feel frisky at 7.30pm, but the good news is that the vast majority of UK spiders are harmless to people, and excellent pest controllers. 'So we should really celebrate the spider season.' As long as the spider is NOT running around on the couch with you.
