
What does it mean to Work for Reconciliation

It was 1993 and the lecture was on the theology of Forgiveness and Reconciliation. During the question and comment period, the speaker was challenged by one of the eminent members of the audience; "But Mr. Volf, can You really embrace a Cetnik?" Professor Jurgan Moltmann had cut through the academic and theological to the heart of reconciliation. His simple question to Miroslav Slav, the visiting Croatian theologian, whose homeland, at that time, was in a state of terror because of Serbian, Cetnik, aggression and atrocities, takes us to the heart of our Christianity and our response to acts of terror. Could the man, who had just spoken about embracing our enemies in the process of reconciliation, reach out and embrace one of those who were committing rape, murder and terror to his homeland, his friends and his families? What would this do to his identity as a human being, as a Croat, as a Christian?

Leaving the theologian for a few minutes, let's look at a family caught in the drunken murder of a young man, who was a son, a husband, and a father; and his family's response.

In northern Canada, one Christian family's story was transformed because they saw it in light of God's reconciling story—the story of Jesus' mercy and forgiveness.

Duril McKay, from Red Earth First Nation, northern Saskatchewan, died tragically on New Year's Eve, 2012. He and his wife, Christy, were expecting their third child when Duril attended a New Year's Eve party with his friends. Duril's life ended that night at the hands of some of the other people at the party. In the midst of such terrible grief and tragedy,




Duril's family and community to our love, who forgive us showed amazing grace. In the time nothing, when we forgive all, who between his death and the funeral his requite our love with hatred and family wrote a letter to the community expressing their grief and their invitation for all to support be simply the passive acceptance them in their intent to forgive and support the members of the accused's family-and to welcome them to the wake and funeral.

In the letter they also wrote: "...Any act of retaliation or retribution by anyone or on anyone or against anyone, or turning to alcohol for escape or comfort, will not bring Duril back or change the events of that evening. This is not how we As Dietrich Bonhoeffer and this wish to remember Duril. Our family northern Native village family does not wish Duril to be found, and as Miroslav Volf remembered as the cause for further recounts, this process of hurting."

In the midst of tragedy and grief, the light of the Gospel was still shining in the lives of these believers. Their faith, and their willingness to see their own story in the light of God's Kingdom, was transformative, bringing healing out of brokenness. Jesus said to us, "Love your enemies, and be good to everyone who hates you. Ask God to bless anyone who curses you, and pray for everyone who is cruel to you." (Luke 6. 27-28) Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the German theologian and martyr, wrote; "The will of God, is that men should defeat their enemies by loving (Bonhoeffer, Cost of them." Discipleship, 1948, pg 132) He then goes on to write: "By our enemies Jesus means those who are quite intractable and utterly unresponsive

It's back to the whirl of Westminster after the summer recess and I've been getting stuck in. A new Prime Minister at the helm of a new Cabinet means there are fresh opportunities to shape the Government's agenda.

With that in mind, I called a House of Commons debate on fly-parking – lorries parking in inappropriate places - to push sorting this problem out to the top of the Roads Minister's to-do list. As people living in Kent know, trucks fill every lay-by, line up on the hard shoulder of slip roads, crawl onto the verges of country lanes and tuck themselves away in housing estates. None of these places have facilities for drivers, so as well as the problem of huge HGVs parked on the roadside, there's also littering and fouling of verges and hedges with human waste. Residents nearby are understandably upset, and it's pretty bad for the drivers themselves.

So we need more lorry parking spaces in Kent. The Government has committed £250 million for a new lorry park at Stanford West with space for 3,600 trucks, to provide a desperately needed alternative to closing the M20 for "Operation Stack" when there is disruption at the Channel. This will be an enormous relief for residents and businesses across Kent, especially those who live near the motorway. To make the most of this investment, there's surely a strong case for making the lorry park available for overnight parking of HGVs outside of Operation Stack.

I made these points in the debate and afterwards the Roads Minister, John Hayes, announced the launch of a fresh piece of work looking into how many more lorry parking spaces are needed and how they can be made available. He also wants to do more about litter on roadsides - a particular problem along parts of the A2-M2. I'm looking forward to taking him up on his offer to meet me and other Kent MPs as well as councillors and hauliers to thrash out some concrete solutions.

Ever since I became MP for Faversham and Mid Kent I've been badgering the council about the state of local playgrounds. I use the one at Faversham Rec with my own children, but it is dilapidated and out of date. So I was delighted when the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Big Lottery Fund have approved Swale Borough Council's £1.7 million upgrade proposal. The funds will go towards improving the buildings in the Rec. updating the playground and the skate park, a new café and an outdoor performance area. Since then I've met the SBC team responsible for the project and urged them to plan for a 'destination playground' at the Rec which would be

> which often get overlooked in favour of heritage and mainstream sport, yet they're so important, especially for children living in flats or houses without open space. Of course the biggest issue facing the country at the moment is Brexit, and how to build a successful future outside the EU. I'm keen to get a sense of what you think about the big changes that are on the way, so I've been knocking on doors over the summer asking people what they're looking for in our new deal with the EU; what they'd like our new relationship with Europe to look like; and how Brexit will affect them personally. Some of you joined me at a meeting in Lenham recently - to which I invited everyone who had written to me about the EU - for an excellent discussion on this. > Changes could be coming to this parish too. The Boundary Commission has recommended that my constituency be broken up and the East Downs ward, which includes Eastling, Stalisfield, Otterden and Throwley, become part of a new Canterbury and Faversham constituency. I'm honoured to represent Faversham and Mid Kent. It's a glorious constituency, stretching across the North Downs, taking in beautiful farmland and the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, to the Low Weald.

Over the weekend 17/18th Sept there was a wedding at the church and subsequent reception at the Village Hall. These are supposed to be happy events but due to the behaviour of a minority of quests the evening turned out be to anything but happy for people in the village.

Police were called to the village around midnight to reports of dubious persons attempting to either steal or break into motor vehicles. These persons were wearing attire that you normally would associate with a wedding and were still believed to be in the village. When the police arrived at the village hall they were confronted by a vehicle being driven by someone with too much alcohol in their system, and proved it by hitting their vehicle. He was subsequently arrested and taken away and his car was impounded and taken away by a car transporter. The rest of the quests disappeared by taxi around the 2.30 am mark.

It was seen the next morning that the school playing field had not missed some of the guests' attention with goalposts trashed and items from the children's play area strewn about. The headmaster was informed and, on closer inspection, it was seen that some drug paraphernalia was around. A full inspection was carried out the following morning to make sure the area was completely cleared.

Although these incidents are very upsetting we must remember this is really the first crime that we have experienced in the last couple of years and be put in its correct perspective.

Now the darker nights are creeping in remember to adjust your lighting timers and make sure all your outbuildings are securely locked.

Please keep going with your calls about suspicious vehicle and persons around, it all goes into police intelligence.


