

urge you, brothers, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God - this is your spiritual act of worship". What better place to offer our bodies to God than on the sports field?

Jesus also gave us the great commandment, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: Love your neighbour as yourself." (Matthew 22:37-39). It is one thing for me to please the great coach in heaven by how I play my sport but if I play against you my aim is to beat you. Surely if I love you, I would want you to win not me?

We know how to play to win but how do we play to love? If you are playing your sport to please God, then you also have to love your

We are made in the image of God and our purpose is to demonstrate and proclaim God's image and presence in all we do. We are to treat our opponents, as we would like to be treated ourselves.

Applying that in competitive sport is a radical concept. If we see our opponent, not as our enemy but as our neighbour, and moreover a neighbour whom Jesus tells us to love as ourselves, it certainly affects our attitude to the opponent. We treat our opponent with respect. We play hard but do not seek an unfair advantage.

As Paul writes in Romans 12:1 "Therefore, I Our aim is to honour God in the competition. That is our motivation - not greed, aggression, selfishness, etc.

> For Christian sportspeople, living our life by the Golden Rule is our purpose in sport - as in all other aspects of life. Winning and losing are by-products, not the main thing. This is not to say that winning or losing is unimportant. Christians do not have to be lovable losers.

The fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23) includes 'gentleness'. And in dealing with a problem in the church at Corinth, Paul writes, "By the meekness and gentleness of Christ, I appeal to you..." (2 Corinthians

There is no doubt that humility, meekness, gentleness are essential parts of the Christian character, but we still have to work out how it affects our attitude to competitive sport. It seems that these verses tell us more about how we should conduct ourselves in the heat of the battle and in any other sphere of our Christian life, than about whether or not we can compete to

I see no reason why Christians cannot compete to win and give it 100% without any conflict with their faith. It is not easy but it can be done. Moreover I would go as far as to say that if you cannot compete in a spirit of loving your neighbour, then I would suggest that as a Christian, you cannot compete at all.

This year has seen some unusual spring and summer weather but, despite the tropical rain storms, the gardens in Ospringe Parish and the allotments look as good as ever. The allotments were judged on a Saturday in June. Despite the threat of rain, and some 'spits of rain, the judges visited all 90 allotments, ably led by the allotments manager Alan Gidlow. The allotments are a pleasure to visit. Pleasure on the eye, pleasure on the nose with some excellent fragrances. Alan does a terrific job, he knows the allotments like the back of his hand, knows the people who work so hard on their piece of land, and he works hard to keep back the weeds from the pathways. He also grows potatoes for the Henry Doubleday institute!

The allotments have a huge variety of vegetables and flowers, too many to list. Many of the vegetables are in neat rows, which show off nature's colours admirably. Some of the allotments are organic, which is a growing trend! All make use of a range of re-cycled material to provide storage, fences and growing frames.

The gardens were judged on a beautiful sunny morning in July. A good time to be out of the house and to take one's time to view the many excellent gardens in the Parish. Also, the opportunity to meet our hard working gardeners, all of whom im-

pressed the judges with their knowledge of plants & flowers, and their keen eye for shape, form & colour. Many imaginative designs in a blaze of colour. A feature of our parish is the excellent use of containers and hanging baskets for flowers. Clearly the people who live in the parish love their gardens and the tranquillity they enjoy when sitting in them. EASTLING PARISH COUNCIL

At their September meeting councillors discussed the possibility of lowering the speed limit through the village. Cllr. Prescott was present and told the meeting that Tunstall now has a 20mph limit with, similar to Eastling, houses on one side of the street only. The parish council has requested a meeting with the highways department.

•Despite having the funds available, the proposed bus shelter at Glebe cottages has been put on hold. Moat Housing seemed unwilling to give consent to using their land and local residents were worried about possible vandalism. • Cllr. Nigel Bikerdike agreed to take over the role of Tree Warden for Eastling. • There was some concern about the reinstatement of footpaths following ploughing. • Some people have experienced difficulty accessing the new village website and this will be discussed at the next meeting. • The National Association of Parish Councils advises all Parish Councils to adopt a complaints procedure in their standing orders. Cllr. Prescott suggested Eastling look into this matter. The next meeting is on Monday, 8th November at 8pm.


Eastling Short Mat Bowls


PUDDLEDUCKS Playgroup

Four years ago, sadly, her husband was wonderful support of our endeavours in the Chernigov/Chernobyl region of the Ukraine. We have thus far this year sent five 40 ton truck loads of humanitarian aid and each truck is loaded to the gunnels with the much needed humanitarian aid. Clothing, shoes, bedding, food, toiletries, toys, items for handicapped

children and adults, etc.

I have recently returned home having spent an entire month in Chernigov. We are now beginning to make significant differences to the lives of so many impoverished families and this is very good news indeed. I usually only spend two weeks at a time in the Ukraine, trying to fit in as much as possible, but this visit was a nice relaxed one and therefore far more enjoyable for me.

As well as visiting some of our orphanages and our four community centres, I also met some truly extraordinary people. One of these

killed, leaving Tanya with an eight year old daughter to bring up. The following year, the bus that Tanya was travelling in, was involved in a crash with a lorry and, sadly, Tanya lost both legs at the knees. Now 34 years old with a 12 year old daughter, Dana, to raise, she contacted our Aratta community centre. I went along with Natasha, one of our 'case workers' to see how we could be of help to Tanya It turned out that Tanya did not want help from us, quite the reverse, she wanted to know how she could help Aratta? Her idea was to run a small magazine, aimed at other handicapped people living in the Chernigov region. Her wonderfully positive attitude to life, raising her daughter in a way that shows "She does not have a mother who is handicapped in any way" is a remarkable testament to her indomitable courage. On meeting such people, one's own life is changed irrevocably and, when it was time to leave Tanya's home, I left totally was, Tanya, a really delightful and positive elated and smiling from having spent such

precious time with her. In her kitchen is a 40 year old gas boiler and this we are going to have replaced with a new one that she can have at a more convenient level. Philip is going to help get her magazine off the ground, so all in all, a marvellous story to relate to you all. Our ongoing endeavours on behalf of these very kindly Ukrainian people can only

continue with your wonderful support and generosity, because without you we can do nothing. The biggest problem we have is raising the necessary funds to expand our work. We fully appreciate that you are continually being asked to support this charity or that charity and that each one of you can only do so much. If you are able to help us with our funding, then our very grateful thanks goes out to you, but having said that, we would never ever ask you to donate more than you can reasonably afford, as knowing this fact would sadden us greatly.

This year has seen Philip working tremendously hard on our behalf, contacting of various items useful for our supported schools and orphanages, plumbing equipment, toilets, washbasins etc. that they may be able to donate to us. This has been very successful We are shortly putting in a washroom at our Timkii orphanage that will benefit the 60 handicapped children there enormously, especially once the winter weather arrives. We are also refurbishing toilet and washing facilities at the orphanages at Novokievka and Komorovka, neglected for many years and As well as Philip and me, we have Janet and currently unusable.

We are effectively helping 22 orphanages, as well as our 4 "Aratta" community centres with over 300 new families now seeking our help every month. We try never to turn anyone away, giving as much help and emotional support as we possibly can.
