

Although church bells might have been originally introduced to bring people to worship they soon became used to celebrate and announce special events.

The Millennium celebrations were used as a focal point to get many sets of bells around the country repaired. Taking advantage of extra money being granted from a variety of sources to help with the many different repair and replacement needs.

Some towers needed a good cleaning. One I know had been used as a good place for nest building by a number of rooks. Here's a bit of maths for you. If each pair use 300 sticks to build their nest, and you have 10 pairs each year for 7 years, how many feet thick will the debris be? The answer - a lot! And it takes a great deal of co-operation from a number of people to get it out and destroyed.

Others needed their floors strengthening to bear the weight of the bells, some needed their bells repairing or even replacing. This needed specialist work and transport to and back from their work places.

Then there's the little things like new bell ropes at £100 each, new stays at £50 and so on. These were often given by individuals but they all had to be paid for at the same time as having a set of bells is really an 'all or nothing event'.

When you think how much planning and oversight all this takes, you can understand it's not a task to be taken lightly.

This month - have a listen for a church ringing a set of bells; perhaps on a weekly practise, or a wedding, another type of celebration, or even muffled for a funeral. Think about all those things that go into making them safe and working and rung. What does this say to you about God?


Ospringe Church has a fine ring and a winning team of ringers. Listen on Sundays before the mid morning service or at practice time on Friday evenings.


